BY WILLIAM H. EWING HONOLULU (UP)—Imagine a baseball diamond with a short first base line and you will have a fair accurate picture of the 5,000,000 square mile area over which Uncle Sam's fighting ships will maneuver in May.

Take San Francisco as home plate, Puget Sound as first base, the Aleutian Islands as the keyhole base and Honolulu as third base.

Over this huge area, still not extremely large when compared with the 140,000 miles of Pacific, some 120 surface vessels and nearly 500 airplanes will play a war game which is intended to be ambitious enough to determine whether the navy could defend all the points they touch.

The navy is confident it can. If the war game were limited to the route-of-baseball-the problem would be simpler. Then the enemy could reach home plate or first base only by way of third base, which is Honolulu.

Midway consists of a pair of grand islands, the larger less than four miles in area, lying about 1,000 miles west of Honolulu.

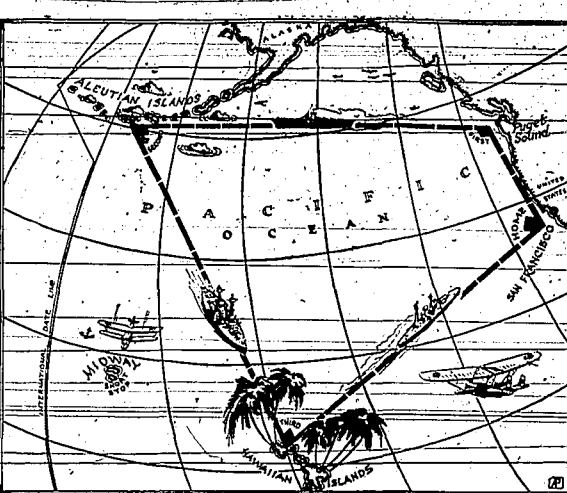

### TREASURE MISSING FROM STRONG ROOM

#### Gloved Bandits Escape With \$107,000 as Law Guards Croydon Airdrome

CROYDON, England, March 7 (AP)—Gloved bandits who worked apparently under the very eyes of airport attendants, mysteriously removed \$107,000 worth of gold from the closely guarded strong room of the Croydon airdrome last night.

Last night Scotland Yard detectives were without clues as to the identity of the thieves or how they got the precious metal out of an "unopened safe."

A minute search of the airdrome and close questioning of all employees failed to turn up the slightest evidence. The fact that no fingerprints were found was taken to indicate the robbers wore gloves.

Millions shipped

The rocketing price of gold, preceding shipment of all employees' metal, has resulted in consignments worth millions of dollars into and out of Croydon.

Wednesday night three boxes of gold—one filled with United States gold pieces, another with English gold pieces and the third with gold—was placed in the strong room.

A guard stands constantly near it. A police station is only 70 yards away.

Yet the gold was missing this morning, the police found all keys to the safe.

Detectives, believing duplicate keys must have been used for the job, were seeking the source of them.

