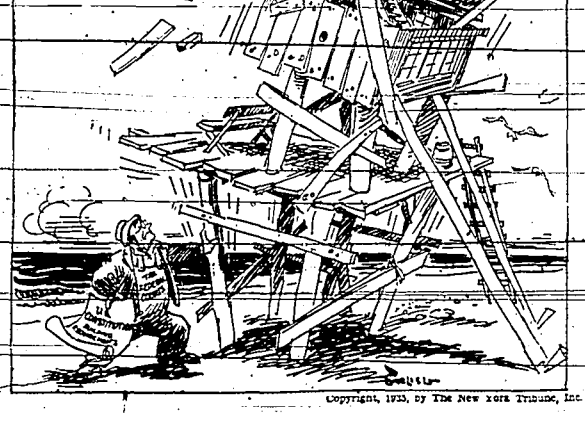

SEATTLE FAVORED FOR B. P. W. MEET

Miss Phillips Boosts Pacific Northwest City for Club Convention

The Northwest is the logical place for the national convention of Business and Professional Women's clubs which is to be held in Seattle, July 14-20 and known as the "Northwest Biennial," said Miss Lena Madesta Phillips, of New York City, who has recently visited a number of north west cities on a lecture tour.

"I am glad that the five great northwest states of Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Montana and Wyoming, and the territories of Alaska and Hawaii are co-sponsors of the convention, giving a practical demonstration of cooperation on a wide scale. Business women need the assistance that this great, free and open, wide-flung territory can give," continued Miss Madesta. Miss Phillips, one of the founders of the National Organization and early president of it, is now president of the International Federation of Business and Professional Women's clubs.

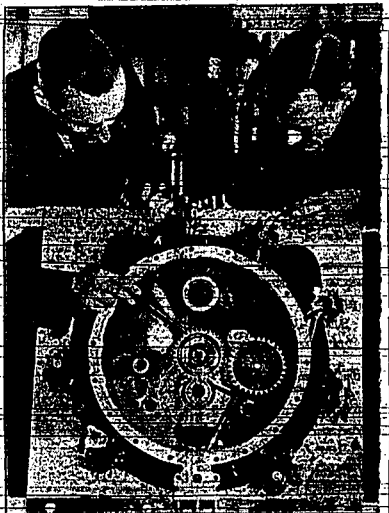

EXPOSITION DELAYS GRAND PRIZE AWARD

Newly Modernized Home to Be Given Away by Committee, March 13

The newly modernized home that has recently risen to new heights in Twin Falls from its original as an old railroad section house, will be given away Wednesday, March 13 at 2:30 p. m. Twin Falls Empire exposition officials announced last evening.

The ceremony was postponed yesterday when it was discovered that the necessary number of workmen were not available to complete the new building in time to give the house away tomorrow, as originally planned. Committee members stated that workers have been used on a part-time basis and that they have been too busy with other building projects to bring the work to a close.

Furniture for the dwelling will also be given away March 13. But the new furnished project will remain on display in the middle of Second street north, adjoining Main street, until April 1. As a special feature of the award day, the exposition will come to a close with a dance Wednesday evening at Radioland following the giving of the award.

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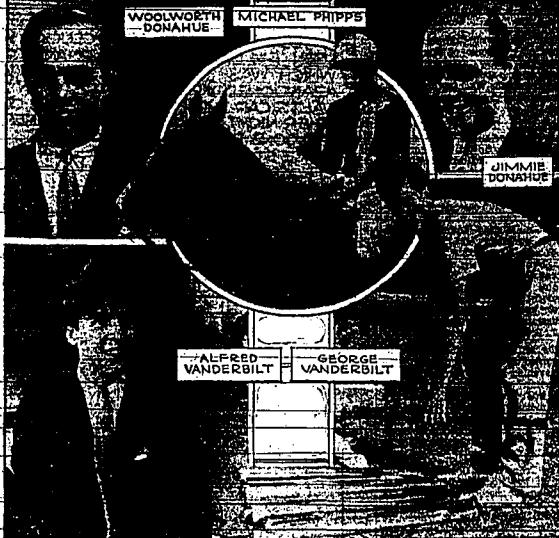
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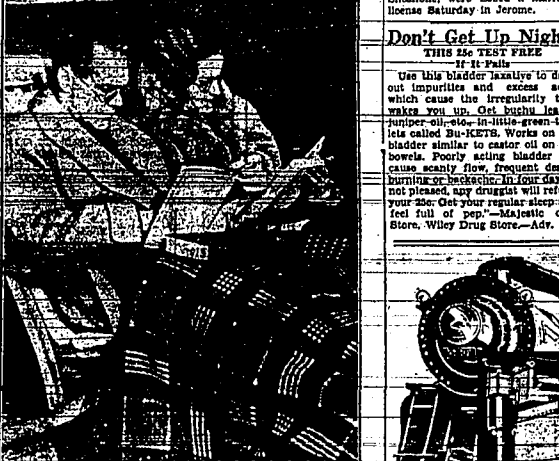

SPUD CROP CONTROL DISCUSSED AT BUHL

West End Growers Select Committee to Help Draft Recommendations

A meeting of between 30 and 40 growers in the high school auditorium at Buhl last night heard with apparent satisfaction an explanation of the Martin bill pending in congress to provide for government control of potato crop production, and thereafter elected a three-man committee to assist in drafting a statement of Twin Falls county's position on the settlement regarding the proposition.

