SUPREME COURT STUDIES HOSIERY

Demonstration in Patent Suit Amuses Members of High Tribunal

WASHINGTON, April 4 (AP)—An attractive, dark-haired girl held the attention of the dignified justices of the supreme court this afternoon while she demonstrated a new hosiery.

Her long lashes drooping demurely, Miss Betty Blue of Chardon, Virginia, showed Chief Justice Hughes and his smiling associates how hosiery which could be de-stained as "very delicate" to meticulous femininity—can be made to disappear in somewhat less than a lift.

Earlier, each justice had been supplied with (A) one magnetic needle, (B) one porcelain egg-holder, and (C) one—staining—white—caused them no little amusement.

In fact, Justice McReynolds, a bachelor, peddled a stocking up full length at the bar—after he had discovered what it was.

Surprise Promised in Hitler's Offer

Berlin Officials Say Germany Will Accept Present Boundaries

Berlin, April 4 (AP)—Official sources said tonight Adolf Hitler would accept the three-power conference at Stresa next week with an offer to accept Germany's present boundaries for at least ten years.

The offer, which has been kept secret, will be made through Sir John Simon, British foreign secretary, who already has Dr. Fuhrer's proposals in black and white.

A non-aggression pact was also proposed, but it was not to be in the form of a non-aggression pact which Hitler offered as a substitute for the proposed non-aggression pact.

2. Non-interference with internal boundaries.

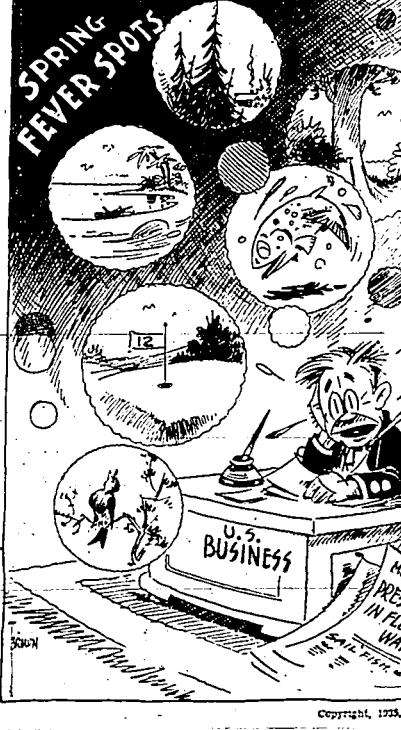
None of the principals was in court when the jury's sealed order, based on two hours and 22 minutes of deliberation, was opened. The writer and his current spouse were reported en route to California but their attorney, Earle Ewins, entered a motion for a new trial. It will be heard April 13.

There was little question of ability to pay. Bedford-Jones testified during the trial he produced about 1,000,000 words of adventure stories a year with publishers paying of \$10 to 15 cents a word. His second wife was the widow of a reportedly wealthy Evansville, Ind., manufacturer. But the suit contained a "malice count" on the allegation of deliberate love piracy, and non-payment could entail a life month jail sentence for the defendant.

The first Mrs. Bedford-Jones complained from the witness stand that the author deserted her in 1928 and married Mrs. Bernard in 1929 after she had given him the "best years of her life."

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SHERIFF AND MINER KILLED IN BLOODY NEW MEXICO CLASH

Eviction of Jobless Workers From Dwelling Leads to Fierce Street Riot of More Than 300 Persons

(By The Associated Press) GALLUP, N. M., April 4—A sheriff and a jobless miner were shot dead and a woman bystander and six others were wounded in this town today when resentment aroused by the eviction of an unemployed worker from a dwelling flamed into a fierce street riot of more than 300 persons.

The work which touched off the bloody clash in the downtown district was a court hearing, for a trio of unemployed, including the evicted man, who were accused forcibly restoring his household goods to the sheriff.

The riot: Sheriff M. R. Carmichael, Ignacio "Ben" Valencia, 37, jobless and a World War veteran.

Solomon L. Esquebil, 37, former miner, shot through leg.

Deputy Sheriff Edson L. Goback, 31, shot through arm.

Borasio Moreno, 45, miner, shot through leg.

Juan Galdo, 31, shot through shoulder.

Mrs. Celestina Sanchez, 21, innocent onlooker, shot in right leg.

Andrews, 45, miner, shot in knee.

Crowd Attacks Officers Officers removing their prisoners from a preliminary hearing before a judge in the Esquebil case by a howling crowd as they emerged into an alley from the court.

Deputy Sheriff D. W. Roberts said when the crowd broke into the alley, he saw Sheriff Carmichael in the head he whipped out a pistol and fired on the crowd.

