

SCATTERED STORMS AND FLOODS CAUSE EXTENSIVE DAMAGE

Lower Mississippi Valley Menaced, Gale Batters East Coast, and Dust Clouds Cover Southwest

(By The Associated Press) The elements cracked down on several parts of the nation Tuesday, causing widespread damage.

A northeastern gale battered the eastern seaboard, floods plagued California and menaced the lower Mississippi valley, dust storms raged through the Southwest.

Many vessels were caught in a flow on the North Atlantic. Summer homes along the Long Island and Jersey coasts were jeopardized by pounding seas, sleet and chilling rain.

Dust Blows Traffic. Silt clouds rolling across western Kansas and northwestern Oklahoma cut visibility to 100 yards and forced many highway travelers to postpone their journeys.

Red Cross Issues Appeal. A flood of appeals came in from northern Mississippi and Louisiana where 29 persons died and much property damage resulted from a week-end tornado.

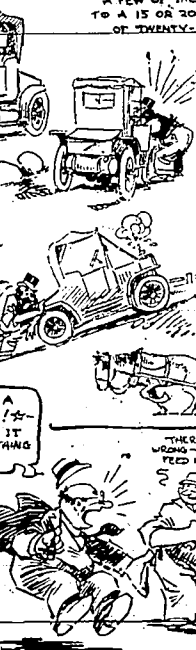

HOUSE APPROVES BILL TO OUTLAW WAR PROFITTEERS

Strengthened Through Efforts of Bloc of Youthful Independents, Measure Scores Sweeping Victory

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, April 9—A bill to forbid war time profiteering, strengthened and vigorized through the persistent efforts of a bloc of youthful independents, today received the overwhelming approval of the house.

They were concerned in resolutions authorizing the president to restrict the issuance of passports to nationals seeking to enter war zones and clamping restrictions on loans by citizens of this country to belligerent nations.

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GOVERNOR DEFENDS WAGE POLICY

Purpose to Encourage Men on Relief Rolls to Seek Other Jobs

BOISE, April 9 (AP)—Governor Ross today defended the policy of the Idaho Emergency Relief administration, of which he is the chief officer, in permitting the citizens' committee in each county to fix the wages to be paid to persons on relief rolls.

Criticism of such a policy has been made by some employers, who contend that they are being treated unfairly by the wage-fixing committees were holding wages down.

"Conditions in one county may vary greatly from those existing in another, particularly when viewed from industrial and agricultural aspects," he said.

"It is therefore a matter of sound reasoning to permit the people of these counties, through the medium of the county relief committees, to solve their individual problems in their respective counties."

Citing some instances which bear out his contentions, he said, the governor referred various county boards and the wage scales already set up.

Stormy Session

"In a stormy session of the various local citizens' committees, a south county," he recalled, "it was finally decided to lower the wage paid for labor from 50 cents an hour to 40 cents an hour for unskilled, and from 60 cents to 70 cents an hour for skilled labor. At about the same time, the various representatives of the citizens' committees were meeting in a northern county to discuss labor employed on the relief project. In the one county referred to, agriculture predominated, and the relief labor was heavy percentage of industrial casualties—men formerly employed in the timber camps and sawmills."

Not Competitive Yardstick

"Our relief officials endeavor to emphasize the fact that relief wages paid on any project are not to be used as a competitive yardstick."

"It is the desire of the Idaho Emergency Relief administration that those on relief seek other employment. It is the desire of the agricultural sections many of the farmers feel that relief wages have been so high as to prevent the workers from seeking employment in the fields. Where such feeling has been expressed, the county relief boards are cooperating with farmers in making wage scale adjustments."

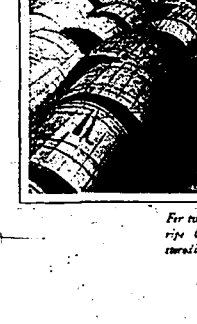

NEW DAIRY CHIEF NAMED BY BOARD

D. R. Theophilus Heads University Department Succeeding F. W. Atkeson

BOISE, April 9 (AP)—With J. J. Jenney of Cottonwood for the past three months' state senator, from the Board of Education, the governing body of Idaho's major educational institutions, met this afternoon to consider budgetary and University of Idaho faculty matters.

Professor D. R. Theophilus, associate professor at the Moscow institution, in charge of dairy manufacturing work since 1927, was promoted to head the dairy department of the state college, succeeding F. W. Atkeson, who recently resigned to become the head of the dairy department of Kansas state college. Superintendent of Public Instruction John W. Condit announced tonight.

