Approximately 300 Party Followers Gather for Session; Harry Barry Elected New President

Idaho's democracy was on parade at the twenty-third annual Twin Falls County Jefferson club banquet, attended by approximately 300 persons at Radolind in Twin Falls last evening.

All elective state officials, with the exception of Governor and Senator Ross and State Superintendent John Condit, were in attendance and spoke briefly. A good share of appointive officials and county officers throughout the state were also present.

Harry W. Barry, Twin Falls county president of the club for the coming year to succeed Pat Daly, Twin Falls, was opposed for the office by R. S. Toffelmire, Twin Falls publisher. The meeting decided that Barry would be allowed to select his own secretary for the club and be appointed Jay Cox, Buhl, John B. Robertson, Twin Falls, was the outgoing secretary and the official was named to succeed R. G. Wilson, Kimberly.

Wild Mare Falls To Death During Rescue Attempts

LOS ANGELES, April 15 (AP)—A wild mare that Saturday fell into the Monica canyon on a narrow ledge 300 feet above the canyon floor tumbled today from her precarious perch to death as rescuers attempted to bring food and water to the animal.

"Buddy" Baker, well known polo player, discovered the plight of the horse, and "Buddy" Stirling, club foreman on the ranch of Will Rogers, motion picture actor, led the rescue group. A stallion stood on the lip of the canyon and whinnied for the mare, stallion charging the group of men attempting to save the mare, but did not attack them.

Stirling climbed down the sides of the canyon at considerable risk to determine for certain the mare was dead. "These horses were about the most pitiful sight I ever saw. They are Mexican horses. They probably were imported here for rodeo, and either because of the party attempted to roam the hills," said Baker.

F. D. R. ENDORSES NEW BONUS BILL

Administration to Approve Compromise, Spokesman Reports

WASHINGTON, April 15 (AP)—White House leaders sought carefully today to gloss the new bonus program away from liberalizing amendments, senate spokesmen reported, administration would approve a compromise on the bonus.

Chairman Harrison of the senate finance committee announced that he would introduce a bonus bill tomorrow, and added that its terms would be satisfactory to Roosevelt. His provisions remained undisclosed but predictions were that it would go as far as his bonus bill would permit immediate cash payment.

House chiefs were busier marshalling votes today than they were listening to debate on the security bill. Administration followers still professed confidence they could pass the measure to change the measure in any substantial way. Among the president's long list of cabinet appointments, the department of agriculture within forming an unofficial steering committee. ANTI-NAZI RIOTS STAGED BY POLES IN DISPUTED AREA

Homes of Germans Attacked in Polish Corridor; Shouts of 'Throw the Dogs Out' Heard During Disorders

(By The Associated Press) WARSAW, April 15—Anti-German violence in the former German territory known as the Polish corridor was reported today from towns near Gdynia, where rocks were hurled at German homes, shattering windows, and Germans were attacked.

Reports said strong Polish antagonism over Nazi attempts to award German citizenship to former German army men living in Poland brought about the disturbances. Behind it, it was pointed out, lies 1,000 years of enmity between the Poles and Germans along the Baltic coast where Poland now holds the provinces of Pomorze and Foznan, given to her under the Versailles treaty to afford access to the sea. The territory cuts off east-Prussia from the rest of Germany and has been a sore spot in continental relations ever since the war.

The most severe disorders were in Wetzrowo and Kact, both near Gdynia. Several Germans were attacked in Gdynia itself and the windows of German houses shattered. Reports reaching Berlin said a mob threw cobblestones through the windows of scores of German homes and business houses in Wetzrowo, a city of 10,000 in Pomorze.

The riots were said to have started Saturday and reached a climax Sunday night when a yelling throng invaded the streets and threatened the German population, who barricaded themselves from attack. Reports said a city official led the demonstration after addressing an anti-German demonstration where shouts of "down with the Germans" and "throw the dogs out" were heard. Police intervened. There were no reports of casualties.

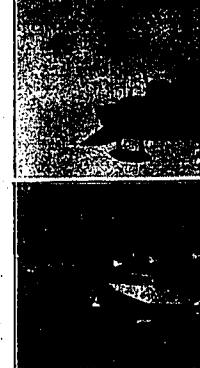

Springs Wheat Unplanned This area blankets the principal wheat producing section of the country. The report said that "the cumulative effect of several years of drouth in this area have resulted in such dry conditions that winter wheat prospects are extremely poor. Pasture conditions were reported to be the lowest on record and much spring wheat will be unplanned for lack of water."

The bureau denied, however, that extensive crop damage had resulted from dust storms, declaring "while there has been considerable damage to the area affected, the loss of crops from this cause from a national standpoint is relatively unimportant."

The report said spring sowing had been delayed for lack of moisture from the dust storms. The bureau said that the situation in Wyoming southward with moisture sufficient in the Dakotas and Montana for the winter wheat crop.

Unless rains fall soon in the southern part of the drouth belt, the bureau said, "the usual date of seeding small grains will be past and feed and supplies next winter will depend largely upon growing conditions for corn and sorghums."

Southern Colorado, Utah, Part Of Idaho Caught In Widening Dust Storm Area

DUST CLOUDS BRING DARKNESS TO UTAH; HALT PLANES, CARS

Airliner Turned Back to Salt Lake Field Where Wind Razes Hangar Wall; Auto Travel Interrupted

(By The Associated Press) SALT LAKE CITY, April 15—Heavy dust, borne on a 45-mile wind, today halted airplane and automobile travel near Grantsville, Utah, sited into homes and buildings and caused street lights to be turned on during daylight hours.

At a depth of two inches was deposited on Grantsville streets and fields, white residents here yet felt eyes over doors and windows and covered their faces with cloths. Once the darkness became so great that Miss Mary Brim, the town's assistant postmaster, was forced to suspend sorting of the mail. She said that even though she had the post office turned on, addresses were unrecognizable.

Dust Storm Lifts House At Heyburn From Foundations

BURLEY, April 15—Leaving a path of devastation in its wake, a near tornado in the form of a dust storm and lightning barrage descended upon Cassia and Minidoka counties this afternoon with the result of two horses killed, one two-story house bounced from its foundation, one man wounded and numerous telephone poles and trees uprooted.

The storm struck at Del Wilcox, who is plotting to build a bank here near Starva Ferry. Without warning a lightning bolt struck, killing his horses instantly and knocking him to the ground. He was taken to his home where he was recovering from considerable shock tonight.

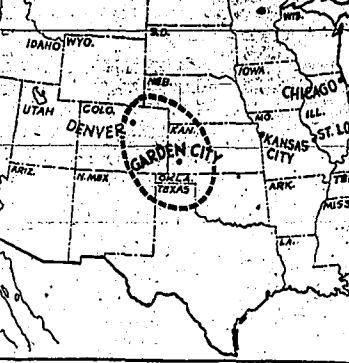