There were two separate and distinct lines of firing said Roberts, one on the Esquebil case and the other on the crowd.

While the casualties were being treated in the nearby office of the Esquebil case, the crowd was firing on the motor patrol force of ten men, which was racing toward Gallup from the capital at Santa Fe, about 300 miles distant.

Veterans Disperse Mob The unemployed dispersed their ranks, Roberts said, on the outskirts of the city by the aid of officers reinforced by 125 war veterans and "other good men" sworn in as special deputies. Farmers In Kansas Rap U.S. Anti-Dust Program

KANSAS CITY, April 4 (AP)—Opposition to the federal anti-dust program flared today among farmers in the eastern Kansas.

In listing to prevent soil-blowing, deep, wide furrows are plowed across a field-making a series of alternate ridges and ditches at cross angles to the direction of prevailing winds.

The possibility the state might invoke compulsory control was rejected to have aroused some resentment at Stockton. Attorney General Clarence V. Beck called attention of county attorneys to a law permitting exonerations in small and counties to order soil blowing control steps and assess the cost.

EDUCATOR INDICTED ON MORALS CHARGE

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., April 4 (AP)—Police Captain John J. Canney tonight announced the arrest of Prof. Henry Wadsworth Longfellow Dana, 33, grandson of the poet, on a morals charge.

Dana, also a grandson of Richard Henry Dana, author of "Two Years Before the Mast," is an authority on the Russian drama and a champion of the rights of the colored.

Dana announced he would read the play in a public hall but was prevented by police. Later he read portions of the banned drama in a private home to a small audience.

National Defense Budgets Near Peace Time Records

WASHINGTON, April 4 (AP)—Eighteen years after the World War, a comparison of the national defense budgets for the United States and Great Britain, the two great English speaking nations involved, today showed that both are near peace time records.

Although legislative action has yet to be completed in either country, government estimates virtually sure to be approved or exceeded placed the projected expenditures for military and naval establishments for the coming year as follows:

The United States, more than \$800,000,000; Great Britain more than \$480,000,000.

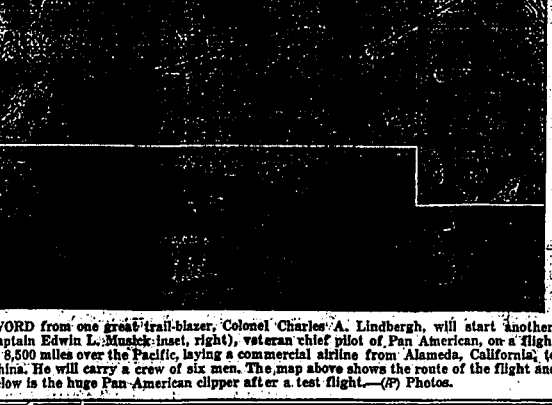

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PUBLIC HEALTH IN IDAHO

If, as claimed by Dr. Charles R. Scott, President of the State Medical Association, sewage from the State insane asylum at Blackfoot is now passing into Snake River and being distributed throughout the water supply of the farmers and others who use the water, the fact constitutes a menace to public health which should be abated forthwith no matter what the cost.

Apparently the trouble is due to an inadequate water supply at the asylum. Tolls are imperfectly flushed, and sanitation is interfered with. Typhoid and other germs are turned loose to contaminate the waters of the Snake and as a result a potential source of infection is steadily in operation.

For a number of years past very little attention has been paid to the matter of public health by the State of Idaho. Time was when an efficient health service with a physician in charge was maintained but, apparently in an effort to reduce operating costs, the medical end of the department was dispensed with and a sort of skeleton organization substituted.

It is the duty of the State to take every reasonable precaution for the preservation of public health and particularly in respect of those unfortunate inmates of State institutions who are compelled through no fault of their own to depend upon the State for protection. The position of Idaho in this respect in comparison to other States is not an enviable one.

RELEVANT ORATORY

A startling possibility is revealed by Senator Glass of Virginia. He said the other day that he would insist on the committee reporting out his resolution to change Senate rules so as to confine debate to "relevant" remarks when considering appropriation bills.

Senator Glass is known as a man who generally means what he says. It is evident, then, that a fight is coming. For if there is any right regarded by the typical senator as inalienable, it is the right to talk without limit on any matter under the sun, regardless of what may be technically before the Senate at the time.

This move is said to be directed especially at Senator Long. If that statesman, by his excessive abuse of "senatorial privilege," drives the most irrelevant deliberative body on earth to adopt businesslike procedure, he will have performed a noble service for his country.

