**BUSINESS TRENDS**  
**PRODUCE OPTIMISM**

**Fright Movement Ranks High Among Indicators of Improvement**

(By The Associated Press)  
An optimistic interpretation of the current position of national business and industry was voiced last week by many analysts.  
Of the major straws in the trade winds, carloadings reported to exceed last week's for the week ended March 2, there were 604,842 cars loaded, a gain of 8.4 per cent over the week before.  
All classes of freight increased to a total above the usual seasonal level, although expected expansion by 9-14 million tons for the like week of 1934.  
Automobile production last week was estimated by Crum's at 673,000 units, against 618,000 units the previous week.  
Steel production last week was 48.2 per cent of capacity against 47.9 the previous week as estimated by the American Iron and Steel Institute.  
Decline halted  
Analysts reported the recent declining trend has been halted, either the opening of books for orders in the second quarter failed to meet the expected rush of buying except in flat-plate steel.

**MINE NEAR FAIRFIELD ADDS CAPITALIZATION**

FAIRFIELD, March 9.—The Richard Allen mine north of Fairfield, Idaho, has received its capitalization for 600,000 shares to 1,000,000 shares, with a market value of five cents, according to a report from the mine's officials.  
The mine is now being developed with a milling capacity of 100 tons daily, an estimated 1,000,000 tons of ore being produced by the milling, with returns from the last run averaging \$7.85 per ton, 3,000 feet of tunnel and accommodations for 30 men.

**LONG DEBATE ON BONUS SCHEDULED**

**House Leaders Seek Clear Test on Inflation Question**

WASHINGTON, March 9 (AP)—House passage of the bonus next week became doubtful today when leaders agreed upon highly unusual procedure designed to assure a clear test on inflation.  
The understanding was that at least 10 and perhaps 12 hours of debate—enough to consume three or four days—would be allowed before voting.  
The schedule set offered ample opportunities for separate votes on the Vinson American Legion bill, which makes no provision "as to how the money would be raised, and the Palmer bill, which would direct the printing of \$2,000,000,000 in new currency.  
The Vinson bill will be formally presented to the house Monday by the ways and means committee. It would allow the committee to propose a special resolution necessary to permit a choice between the Palmer and Vinson bills.  
Waits on Vinson  
That resolution cannot be brought to a vote before Wednesday, and will not be presented then unless Representative Vinson (D-Ky), called home by the illness of his mother, has returned.  
In agreeing to the procedure guaranteed by the Vinson bill, Democratic and Republican leaders ignored past efforts by an American Legion legislative representative, Thomas Taylor, to prevent a direct vote on the two bills.  
Representative Patman (D-Tex.) said today in a private discussion that the Vinson bill would permit a potential federal obligation of \$600,000,000 more than his bill. He produced a letter from Secretary Morgenthau saying that a separate bill, making an appropriation, would have to be granted before the Vinson bill actually would get the money to the holder of an adjusted compensation certificate.  
"If such an appropriation were made," Morgenthau added, "the money would come out of the general fund of the treasury which is added to from time to time, as expenditures required by the sale of government securities."  
Palman supporters said that because of this congress would have to enact two bills over a presidential veto under the Vinson method. Patman emphasized that the interest on securities necessary to finance bonus payments under the Vinson bill would amount to \$40,000,000.  
Vinson backers, however, contend that it "is better to use the orthodox method than to tamper with the currency."

**Bridge Engineer Found Dead in Car**

Indications Point to Suicide of Joe "Spud" Murphy of Nampa  
NAMPA, Idaho, March 9 (AP)—Joe "Spud" Murphy, 50, well known engineer with the state department of public highways since 1912, was found dead several miles southwest of Meola this afternoon by prospectors who were following a trail north to Meola for supplies.  
Coroner William D. Tuttle, of Canyon county, said Murphy lay with a gun in his hand and had apparently been dead three days.  
The coroner said all indications pointed to suicide.  
In Nampa it was revealed that Murphy had been "missing" from his home for three days. Relatives and friends are unable to give any reason for the act.  
Born in Tacoma, Washington, Murphy came to Nampa with his parents in 1902 and had since made his home here. He is a graduate of the Colorado school of mines and of the University of Colorado. Since his first marriage he has been in charge of department of highways in 1912 he has been a bridge engineer in charge of construction of the major new bridges in the state.  
He was active in lodge activities and was a past state officer of the American Legion. He also was affiliated with the Veterans or Foreign Wars.  
Surviving are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. P. Murphy of Nampa; a brother, C. H. Murphy; and a sister, Winifred Murphy in Los Angeles. Funeral arrangements have not been completed.

**Coffin Maker for Arizona Frontier Called by Death**

JOSEPH CITY, Ariz., March 9 (AP)—Funeral services were held here today for John McLawa, 43, one of the first white settlers in northeastern Arizona, whose picturesque career spanned more than half a century. He died Thursday.  
Sent to Arizona in 1876 by President Brigham Young of the Church of Latter Day Saints, McLawa was one of the leading figures in the colonization of the Little Colorado river country.  
When he first arrived at the site of Holbrook, then called Horse Head Crossing, there was only one adobe hut. He built the first house in Winslow, the first house in Holbrook, and the first house in Big Lake City, September 14, 1882, and lived there with his family until he was 42. In 1892 he helped construct the St. George temple at St. George, Utah, for the Mormon church.  
"With his wife and three other persons he started for Arizona, February 8, 1876, and after nine weeks of tedious travel arrived at Allen's camp, three miles southeast of the present site of Joseph City.  
McLawa, a carpenter by trade, made practically every cabinet for those who had died in Joseph City since 1876 and never accepted payment for his services.  
PERUVIAN SUBMARINES REPORTED IN DISTRESS

The submarines, the P-1 and P-2, in condition of distress, were en route to New London, Connecticut, where they were built, for repairs, it was understood.