D. L. Four, extension specialist in dairying, was advanced to the professorship of dairy husbandry.

Ivan H. Loughery, who has been the western field representative for the American Jersey Cattle club since 1924, was named to succeed F. W. Atkeson.

Theophilus will be dairy husbandry and four associate dairy husbandman with the experiment station, Mr. Condit said.

The promotions are effective July 1. Loughery will join the staff August 1.

The new head of the university dairy department has the advantage of training and experience both in production and manufacturing phases of dairying," Mr. Condit commented.

He had his collegiate work at Iowa State college and at the University of Idaho.

During the next three days the board will complete the task of fixing salaries for employees of educational institutions, appoint an auditor for the State Department of Education and transact other business.

SANTA FE, N. M., April 9 (AP)—Preliminary hearing for 54 persons charged with murder in the first degree as a result of last Thursday's riot at Gallup will be held there Thursday or Friday as a result of a ruling yesterday by Judge Mr. A. Otero, Jr.

Defendants will include 22 men and one woman held in the county penitentiary here for safe keeping; nine men held in jail at Gallup; four men and one woman in a Gallup hospital and seven women in liberty there under their own recognizance.

Arrangements for the preliminary hearing for all persons arrested in connection with the clash in which Sheriff M. R. ROTHENBURG Will—Deposit Money in Any Bank Hoffmann Names, Promoter's Representative Declares

BY BOB CAVANAGH (Associated Press Sports Writer) NEW YORK, April 9 (AP)—A contract offering Max Baer \$300,000 for a heavyweight title defense against Max Schmeling in Europe August 17 arrived in this country today with Charlie Harvey, veteran fighter manager, who is representing Walter Rothenburg, German promoter.

"The title of the prospective bout has not been determined," said Harvey, but London, Rome and Vienna are possibilities, with Rome apparently the most likely. The German promoter as a "second Th. Ricard," with an equally expansive imagination and "the money to back it up."

"On the line," he said displaying a legal looking document, "I have been determined to offer to Axel Hoffman, Baer's manager. I understand Hoffman is interested in having the money put in the bank." This offer, Rothenburg said, as well as his talks and he'll deposit the money in any bank Hoffman names just as he pleased. He'll get \$25,000 for the Schmeling match in Baer's appearance in Europe before July 17—one month before the fight—and also stipulates the heavyweight title shall not change in any fight between July 1 and August 17.

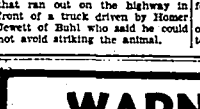

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn., April 9 (AP)—Home folk, silently passing the flower-banking of a day, today joined newspaper leaders of the world in paying tribute to him.

Mr. Ochs died yesterday from a cerebral hemorrhage. He was 72 years old.

The body of the publisher lay in state at the Julius and Bertha Ochs memorial temple. A guard of honor from the Masonic Jewish congregation stood watch.

Outside the temple, erected by Mr. Ochs to the memory of his parents, funeral services will be held at the temple tomorrow morning. The body then will be placed aboard a train for New York for final rites and burial, planned Friday.

Rabbi Abraham Steinthal will conduct the Chattanooga services, assisted by Dr. T. S. McCallie, pastor of the Central Presbyterian church.

Mayor E. D. Bass proclaimed a proclamation asking business houses to close during the hours of the funeral. It read:

"Chattanooga mourns the loss of one of her greatest sons—Adolph Ochs—today."

"His passing has brought a great weight of sorrow to the hearts of our people. We are sad because we have lost our best friend."

"It is peculiarly fitting therefore, that the people of this city, who honor and cherish him, should pay appropriate respect to his memory."

"Therefore, I, E. D. Bass, mayor of the city of Chattanooga, earnestly ask our people that where possible business be suspended during the hour appointed for the funeral of Mr. Ochs at 9:30 Wednesday morning."

Banks also will close for the funeral.

CONTROL OF LIQUOR PRODUCTION LIFTED

FACA Suddenly Reverses Policy of Attempting to Limit Output

WASHINGTON, April 9 (AP)—Complaints of a "Whiskey Trust" and protests from states which have joined repeal, rankled today caused the Federal Alcohol Control Administration to relax attempts to control liquor production.

Suddenly reversing its policy of attempting to limit liquor making to estimated consumption, FACA with President Roosevelt's approval, amended the distilled spirits code to allow present permit holders to increase the capacity of their plants.