THE WAY IT WORKS

One concrete result of the Government's policy of destroying livestock as a means of eliminating surpluses is to be found in the action of the Oregon State Board of Control which, due to a mounting shortage of meats, has recommended that State institutions cut down on the use of meats and substitute fish and vegetables.

Meat prices can only go so high before the consumer begins to look about for substitutes. It is unusual however for a State to take the initiative in such a movement. Higher prices for the product of both farm and range are going to be absolutely necessary if prosperity is to be reestablished but to deplete existing stocks to a point where transportation from abroad is necessary in

order that famine may be avoided seems to be carrying the programme a little too far. Nobody will be helped if a point is reached where the stock man has neither cattle or hogs to sell.

MORE TAXES—HIGHER TAXES

The increasing gravity of the tax problem is well illustrated in a recent survey made by the national industrial conference board. During the past four years, according to its findings, the public debt has increased at a more rapid rate than at any time in our history, save the two war years. It is now \$10,000,000,000, state and local in excess of \$7,000,000,000.

Total tax collections, on the other hand, are at a lower level. In 1928, in spite of the numerous new taxes created by government in the years since then. Most of the money now being spent by government does not come out of its income, but is represented by borrowings against the future.

THE REFERENDUM AND THE EMERGENCY

We never did believe in the Referendum as a cure for bad laws. The citizenry is entitled to take the medicine a legislature mixes for it as punishment for electing the kind of legislature it did. When it gets a dose it doesn't like, as Idaho has just now, it ought to have to take it. But having the Referendum, and since we have it, it ought to be able to save us from the "Explosion of the Poor-for-the-benefit-of-the-rich, foisted upon us by a weak-kneed legislator at the demand of an administration greedy for more money to spend. If the emergency clause in the law puts it above the Referendum, then we might just as well have the Referendum. When the Referendum was enacted, it certainly was not the intention that any legislative enactment should be outside its operation.

YOU HAVE A RIGHT TO YOUR IDEA, TOO

In most controversial subjects it is possible to see some good in both sides, but in the case of the state sales tax careful study and consideration have failed to yield any redeeming features for the affirmative. On only one ground could it be termed the success, that being in its potentiality for making people pay till it hurts for relief purposes.

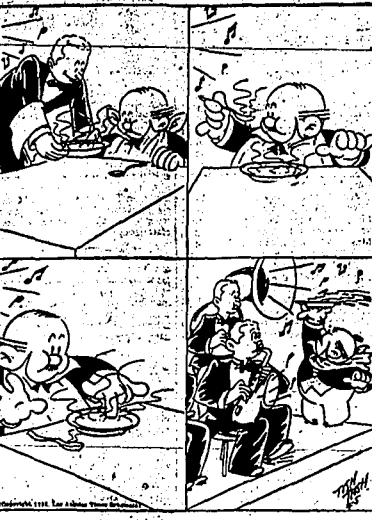

### BRITAIN, FRANCE MAP PLANS FOR PEACE IN EUROPE

(Continued From Page One)

French proposals would seek British and Italian support in an effort to "brighten" the remaining reach, falling which France would try to link Russia and Czechoslovakia in mutual assistance pacts.

A high official of the German foreign office reiterated that nation's dislike for "vague collective systems" indicating the right's part, and that the German government would accept no agreements with precise obligations, the period of which would be strictly limited.

Transfer of thousands of German policemen to the new German "conscript" army, served to make "pressure" of Germany's rearmament, Austria, which yesterday took her first step back along the road to increased armament, was considering the form the new organization shall take.

Vienna Gives Assurance  
British fears expressed yesterday that Austrian rearmament might further complicate matters at Geneva were met with assurance from Vienna that no formal move will be taken to have the re-power conference consider the question.

A report from Addis Ababa, credited to authoritative sources, that Ethiopia is moving to form an army equipped with troops close to Italian colonies in what the government said was a "precautionary" move, emphasized the continuing tension in Africa.

The impression in official quarters here was that Captain Eden's conversations in Praha were "fruitful" and probably advanced the cause of eastern security.

The reference in the official communication released in the Czechoslovak capital to the identity of the two governments' views relative to the League of Nations came shortly after diplomatic quarters here expressed the opinion that the British would seek to compose differences over France's appeal to the league against German rearmament.

France Plans Alliance  
A proposal for a treaty and Great Britain join forces to "brighten" the remaining reach, falling under consideration in Praha yesterday as Europe's attention focused on the tri-powered conference at Geneva, April 11.

Foreign Minister Pierre Laval, the Paris reports said, will seek mutual assistance pacts with Russia and Czechoslovakia if Great Britain fail to fall in with his plan.

