HIGH COURT TAKES OVER PROBLEM OF IDAHO REFERENDUM

Suit to Settle Question of Law's Applicability to Retail Sales Tax Gets Under Way at Boise

The Idaho supreme court late today undertook to determine what the state-wide referendum law applies to the new 2 per cent retail sales tax act.

The application for an alternative writ of mandamus was filed by James P. Ashby, Jr., and J. L. Ewell, Boise attorneys, shortly after 3 o'clock—and the supreme court quickly issued the writ which was to be heard by Chief Justice Raymond L. Orin.

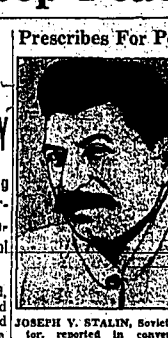

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WATER MEASURE COSTLY TO GROWERS

Pending Legislation Would Take Millions From Northwest

BOISE, March 29 (AP)—Orin Dorman, president of the North Pacific Water Conservancy Assn., said today that northwest wheat farmers stand to lose millions of dollars annually under senate bill 1532 now in congress.

"If the present efforts in congress to regulate water carriers' rates on a basis of mileage and transportation costs and tariffs succeed, the Pacific Northwest farmer and business man will lose millions of dollars annually," Dorman declared.

"The senate bill, he said, proposed to continue railroad rates on the interstate commerce act, and to regulate water carriers' rates on a basis of mileage and transportation costs and tariffs."

"The trouble with railroads," Dorman added, "is over capitalization. Reduces them to a reasonable value and increases their investment and they can prosper."

"If this year's wheat crop in Oregon, Washington and Idaho could be shipped to market at a savings of 2 cents a bushel in transportation cost, the net result would be \$1,200,000 cash money in the hands of wheat farmers of the three states," he added.

Lenten Appetizers

Lend variety to your hours d'ouevres by concocting "Salibout Appetizers," preferably served on one of those attractive platters formed like a fish tail. Remove yolks and mash. ORANGES GO GLORIOUS WITH AID OF MERINGUE

Tempted to buy the big, juicy oranges that you find on the shelves of all local grocery stores this season of the year? Of course you are. But oranges don't forever have to stay in the breakfast class.

Here's how to turn oranges into "prizes." Cut the tops from four oranges, scoop out meat, squeeze juice carefully and strain. Add enough water to juice to make 2 cups. Boil 1/2 cup water and 1/2 cup sugar together for five minutes. Dissolve 1 1/2 teaspoons gelatin in 2 tablespoons cold water. Combine orange-juice, syrup and gelatin.

Pour into the tray of your electric ice box and freeze to mushy stage. Remove to chilled bowl and beat with rotary beater until light and fluffy. Return to tray and finish freezing. Remove all membrane from inside of oranges and soak in cold water until orange ice is frozen. Pile ice in orange shells and place in double-depth tray, until ready to serve. Just before serving make a meringue of 1 egg-white and 1 tablespoon confectioner's sugar. Pile on top of oranges and serve at once. This recipe for Orange Puff serves four.

Any leftover bits of chicken, meat or vegetables can be added to scrambled eggs and served for luncheon or supper.

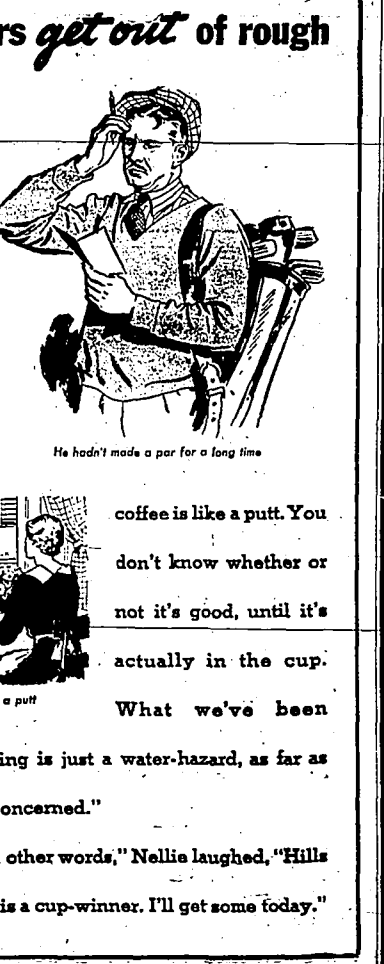

WELL, NOT MUCH OF IT

It would probably be a very good thing for the Johnston forces if the Twin Falls mayoralty campaign were to be conducted without criticism of any kind.

To picture Sweet, Landon and Hedstrom as a set of puppets, the victims of a designing group of discredited politicians, perhaps comes the closest to an indulgence in personalities of any public reference in the campaign.

But singing? Well, not very much of it. But, we repeat, the Twin Falls News is opposed to Mayor Johnston and all his works.

SOUND REVIVAL

One of the most cheerful statements lately on business conditions is the mid-month report of Dun and Bradstreet.

"Proofs are multiplying that the gloomy views held in some quarters have not been wholly warranted in the light of current reassuring developments.

"A less interrupted expansion during the next six months appears in prospect for the distributive branches. Instead of having passed the season's peak, new highs are indicated for many industrial divisions before spring runs will have been completed."

One of the most reassuring facts is a revival in farm purchasing power, as shown by an increase of 60 to 60 per cent in the sales of tractors and power machinery.

Alongside of this seasonal report may be placed the conclusion of a broad study made by W. M. Kiplinger and Frederick Shelton, Washington economists and business advisers.

THRIFTY BUILDING

A curious thing has been happening at the New England town meetings this spring. Thrifty Yankee communities which have always given their officials little chance to go in for reckless spending are this year authorizing appropriations for new school houses and other public building projects.

It may be a sudden outburst of extravagance, although that seems out of character with long established New England levelheadedness. It is more likely the result of a shrewd eye for a bargain.

"Perhaps the attitude is to be deplored as a sign of weakening character. Or is it just a modern manifestation of true thrift? The answer can be determined better a few years from now."

WASHINGTON "ECONOMY"

Members of the House today took the first step in an effort to effect tax economy. A referendum measure was enacted that limits the total tax levy on real estate to 40 mills.

The limitation sharply curtails the burden that can be put on real property, but it has forced the legislature to provide other means of revenue.

It is rather difficult to reconcile the two situations. The popular vote on the 40-mill tax limitation probably exemplifies the temper of the average taxpayer.

The Washington plan, at any event, recognizes that the big end of the tax burden is in local government. The point is that local government throughout the nation, especially that of counties, is too decentralized.

THE BEANCE IN AN AIRPLANE

They have banded together in great co-operative organizations, whose purpose is to make production and distributing machinery more efficient, and to increase agriculture's bargaining power.
