(By The Associated Press) OSSING, N. Y., March 25—Albert H. Fish, sentenced to die in the electric chair for the slaying of 10-year-old Grace Budd, confessed to night to mutilation and probable murder of three other children and a young man.

He killed two of his victims, the 66-year-old man told Warden George A. Casey of Westchester county jail—but was uncertain whether the other two had died.

Fish told part of his story here from White Plains, where he was sentenced to a 10-year term upon his arrival at Sing Sing prison.

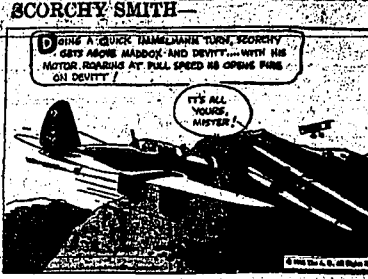

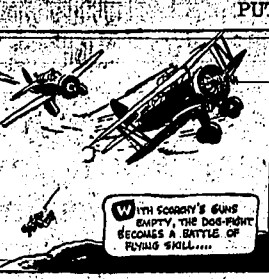

Joe Louis Expects To Stop Ex-Champ Within Five Rounds

20-Year-Old Fighter Working Out for Detroit Bout

DETROIT, March 26 (AP)—Joe Louis, the sensational 20-year-old Negro fighter, isn't a bit worried about his fight with the ex-champion, Antonio Carnera, set for June 19 in New York with Primo Carnera, former world's heavyweight champion.

"It isn't going to last more than five rounds," the "Brown Bomber" grinned today as he looked at the hands which he blasted him a place among the leading contenders for Carnera's crown.

Joe has won 16 fights since turning professional, 13 of them by the knockout route. All are scheduled as 10-round bouts, but the fact that in meeting Carnera he faces the long, 15-round route, isn't causing Louis any concern as he works out for his match here Friday night against Natio Brown, of Washington.

"I don't think those pictures were fairly said," referring to the motion pictures of the bout in which Carnera lost his title to Beer, "but Beer was really trying to put Carnera away before the fight was stopped in the eleventh, and I know I could have stopped him before the fight was over."

Louis has been boxing "back on the feet" here. A crowd of more than 10,000 was gathered to see a fight in Detroit for several years ago, and he has fought several times since that Friday night another crowd of 15,000 is expected.

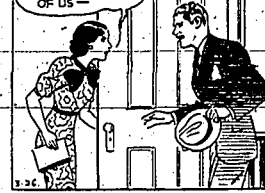