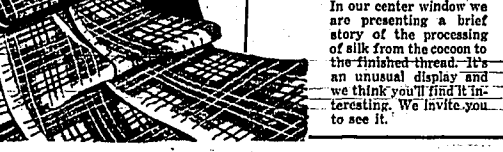

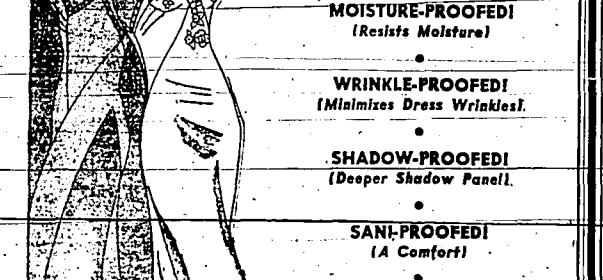

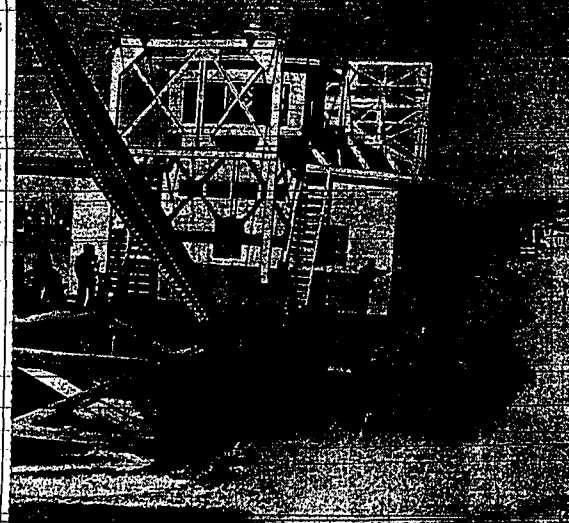

NEW YORK, March 7 (AP)—The prospective comeback of shortstop Charley Gelbert—thanks to a surgical miracle enabling him to recover from a hunting accident that left his foot two years ago—gives the St. Louis Cardinals a chance to solve two problems at once.

The world champions, by taking their cue from an example furnished by the New York Giants, may try substituting Gelbert for Pepper Martin at third base and sliding Martin to his old position in center field, now considered one of the few weak spots in the Cardinal lineup.

The arguments in favor of this experiment are obvious. The Cards do not need a new shortstop, even though Leo Durocher, team captain, is one of the weakest hitters in the game.

Leo's job is pretty safe. Durocher's defensive ability, his smartness and habit of contributing his frequent base hits to important situations makes him a vital cog in the team's performance. Leo, it will be recalled, was a star batting hero of the last world series. He is needed, too, for his aggressive batting.

Similar reasoning has prompted the Giants to shift their former all-star shortstop, Tommie Hunter, to third base for the coming campaign with Dick DiMaggio installed at short.

### AN HOUR AFTER NARROW ESCAPE

#### Tires Burned and Ripped in Run on Sands at Daytona

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla., March 7.—Sir Malcolm Campbell hitched his third wagon to a streak of lightning today and roared down Daytona's golden sands to a new-world automobile speed record—276.816 miles an hour.

It was far short of the 300-mile goal he has set for himself and a seven-wheeler, his hand rocket, but it was 4,708 miles an hour swifter than the 272.048-mile average he traveled establishing the new two-year speed record.

He had one narrow escape shortly after thundering through the measured mile on the return trip.

#### Skids to Safety

A bump that almost tore the steering wheel from his hands sent the car careening high on the beach until the tires were just skimming the deadly wet sands. With a terrific effort the 30-year-old Britishman wrenched the wheel back, skidded to the safety of the hard sand, and drove to the end of the run and the new record.

The run today, though only slightly above his old record, was as dangerous as any he has made here and ever since he has taken Bluebird to the beach during this venture, something has happened.

#### Tires in Shreds

He stood and stared in amazement at the mangled remains of Bluebird as he looked the car over in front of the timing tower when it was all over. The smooth rubber surface of the 30-year-old Britishman's front, four-on-back wheels was literally burned away. The remains hung in shreds, the strips of worn burpings turned away like the skin of a snake. There was a couple of ply of being torn away straight down to the metal tubes. Bluebird otherwise was undamaged.

"The run down was splendid," said Campbell as he posed for the cameras, laughing and pointing to Lady Campbell. She was blushing about it all, particularly since she has been forced to live in an attempt that might have been suicidal in a 40-mile wind two days ago.

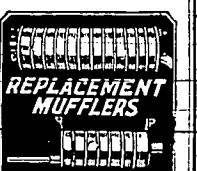

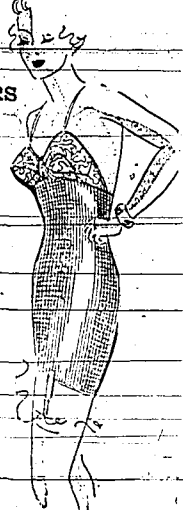