New Permits Granted.
The modification also provide for new permits to plants with a capacity of 1,000 gallons or more a day, or smaller plants producing solely brandy or certain special types of distilled spirits.

The changes in the code, established under the Recovery act, followed a conference with distillers at which production restriction was sharply criticized.

States which repealed prohibition after FACA assumed control 18 months ago said limitation on output was particularly unfair to them.

Chairman Joseph H. Choate, Jr. of FACA said the former regulations "operated unfairly by preventing distillers of states which have recently become wet from entering the industry."

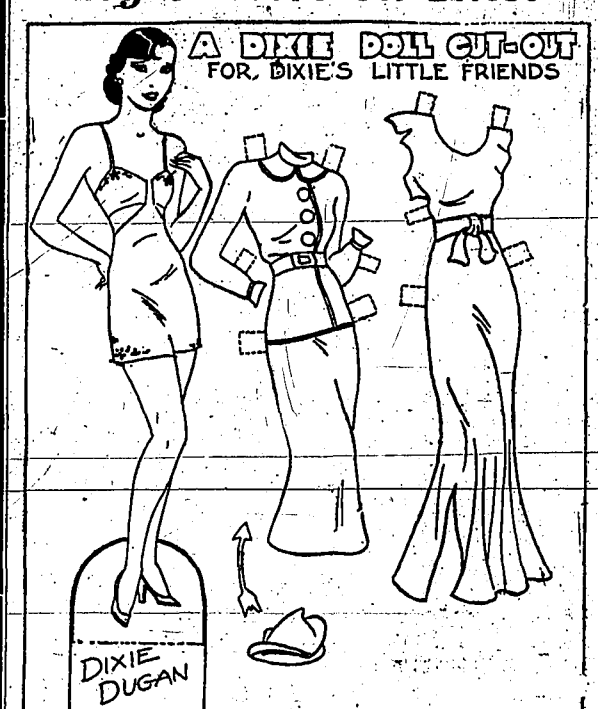

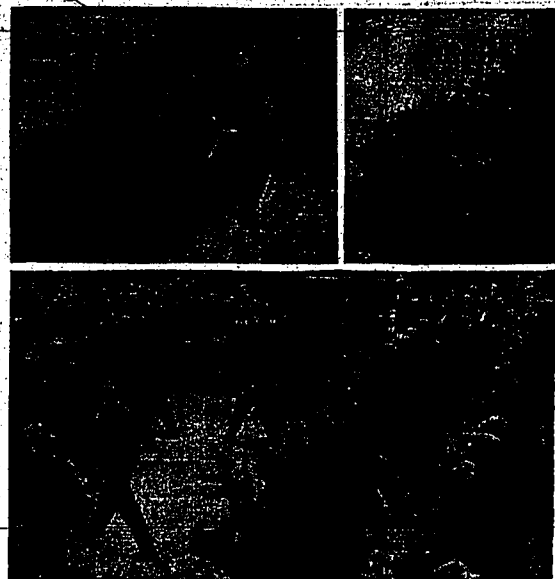

Super-Double Nasturtium Joins Elite Flower Ranks

DOYLESTOWN, Pa. (AP)—A group of men are spending most of their time around a Kansas project, what in a local greenhouse. The plant is a nasturtium, which means "nose-twister" and was once a flower looked down upon by snooty gardeners.

Last season the owner of the highly guarded plant introduced to botanists and others a double nasturtium, which he had put through three generations in the greenhouse by use of planes, to send seeds to South America, and other foreign parts.

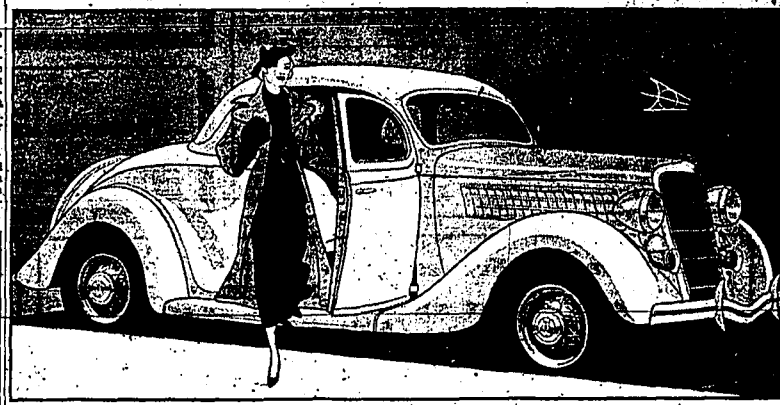
