NOTE PROMISED ON WAR PROFITS BILL

Senate Quiz Records New Evidence of Millions In Munitions

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27 (AP)—While the senate munitions committee recorded new evidence of munitions profits today, it promised a note on the McSwain bill.

The House rules committee assumed consideration of the anti-war profits measure "in a week or so" after Representative McSwain (D-Id.) reminded that President Roosevelt said recently "the time has come to take the profit out of war."

McSwain said he had been promised there would be four hours of debate on the bill which aims at war profits by setting maximum prices when the country enters a war.

After quoting the president's anti-war profits declaration, McSwain said: "I am sure that the munitions industry will do its best to get the McSwain bill out of the country."

He added that Bernard Baruch and Hugh S. Johnson, members of a committee named by President Roosevelt to investigate war profits, favored his bill.

"Disclosure of the profits of the shipping company brought a protest from Senator Bone (D-Wash.) in the munitions committee against the McSwain bill," said McSwain.

MRS. HAUPTMANN CALLS FOR FUNDS

Lawyer and Wife of Convicted Man Offer Crowd of 5,000

NEW YORK, Feb. 27 (AP)—Mrs. Bruno Richard Hauptmann, wife of the man convicted for the kidnaping and murder of the infant Charles A. Lindbergh, Jr., and Ed. Kelly, called for contributions tonight, addressed a wildly demonstrative crowd at the Yorkville Casino, in the heart of New York's German district, in an appeal for defense funds.

Police estimated more than 5,000 jammed the casino before the doors were closed an hour before the meeting was scheduled to begin, and that other thousands clamored in the streets outside.

"I know positively that my husband was innocent, that he doesn't know anything about this crime," she said. "I want to believe I appeal for that reason to your contributions so the defense can reach its goal."

Rally received a prolonged demonstration as it began to speak. "We believed that Hauptmann was innocent before the trial, he is innocent and he believes it today," she said. "I believe in the 'ind' Bruno Richard Hauptmann's reversal will soon come from the highest court. . . . I challenge anyone to show that Bruno Hauptmann was ever in New Jersey that night."

At that point the crowd broke in with shouts of "Yes, Yes," and applauded violently. Rally closed with the "housewives" to remember Hauptmann in their prayers. Shouts, cheers and whistles greeted his plea.

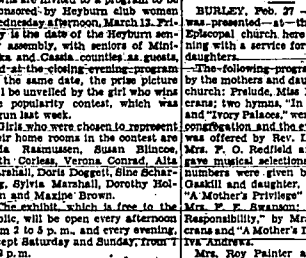

BUSINESS GAINS GRADUAL IN WEST

Federal Reserve Bank Finds Pacific Coast Trade Moderately Higher

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 27 (AP)—Business continues to show signs of gradual, but fairly steady, improvement in the Pacific coast states, the Federal Reserve bank reports in a report issued today by the federal reserve bank of San Francisco, covering January business of the 12th Federal Reserve district. After allowance for seasonal changes, the bank found January business moderately higher than in preceding months and approximately as high as at any time since the spring of 1932.

Employment in manufacturing enterprises expanded when compared with the usual January trend—that is, the decline that actually took place was less than seasonal.

Comparing the activity of the far west's major industries with preceding periods, the bank found most of them progressing from late 1932 levels and likewise higher than a year ago.

Summarizing the detailed analysis of the bank, the following conditions separates the industries gaining on a seasonal basis from those losing ground.

Textile Industrial Changes: (December to January)

Higher—Lumber production, iron and steel, oil production, motion pictures, construction, carloadings.

Lower—Cement production, department store sales, international shipping.

Farm Outlook Improves

Improvement was also recorded in agriculture, although the district's snowfall exceeded normal expectations through most of the district in January and the first half of February. The outlook for adequate supplies of irrigation water is good, though it is still too early for a definite appraisal.

The condition of planted crops and livestock ranges improved further, the bank reports. Prices of livestock advanced sharply because of the great reduction of herds last year. Other farm products were described as changing only narrowly during the month. The volume of marketing was under that of a year ago, partly on account of the tendency of farmers to hold products for higher prices.

Financial conditions were relatively stable. There was little change in bank loans total. Bank investments continued to increase, and federal disbursements for relief continued to exceed collections by a considerable amount.

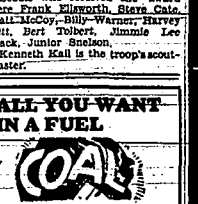
ROTARY CLUB'S GUEST TELLS OF ESTHONIA
