As Americans see it, both sides have been at fault, and for the same reason—fear.

Germany was getting on rather well with that intelligent diplomacy of Stresemann and high group, winning friends among neutral and disarming old enemies by a policy of frankness and concillation. The Allies were rapidly softening the peace terms, reducing reparations, withdrawing their restraint, taking Germany again into the family of nations relaxing their own defense plans.

Then came Hitler, the Austrian bull in the European china shop, preaching hate and fury. So well has he done his work, within and without Germany, that he has opened old wounds, revived the old enmities, and brought almost the same forces into league against the Fatherland that were leagued twenty years ago venty years ago.

The die of this new war is not yet cast.

Hitler still has a choice. He can still save Europe, Germany and himself—if he will.

AGAINST "PITTSBURGH PLUS"