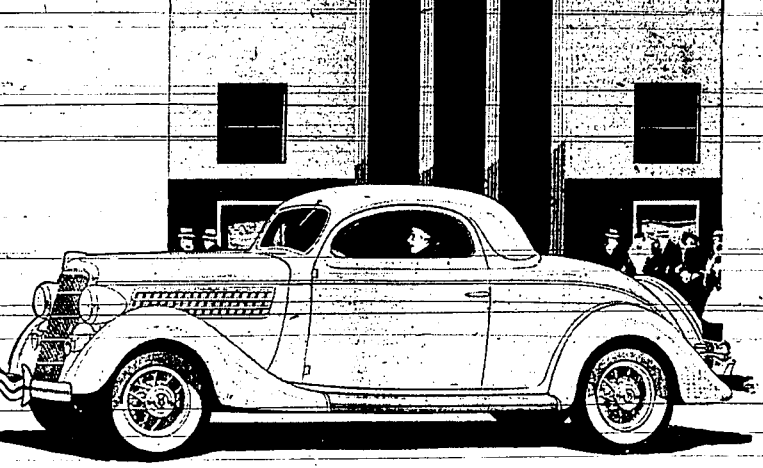

THE EXTRA SESSION: As was to have been expected the Idaho Legislature finds itself in special session as a result of the necessity of performing at least a part of the work detracted in the interests of debate during the regular session.

Some few bills have been actually passed but the total accomplishments of the regular session are slight indeed. A liquor bill is before the governor for signature, likewise two measures providing for moratoria on tax delinquencies and mortgages.

TOO MUCH SAYING? At a time when the American people are thinking more than ever before about "economic security," it jolts a fellow to be told we've been ruined by thrift.

The Brookings Institution, a social research group, after carefully studying the depression, concludes that it was caused by saving too much money. It therefore cautions the country against such folly now and hereafter.

It is very confusing. But analysis clears up the apparent absurdity. Everyone knows that there were tens of millions of people who didn't save too much money, because they couldn't if they wanted to.

porter, "can do practically anything except play the slide trombone." A nationally known paint concern has backed up by means to the extent of \$480,000 and is getting from them an oil which makes better paint than anything ever used before, holding color longer, drying more quickly, and so on.

Among the other products of this bean—a native of China—are hay, fertilizer, margarine, cheese, vegetable oil for salads or cooking meal for stock feeding, a synthetic product like bakelite, and tectithin (used in the rubber, textile, and baking industries).

Farmers are taking an interest in soy beans for many reasons, not the least of which is the rapidly-developing commercial market. But also the soy-bean is bug-proof, and its cultivation in regions infested with chinch-bug will help to starve out that pest while producing profitable crops.

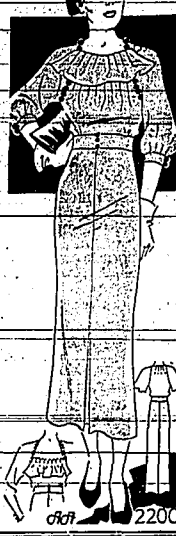

MAN Against NATURE

Engineers Master Norris Dam's Obstacles

By ROY H. HULCHENS NORRIS, Tenn. - The labor of 3,500 men, the ingenuity of engineers and 2,500,000 tons of materials are being combined near here to turn the Clinch river—a tiny mountain stream—into a servant of man.

The project is the huge Norris dam, being constructed by the Tennessee Valley Authority. The dam, spanning the Clinch river between sprawling hillsides, will be 233 feet high, 1,300 feet long and 210 feet wide at the base.

To Create More Power When completed early in 1936, it will create an artificial lake 83 miles square, extending finger-like into the valleys formed by the mountains behind the dam.

The Clinch river, rising in southwest Virginia, drains a mountain area of 4,400 square miles, and the waters go tumbling southward to the broad Tennessee. These waters, impounded by Norris dam, will be used for power and "when released will create supplementary power at the Joe Wheeler and Wilson dams on the Tennessee river."

Construction of Norris' dam named for Senator George Norris of Nebraska, was begun in November, 1929. The TVA took over the project in 1933.

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Working like beavers, a couple of thousand men are building a dam in northeastern Tennessee which will form a reservoir covering 83 square miles in the valley of the Clinch river. Norris dam is part of the extensive TVA program to develop the Tennessee basin.

"Come along to my office," he commanded, slipping his arm in James'. "You've been neglecting those recent necks and I've missed you."

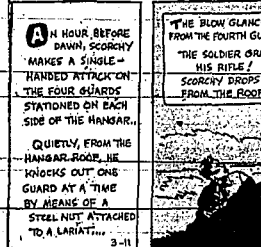

Other crops have had bad price years. Both mean a loss. Both could happen again. This signed statement makes no attempt to hide the truth.

### But

There are favorable factors. The new U. S. improved Number One resistant seed from the 1934 crop at Las Cruces, New Mexico, is the best so far developed. Ask the local entomology department, the sugar factory executives, or members of the local Beet Growers Association. They will give you the facts. Spring weather conditions could materially change the outlook.
