REBELS ROUTED IN MACEDONIA, GREEK AUTHORITIES CLAIM

Town of Seres Seized After Thundering Artillery Attack; Venizelos Reported Ready to Quit Revolt

(Copyright, 1935, by Associated Press) ATHENS, March 6 (Wednesday)—The Greek government early today claimed a smashing victory against rebels in Macedonia, announcing the routing of the army, after a thundering artillery attack had captured the Macedonian town of Seres, 45 miles northeast of Salonika. While loyal soldiers swept before them over the plateau to the north, rumors ran through Athens that Premier Venizelos, at the head of the government of Greek politics, was making every effort to quit the revolt.

Idaho Seventh State to Adopt Driver License

BOISE, March 5 (AP)—At 5:00 o'clock tonight Idaho became the seventh state of the union to adopt the uniform driver license law. At that time Governor Rowland had the honor to sign the measure which was introduced by Senator Harry L. Vost as senate bill 1 at the opening of the present session. It was passed by the senate, 22-21, and approved by the house, 47-10. It requires all automobile drivers to take examination to determine their driving qualifications. 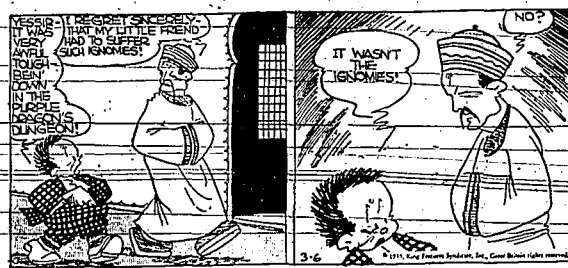

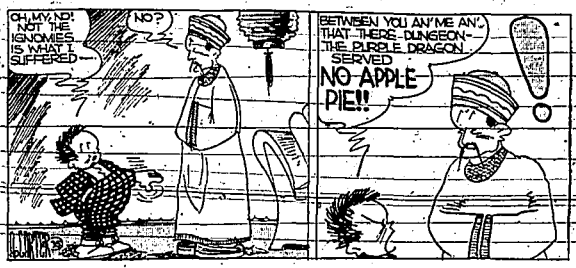

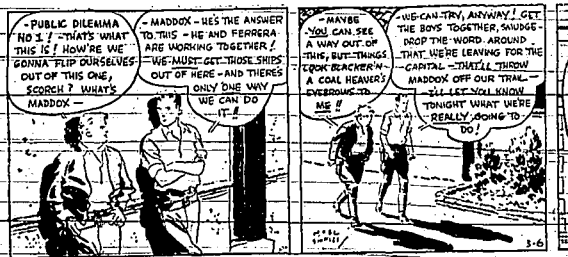

HUNTER CONFESSES TO MANSLAUGHTER

Slayer of R. C. Letson Enters Plea to Lesser Charge

Granted a new trial after serving about one year of a 10-to-25-year prison term for second degree murder, Lewis Hunter, 50, of Twin Falls, was permitted to plead guilty to an involuntary manslaughter charge in the district court here yesterday.

Justice Judge Agim is hearing Jerome who received Hunter's plea, set next Monday, March 11, at 10 a. m. as the time for pronouncing sentence. Prosecuting Attorney Edward Babcock did not object to Hunter's pleading guilty to the lesser charge. Hunter's second trial on the murder charge had previously been set for next Monday.

Manslaughter under Idaho law is punishable by imprisonment in the state prison for not to exceed 10 years.

Hunter was accused of beating and kicking Reinhold C. Letson, 54, Twin Falls realtor, to death in an altercation on a farm near Twin Falls where Letson was said to have come on business for his client, and was owner of the property and where Hunter was employed at work with a potato digger. The encounter occurred November 8, 1932.

Supreme Court Divides

Should a trial of a first-degree murder charge, Hunter was found guilty following December 16 or 18, in the second degree and was sentenced by the then District Judge William A. Babcock. The supreme court divided, three to two, in an opinion holding Hunter was entitled to a new trial on account of alleged error in the trial court's definition in his instructions of the word malice.

Justice Budge and Givens dissented from the majority opinion. Idaho statutes definition of involuntary manslaughter is "the unlawful killing of a human being without malice in the perpetration or attempted perpetration of any unlawful act other than arson, rape, robbery, burglary or larceny; or in the commission of a larceny act which might produce death in an unlawful manner or without due caution and circumspection."

Throughout the prosecution and proceedings, an appeal was represented by his attorney, appointed by the court, E. L. Rayburn, of Twin Falls.
