STATE SALES TAX PASSAGE FORECAST

Measure Defeated by Idaho Representatives Makes Reappearance

BOISE, March 13 (AP)—A 3 per cent retail sales tax measure was introduced in the Idaho house of representatives this afternoon.

The sales tax measure is almost identical with one defeated by the house 51-26 yesterday.

Under the provisions, \$100,000 monthly, if available, will be devoted to relief purposes; \$100,000 would be available for relief of common school districts in distress.

The bill defeated yesterday did not provide for any definite amount for relief of common school districts.

"It looks like this will meet some objection," the editor of the Idaho Statesman said.

Another bill was introduced today, to amend the act to create a department of public health, separate from that under the supervision of the state department of agriculture.

The bill was defeated by the house in regular session.

MYSTERY PLANE MAKES TWO HOPS

Ship Carries Improved Radio Compass, Aeronautics Chief Explains

OAKLAND, Calif., March 13 (AP)—After making one "successful" test flight over the Pacific during the early morning, a government "mystery plane" carrying carefully guarded flying instruments took off here again this afternoon for another test cruise.

Upon returning from the first trip, which took 12 1/2 miles at 20,000 feet, the plane was taken to the aeronautics bureau of aeronautics, in Washington, for a check-up.

The "mystery plane" was ordered repaired immediately and it took off again at 1:45 p. m. for a projected flight of 50 miles to sea and return. It was said the plane would attempt to pick up a radio beam from the Hawaiian Islands.

# WASHINGTON AIRS SUGAR CONTRACTS

### Farmers, Processors and Senators Take Part in Conference

WASHINGTON, March 13 (AP)—Sugar beet farmers, processors, senators from sugar beet states and officials of the farm administration sugar section were trying today to settle difficulties in negotiations between growers and processors of the beet crop.

John A. Dalton, chief of the AAA sugar section, told the Associated Press no formal conference had been called. At the same time representatives of leading growers' organizations, headed by Charles M. Kearney, president of the National Beet-Crover's association, and representatives of the processors moved into Washington.

Preliminary to meetings of the growers and processors with agricultural officials, senators and senators met with Dalton in the office of Senator Costigan (D-Colo.), co-author of the Jones-Costigan sugar control act passed by the last congress.

There was a reluctance to discuss the situation in public. Senators attending the meeting included Costigan, O'Mahoney of Wyoming, Murray of Montana, Burke of Nebraska, and Hope of Idaho. Other senators including Norris of Nebraska and Wheeler of Montana were invited but were unable to attend.

Dalton told the Associated Press the discussions with senators and growers representatives would be strictly of an informal nature in reference to contract negotiations. The Costigan-Jones act provides that growers may appeal any contract difficulties which may arise with processors to the secretary of agriculture.

### U. S. Judge Upholds Farm-Debt Holiday

KANSAS CITY, March 13 (AP)—Federal Judge Merrill E. Olin upheld today the constitutionality of the Federal-Lend Lease agreement to the Federal bankruptcy act today in a decision hailed by a farm leader as certain to hike corn belt interest. In this form of agricultural relief, the amendment provides a 3-year moratorium on farm debts.

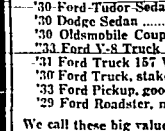