The committee elected at the Buhl meeting, composed of Luke V. Bonner, John Kraal and Ray Pettigrew, is expected to meet at similar meetings scheduled to be held at Marsburg this evening and in Twin Falls on Wednesday evening.

Provisions of the proposed potato crop regulation were discussed by Harvey B. Hale, county agent. The plan, he said, provides for issuance of tax exemption certificates to growers to cover their crop allotments and require growers to purchase tax stamps of potatoes sold in excess of the individual allotment.

The county agent also discussed proposed legislation to make edible dry beans a basic commodity under government control for production control program.

Proceeding the county agent's explanation, E. F. Bennett, Idaho horticultural specialist, discussed the potato situation and cultural methods and practices. Indications he said are that Idaho potato plantings this season will be larger than last year's unless potato crop control legislation is made effective.

There were three James Breveler Simonsens. The third James had a great deal to live up to. Not only was he the grandson of New Concord's only ex-governor and most eminent citizen but, as Judge Holcomb so frequently pointed out, the son of the one entirely satisfactory husband Kansas had ever produced. The Judge usually added, "or any other state."

Everyone in New Concord suspected; and all the women knew positively, that this paragon, Dr. Jim Simson, the second James, had refused to be vaccinated during the smallpox epidemic in 1835 because he could not bear to go on living after the death of his wife, Molly. Molly died in giving birth to the third James.

Dr. Jim at the time was not yet thirty, handsome, talented, an only son—and heir to a fortune. Apparently nothing counted but Molly's died murmuring her name and was canonized overnight. This little son was then six months old.

The women were, essentially, responsible for Dr. Jim's posthumous sainthood. The men had killed Jim Jim's mother, they grew fastidiously tired of him dead. Judge Holcomb, a bachelor, claimed that whenever a New Concord husband was troubled with a headache or a peculiar gleam in his eye, he knew that he was being compared to Dr. Jim and that the comparison was hideously unfavorable.

The women smiled at these jokes of the judge. Like a certain royal contemporary they were not amused and made no bones about it. They actually seemed to feel a vicarious pride in Dr. Jim's almost divine death and never seemed to tire of discussing it.

Beyond irritating their husbands this would have been harmless enough if the intended inheritance had not inspired them to an interest in his son. It was the third James Simson's great fortune that the women of New Concord, particularly the intimates of his Aunt Sarah, maintained for more than twenty years actively and possessively maternal concern in his development, his career, and most of all, in his marriage.

There was no little orphan was ever more tenderly loved and cherished. The night of his father's funeral Sarah, his grandmother, said to her husband, "I wonder if God has left us little James."

The Governor made no answer. In his heart was the bitter cry that a God capable of tenderness would have taken him and spared his son. Later, when Jim had suffered that bitterness, he retroceded and was comforted.

While he was still a child his father, who had been bred with an ambition to go west and grow up with the country, however young Simson had neither the ambition nor the desire to go west and grow up in the country alone, so he married pretty Sarah, a stocky, well-made but the ink was dry on his sheepskin.

His money was not great but he was not poor. He had no definite intention when they set out of settling in Kansas. They planned vaguely to take a look at Saint Joseph, Missouri, or possibly go on to a place in the wilds of Western Kansas, as they were wont to do.

upon even a lone grasshopper until he was quite a big boy.

Almost, but not quite as thrilling, were the stories of the dark days after the Civil War when soldiers came flocking in expecting to find a new Utopia only to face years of heart-breaking drought. But as those tales made James and the Governor cheer him up, by telling of the discovery of alfalfa and dry farming in the Western portions of the state, emphasizing the stupendous strides forward Kansas had made in consequence.

So like a hard-of-ward the first James Breveler Simson sang his sagas of long ago to an enthralled and enraptured audience of one, and deep in the heart of his small grandson was planted a love for his state, a reverent admiration for his grandfather and an unconscious desire to make both proud of him. This was to influence his entire life.

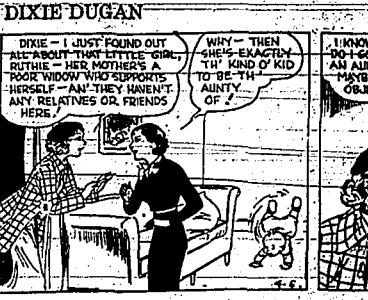

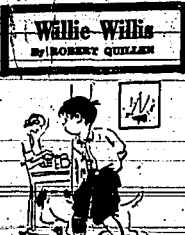

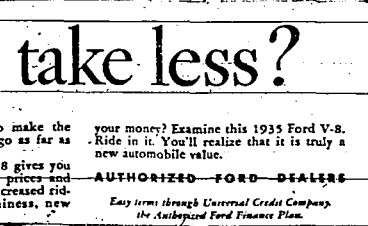
