THE ELEVEN MILLION

A government estimate, figured for last December, gives 10,880,000 persons "available for employment" but out of work, Call 1t-11.000,000

Not all these would be employed in pros-perous times. There might be a marginal 3,000,000 temporarily out of work or not wanting or needing regular work. That wanting or need leaves 8,000,000.

The most important task in this country today is to get those \$,000,000 to work in normal jobs. Public jobs must be provided for many while private jobs are still lacktor many while private jobs he suit ing; but the goal is private employment, and there will be no security for labor, business or government until that goal is reached. It seems necessary every little while to get back to this basic fact. The imperative meed is work—constructive work—self-respecting

vork. This need is more pressing th fits, more pressing than political prestige more pressing than class selfishness or class pride or anything else about which we so

Here is the one thing that cannot be safely postponed, Without re-employment of these millions there is no safety for any of us. Our "American system" depends on getting them into productive jobs.

The wrath of Father and Mother Dionne over the abduction of their quintuplets by the government of Ontario is interesting.

Soon after birth, the quintuplets were legally taken out of their hands by the state and placed under the authority of four government appointed guardians, including Dr. Dafoe. When it developed that the babies, because of world-wide in-terest and generosity, were a source of in-come, the parents were taken off the dole and given \$75 a month from the quintuplets'

frust fund.
