# FIELD WAGE SCALE STILL UNSETTLED

### Beet Growers' Director Gives Version of Pocatello Meeting

There has been no discussion by Idaho sugar beet growers and laborers at the Pocatello meeting, J. N. Dayley of Pocatello, president of the Twin Falls-Jerome beet growers association and a director of the state association, said here last evening.

"The only definite proposition with respect to field workers' wages under consideration at this time, he said, is incorporated in a contract which, he said, George T. Cobbley of Blackfoot, president of the Idaho Beet Growers association, submitted to Secretary of Labor Perkins and a representative of the AAA sugar section in Washington, and which, he said, must have the approval of the government officials."

### Favored Wage Scale

The wage scale proposed in this contract, Mr. Dayley said, is substantially the same as that paid in Idaho last year—48 an acre for thinning; \$2 for first weeding; \$1.60 for second weeding; 75 cents a ton for topping on fields yielding 10 tons per acre and 60 cents a ton for topping beta in excess of 10 tons per acre. Last year's agreement provided that if the laborer could not make wages on the scale, compensation should be subject to adjustment.

Explaining his statement that there had been no discussion by Idaho growers and laborers of the wage scale for this year, Mr. Dayley said a meeting for this purpose had been called by Mr. Cobbley to be held in Pocatello last Monday, but that directors of the beet growers' association, of whom Mr. Cobbley was unable to attend.

In a subsequent conversation with Mr. Cobbley, Mr. Dayley said he had given to understand that another meeting for consideration of the wage scale will be called to be held in Pocatello early next week. Mr. Cobbley advised, he said, that he was waiting for more word from Washington that might express a preference at this meeting.

Proceedings at Pocatello Representatives of beet field labor who gathered in Pocatello in response to Mr. Cobbley's invitation that was delivered through the Idaho Federation of Labor did not discuss wage scale with the growers' officials.

Mr. Dayley said, because of the latter's refusal to enter into any such discussion at that time.

agitated scale of wages had been agreed upon to be submitted to Mr. Cobbley. The statement, setting forth the suggested wage in detail, was that beet field labor should be paid this year practically the same as for the seasons of 1923-24, which is substantially higher than last year's scale.

The scale asserted to have been agreed upon by labor representatives in Pocatello, Mr. Dayley said, is approximately the same as that demanded by field workers in Colorado and Nebraska, who, according to government figures, have been paid only 64 per cent of their wages for last year's crop. Idaho beet field workers, according to the same source of information, have been paid 99 per cent of their 1934 season's wages.

Announcement of the scale reported to have been agreed upon by labor representatives at Pocatello caused an unfavorable and serious reaction on the part of growers in the Twin Falls district, Mr. Dayley said. A number of the district's representatives who had already signed contracts to grow beets this season stated openly that they would plow up the crop rather than pay such wages.

### First Liberty Loan Called For Payment

WASHINGTON, March 14 (AP)—That \$50 First Liberty loan bond you bought in 1917 to help finance the war will pay you no interest after June 15 and the treasury asked today that you turn it in.

The whole issue, aggregating \$1,623,000,000 has been called by the government for redemption on that date. You may demand cash in the devalued dollars—or exchange it for another interest-bearing bond of the type of which will be announced later.

If it bears one of two titles—First Liberty Loan of 1917 or First Liberty Loan Bond—it is called for payment and holders will receive no interest after June 15, 1935.

### FEDERAL EXPENDITURES IN IDAHO RECOUNTED

W. T. Lockwood of Boise, state director of the national emergency council, and C. D. Thomas, one of Twin Falls first citizens, were speakers at a regular weekly meeting of Twin Falls Kiwanis club at luncheon yesterday.

Discussing the subject, "National Recovery in Idaho," Mr. Lockwood said that the federal emergency agencies operating in this state and declared that "Idaho has had her full share in this program. Lacking some of the federal expenditures in Idaho, he said: AAA has paid Idaho farmers during 1925 over \$8,000,000 on sugar beet, corn-hay and wheat contracts and in purchase of excess cattle and sheep; FCA has provided some \$40,000,000 of credit services; HOLC has loaned over \$5,000,000 to some 3500 Idaho home owners; FHA has created nearly \$4,000,000 of new mortgages; CCC, with 84 camps during the summer and 21 during the winter; "has made substantial contribution toward the state and state income." He asserted that planning and work making for recovery "must continue if this job is to be finished."

Mr. Thomas told of some of the events in Twin Falls early history, including mining that has created irrigation project openings. He was agent for the state land board in the early days of the Twin Falls project. The program included about two vocal numbers by Mrs. Nellie Ostrom.

# DEFICIT IN WATER STORAGE DWINDLES

### Steadily Increasing Inflow Builds Up Supply for Irrigation Needs

A steadily increasing volume of Snake river water flowing into Jackson Lake and American Falls reservoirs to week by week, whitening down the margin of deficit in the accumulated storage under last year's measurements, and building up the water supply for the coming season's irrigation requirements in the Snake river valley.

A late spring, with the water supply already indicated for this season, will assure a satisfactory crop season, John Iron, Twin Falls Canal

company manager, said last evening, made river report for the week ending last Saturday, which was delivered to Twin Falls Canal company yesterday. "Above-normal water flow," he said, "totaling 108,480 acre feet, as against 1,870,140 acre feet last year, a deficit of 61,850 acre feet, four weeks before the deficit year begins now."

"During the week there was stored at Jackson Lake 4850 acre feet, to make a total of 142,920, as against 300,240 acre feet a year ago."

"American Falls storage was increased by 220,000 acre feet during the week to make a total of 625,370, as compared with 1,041,820 acre feet a year ago."

Since March 1, a new snow report issued last Saturday showed, snow depths on the upper Snake river watershed have increased from 4.30 to 13 inches. The comparative figures:

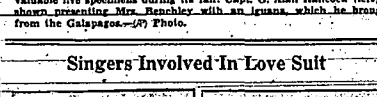


