

C-O-P-URGED TO AVOID EXTREMES

Hurley Advises Michigan Republicans to Take Middle Course

DETROIT, Feb. 28.—Patrick J. Hurley, secretary of war in the Hoover administration, said tonight that "the Republicans will make a mistake if it attempts to assimilate either of the extremes of the Democratic party."

Addressing Michigan Republicans at a meeting preceding their state convention, Hurley called upon his party to adopt a constructive, middle ground course, including support of some "new deal" measures.

He charged that "destructive" 1932 campaign tactics of some Democrats led by John J. Eastock and Joseph Stinson had created a "Frankenstein" of public discontent which he said forced President Roosevelt to rescind pledges contained in the Democratic platform.

"Severation of Wings"

Hurley advised a portion of his progress in securing "severation of the wings" of the Democratic party, with a chilling comment for the Liberty League, one of those wings.

"Under the leadership of Messrs. Eastock and Stinson," he said, "a number of the leading members of the Democratic party have organized a rich man's club which they call the Liberty League. If the Liberty League has any purpose at all it is to destroy the present Democratic administration."

"If the Liberty League falls in its attempt to regain control of the Democratic party it will attempt to name the same Republicans for president in the Liberty League should succeed in doing that, it will destroy the Republican party for success."

"Other Democrats, including such outstanding characters as Upton Sinclair and Genevieve Rose, seem to be in the process of seceding from the left wing of the Democratic party. The Republican party has no more desire for recruits from the left wing of the Democratic party than it has for those coming through the Liberty League."

Hurley warned that the Roosevelt administration's announced purpose is "to drive income tax payers by profits and those who earn a daily wage closer together, is a worthy objective, but he added: "We are still listening to a flood of propaganda about what the Democrats are doing in practice in equitable distribution of income, but exclusive of taxpayers' money that is being paid out on doles and hand work, the distribution of income under the new deal is unquestionably upward toward the concentration of wealth and not downward to the great majority of the people."

Hurley said the Republican party should "support the changes necessary to correct, strengthen and perfect, not to destroy, the American economic system."

"Oppose the centralization of power in a bureaucracy at Washington—centralization of power is nearly always destructive."

"Oppose destruction of commodities and waste of taxpayers' money as a basis of recovery."

"Prevent monopolies."

"Support the constructive portions of the NRA."

"Support legislation to provide unemployment and life insurance (not a dole) without destroying the insurance which individuals have created for themselves through life insurance companies or investment."

"Support President Roosevelt in his efforts to return to the Republican plan of relief; in his use of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation and the Home Owners

Tallulah Turns Her Talents To 'Rain' And Learns Life Can Go Swimmingly

NEW YORK (AP)—With cautious curiosity, New York greeted Tallulah Bankhead in the revival of Maugham's melodrama, "Rain."

"There was instant, fainter, and wonder as to whether the insouciant Tallulah could cope with the ghost of Jeanette Eagar, who mentions the film performances of Gloria Swanson and Joan Crawford."

New York knew her rise in the English theatre had been bright and sharp. As a rocket against a "Winter" sky, but Tallulah had never performed any miracles at home. Even her marriage made after her return from London three years ago, had been less than entirely satisfactory.

After Hollywood, she did a couple of plays on Broadway. Both were unworthy, yet the critic applauded her talent.

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Guiding Your Child

By ALICE CLARISSE RICHMOND: "Delegating one's authority in bringing up children is apt to be unfortunate. It is all too common in modern life that mother who goes out to work or to play, bride who turns her children over to a maid to be cared for in her absence, gradually forms the habit of delegating it more and more, until eventually most of the child's waking hours are spent in the hands of others."

Even the tiniest baby is influenced by those about it. If it is cared for by kind, unselfish, soft-voiced people, life is apt to take on the coloring of its surroundings and develop accordingly. If on the other hand, the baby is harshly spoken to, sharply or unpleasantly scolded, too much scolding, too many rebuffs, too much opposition, it is apt to develop a conditioned by its early treatment.

To hand over a child to a young and ignorant maid whose only recommendation is her willingness, or even her willingness to work for less than sending it to an institution. In the average asylum it would be treated as a case of "the worst kind of mental derangement."

Except in cases of dire need, a mother should not hold down a job or try to carry on her career, if she can afford to pay for first class care of her children in her absence. When the mother is absent, the child is left in the hands of a stranger, and the mother has no right to neglect or to hand over to "unfit" supervision, in favor of other business or pleasure.

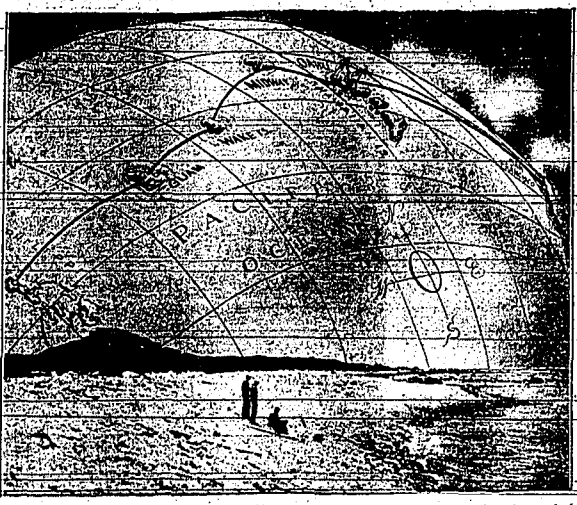

Tiny Wake Island 'Discovered' On Maps

By CHARLES NUTTER WASHINGTON, Feb. 27 (AP)—The albatross and frigate birds that wheel lightly around a tiny coral reef far out in the Pacific waters were the first to discover it.
