



Just one of a relief expense of a hundred thousand dollars a month. This would seem to be the obvious and sensible way to do it but it wil

not be the Boss way.

Strange that at a time when the people of Idaho are delinquent in their taxes to the extent of more than fifteen million dollars and that a majority of those who have met their annual tax bills have been compelled to borrow money to do it, the urge is so persistently in the direction of more and ever more taxation.

Some day perhaps we will reach a point

where we are willing to try economy.






