



### DEFENDERS PUSHES SALES TAX SET-UP

#### Finance Commissioner Convinced Court Will Not Upset New Law

BOISE, April 5.—Confident that possible litigation under the referendum law will not be decided by the Idaho supreme court to interfere with operations of the 3 percent retail sales tax law, Ben Defendorf, commissioner of finance and administrator of the act, proceeded today to complete the setup for the collection of the revenue, according to the state under the act.

It will be necessary for approximately 20,000 business organizations to purchase \$2 licenses, he said, and these will submit their collections under the sales tax law to the department at the end of each month, beginning May 1.

#### More Help Needed

He said it will be necessary for him to employ five or six more clerical workers to take care of the collections and that they will be chosen from among 100 applicants that have written to him for jobs.

"We will soon have 100,000 forms ready for use in submitting collections to us," he said, "but first we must see to it that those who are responsible for collecting the tax obtain their licenses, 25,000 of which now are in the process of printing."

COMMODITY-DOLLAR LEASES: We do not seem to be getting far along the road to the "commodity dollar," of which there was much talk a year or two ago, but there is some progress in that direction.

It is specified that payment from time to time is to be made not in a fixed number of dollars agreed on beforehand, in the usual way, but in whatever number of dollars will buy, at the time of payment, the food, clothing, transportation, housing, and so on, that the basic price would have bought at the time the lease was signed.

When the same principle is written into a loan or mortgage agreement, as it is occasionally, it means that the lender will always get back the same buying power that he lent.

HUEY'S PINK SLIP: It was an embarrassing moment when, in the course of a debate in the United States Senate on the "pink slip" repeal bill, and while Senator Long was opposing the "suppression of tax returns," another senator asked him how much he had made last year.

As it was, he merely blinked and replied that he had made \$25,000. Then, when the inquisitive colleague asked what he did with the money, he said he "spent it on brass bands, football games and drinks for his friends."

That statement may or may not have been meant facetiously. The Louisiana senator certainly did spend considerable money on brass bands and football games.

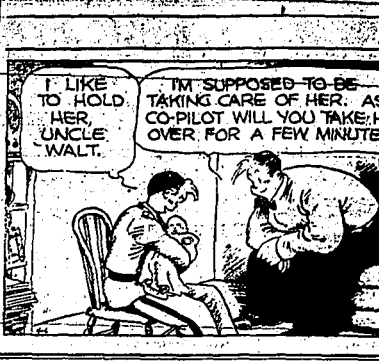

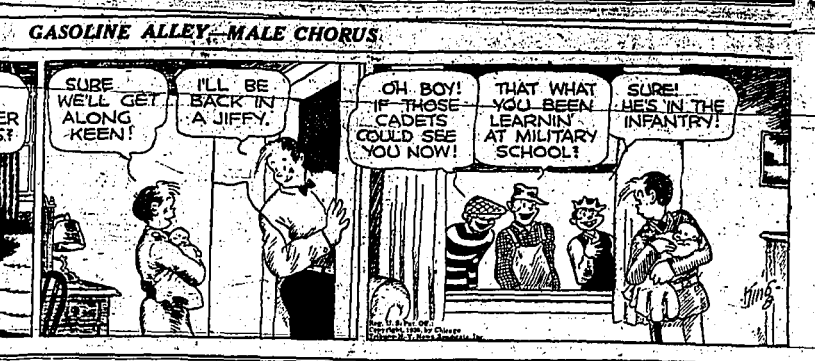

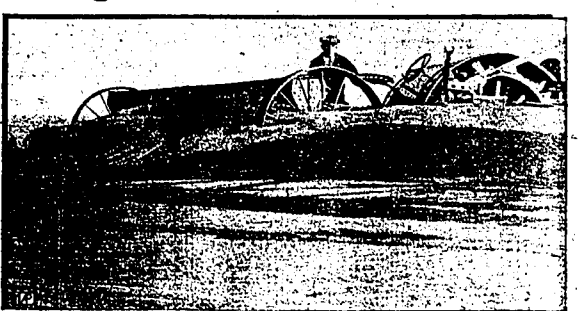
