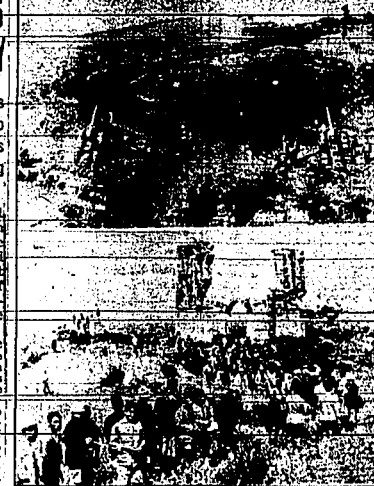

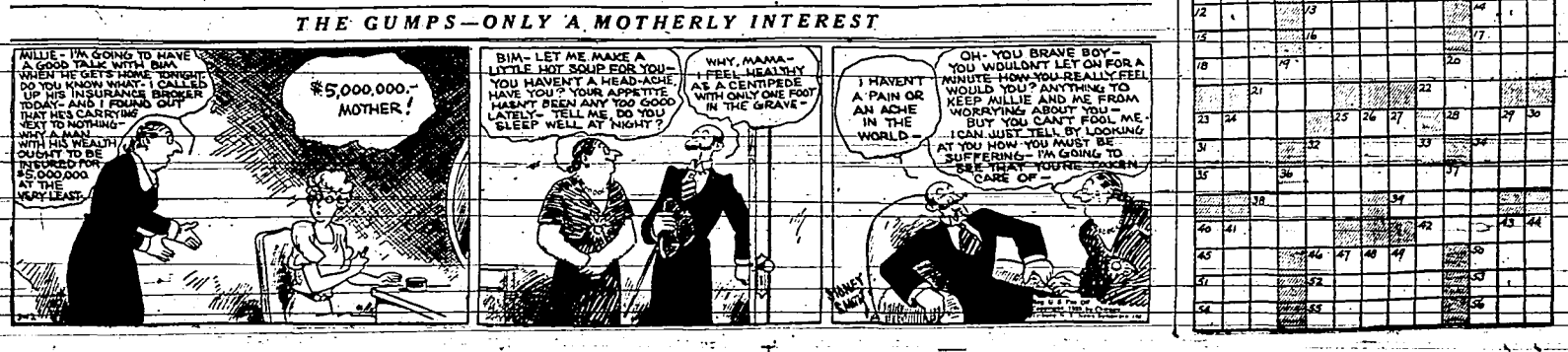

TESTS PROVE VALUE OF RESISTANT SEED

N. V. Sharp of Filer Tells Satisfactory Experience in Growing Beets

Among Twin Falls district sugar beet growers who have had satisfactory experience in the use of fly-resistant seed, and who intend to continue growing beets this season is N. V. Sharp of Filer, one of Twin Falls Canal company's directors.

"Fly resistant seed has been definitely proven successful as far as I am concerned," Mr. Sharp said yesterday.

He explained that in 1933 he planted both "B. No. 1" curly top resistant, and the regular commercial seed, and that the resistant strain yielded as well as the commercial. Both averaged 26 tons per acre.

In 1934 he again planted both types of seed. The field of commercial beets was practically a total loss, he said, while the No. 1 resistant averaged 12 tons per acre, despite a late planting.

"With timely planting and resistant seed in a well prepared and fertilized seed bed, I believe that a crop of beets is assured in even our worst fly years," Mr. Sharp said.