The British cabinet availed Captain Anthony Eden's statement today that British will be ready tomorrow, to draft compromise proposals Foreign Secretary Blomfield will present.

Eden, after extraordinarily brief and cordial conversations with Czechoslovak statesmen at Praha, was "impressed" with his arrival at Cologne.

Authoritative sources at Addis Ababa meanwhile, said an Ethiopian army numbering 100,000 men, well equipped, was moving to the borders of the Italian colonies in Ethiopia.

A Havas (French) news agency report to Paris from Kaunas, Lithuania, said Germany had protested German-German manufacturing in Lithuania was received with acceptance in Berlin, where the propaganda ministry and diplomatic quarters professed ignorance of any such step.

LONDON—Eden was expected to confer with part of the cabinet soon after his arrival about mid-day. BREAK—Foreign Minister Besset's luncheon for Eden was marked by the Briton's assertion that his continental tour had as its object the maintenance of peace. An official communiqué said the conference was in complete accord on that principle.

PARIS—French officials said Laval's proposals would virtually pledge adherence to his plan of armed aid against any aggressor. BERLIN—A foreign office spokesman reiterated Germany's disinclination to join any complicated security pact.

VIENNA—Austria's decision to increase her army will not be submitted to the Geneva conference, an Austrian government spokesman said, as the cabinet considered ways of carrying out the rearmament program.

ADDIS ABABA—The Ethiopian government emphasized that the dispatch of troops to the Italian frontier was purely "precautionary." BERNE—The federal council gave new evidence of its determination to exhaust every possibility of diplomatic action to force Germany to return to an anti-Nazi standpoint on Swiss soil. Indications were that recourse might be had to the Geneva-Swiss arbitration treaty.

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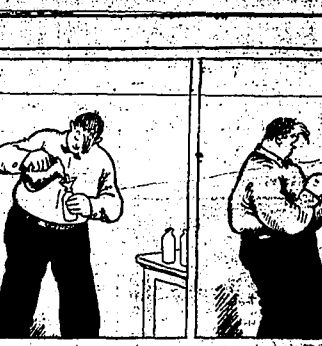

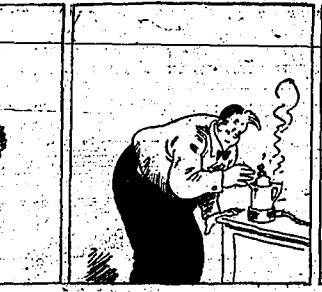

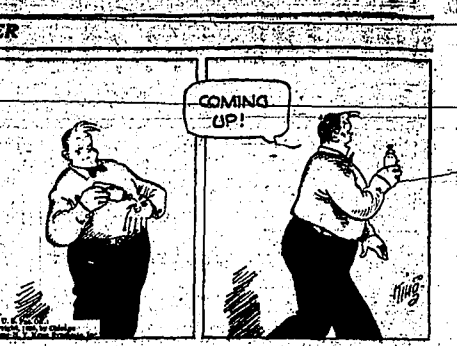

**SNOWFALL SHOWERS BRIGHTEN OUTLOOK**

Canal Operators Find Encouragement in Recent Weather

Never too optimistic over water prospects, Twin Falls Canal company officials who are responsible for distribution of the irrigation water supply for approximately 200,000 acres, found encouragement yesterday in a series of showers that brought .10 inch of precipitation before midnight, and in a new and favorable report on snow and storage conditions at Snake river headwaters and reservoirs.

A continuation of showers during the month of April from Twin Falls Canal company manager, said, will keep the soil in shape so that irrigation will not be necessary before planting crops, thus making possible a considerable conservation of water, and getting the new crops off to a favorable start.

Rains this week according to reports gathered by canal officials, have been general throughout southern Idaho. Water control on the Salmon river project yesterday that, barring unfavorable later conditions, there is sufficient moisture in the soil to bring up this season's crop.

Snow Depth Increase Heavy storms the last few days in March increased snow depths at Snake river headwaters to 95 per cent normal, according to report by Lynn Grandall, Snake river watermaster.

American Falls reservoir storage increased during the week by 21,700 acre feet, making a total of 728,830, against 1,440,495 acre feet a year ago.

Water Prospects Better BOISE, April 4 (AP)—Prospects for irrigation purposes "are better than they were at this time last year."

John G. Carter, meteorologist of the United States weather bureau, said here today.

"The storm which has brought the Boise valley approximately 50 per cent of an inch of rainfall during the past 24 hours was more or less general over the state," Carter commented.

"He noted that in Boise only 46 of an inch of precipitation was recorded during the entire month of April last year as compared with the nearly 50 of an inch that has descended here during the past 24 hours."
