WOMAN DESCRIBES NEW MEXICO RIOT

Eye Witness' Story of
Shooting Mob Comes
Out at Hearing

SANTA FE, April 17 (AP)—A surging, shooting mob was described here today by Mrs. Byron Waller of Gallup in the preliminary hearing of 45 persons charged with first degree murder as a result of a riot April 4 in Gallup in which three persons were killed.

Mrs. Waller lives in an apartment on the corner where the riot started. The shouts and yells brought her to an adjoining room which overlooks the alley where two persons were shot to death and one was mortally wounded. She testified she saw the whole thing.

A "large Spanish fellow with a gun in his hand" attracted her attention, she said, after she saw Robert M. Carmichael fall dead from a bullet wound. There was another shot and the "large Spanish fellow" fell dead. The ground was thick with tear gas, bombs of which had been exploded before the shooting started, she testified.

About 100 in Crowd
Mrs. Waller testified that about 100 or more.

Defense Counsel A. L. Wirth drew from her the admission she did not tell him the eye-witness account when he questioned her. "I'm not in the habit of discussing things with strangers," she said.

The reply caused a ripple of applause through the courtroom and Judge M. A. Otero, Jr., before whom the preliminary hearing is being conducted, reprimanded the crowd and said the first sign of any "anti-outburst" would result in "some people going to jail."

ENERGY OF COSMIC RAYS
PROVES BEYOND HARNESS

WASHINGTON (AP)—The dream that some day man might harness the mighty energy of the cosmic rays—unseen, unfelt, but powerful agencies constantly raining down from outer space—has been exploded.

The cosmic rays, though the most penetrating form of radiation known, would have to be concentrated to be of any practical use, and there is no known way of doing this, says Dr. Thomas H. Johnson, assistant director of Bartol research foundation of Franklin Institute, Philadelphia.

He estimates that the total energy of the cosmic rays falling upon the earth is only about one-tenth that of the sunlight that reaches earth, but even if the cosmic ray energy equaled sunlight it still could not be harnessed.

Cosmic rays are comparable to X-rays or the rays of radium, but are far more penetrating.

STAMPS

In The News

First day sale of China's jubilee issue, being made ready for the observance of the twenty-fifth year of the rule of George and Mary, king and queen of Great Britain, has been set for May 4.

The stamps, in six denominations, include portraits of mem-



bers of the royal family and other illustrations. For the first time, Princess Elizabeth's granddaughter of the king and queen, is pictured on a stamp. She is shown in semi-profile to the left of the king and queen.

Others of the royal house besides the king and queen—they are to be seen on the 3-cent, featuring their roles of office—the Duke of York on the 2-cent and the Prince of Wales on the 5. The highest value is the 16-cent, which shows the Britannia, the royal yacht, in full sail, to complete the six. At a scene of Windsor castle on the 18-cent.

Like all present Canadian issues, the stamps bear the word, "postage" in both English and French.

Tete-beche pairs—taken from sheets in which half of the stamps are printed "upside down"—occur most frequently in Germany and Switzerland. The stamps are printed in this manner as aid in making up booklets to be sold to stamp users.

Parisi's recent illustrative issue, indicative of the progress of that country's modern development, commemorates the tenth anniversary of Rex Shah Fabiani.

The Czechoslovakian set of four celebrating the eighty-fifth birthday of President Masaryk appears to be printed on certain colored paper.

SAVANT FINDS PARASITE WHICH CAUSES MALARIA
PARIS (AP)—New hope of an effective remedy for malaria was raised by a French savant, Emile Brumpt, from the discovery he made of a hitherto unknown parasite in the blood of chickens. The parasite causes malaria.

Describing the tiny new bug, which belongs to the family of haematozoa, in a paper read at a meeting of the French academy of Sciences, Brumpt claimed that it would be of great value in the study of the recently discovered synthetic drugs which could be used against malaria in human beings.

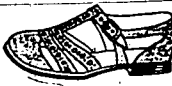

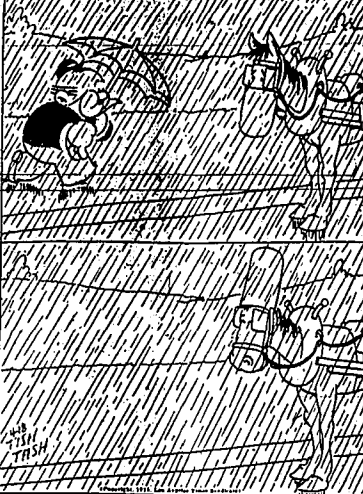

"Idaho is to be highly commended for the 11 per cent gain made in the 1937-38 tuberculosis campaign over the preceding year," Mrs. Florence Breed, national representative of the Anti-Tuberculosis association, told members and guests of the Twin Falls County Anti-Tuberculosis association at a luncheon meeting yesterday afternoon at the Fair hotel. Representatives from Gooding, Shoshone, Jerome, Rupert, Burley, Castletown, Pocatello, Kimberly, Kootenai and Twin Falls were present.

Mrs. Breed emphasizing the well-rounded program maintained by Anti-Tuberculosis associations throughout the United States, said that the principal project should be education of the public along health lines, particularly as child health is affected. Mrs. Catherine Aldrich, Boise, state secretary, spoke along the same lines, stressing particularly the health camps.

Applications Distributed
Application blanks for admission to McClary health camps were distributed during the business session, presided over by Mrs. Orr Chapman. Two certificates for Mrs. Chapman were returned, and one signed by the parents or guardians, and the other by the family physician, was also returned recommending children for the camp, should find one or more of the following conditions existing: "Tuberculosis in the family; mass infection in x-ray following tuberculin test; pronounced variations from the standard in height and weight; frequent absence from school because of ill health."

Parents, in addition to other questions, are asked to designate whether they can make cash or food contributions toward their children's care at camp. Photographs of children are asked to contribute \$2 a week in cash, or the equivalent in food.

Following are the regulations made clear to the parents in advance: "No child will be permitted to enter camp until all remedial physical defects such as infected tonsils and adenoids, and teeth shall have been corrected. "All applicants must have complete physical examination before admission to camp. "The age limit shall be six to 12 years. "Any child persistently violating rules of camp shall at the discretion of those in charge of the camp, be sent home. "Visiting day and hours must be strictly observed. Sunday 3 to 5 p. m. "Relatives and friends are asked not to bring candy, fruit or other food to any child, but to make, if possible, a donation to the camp pantry. "No child shall be admitted who has recently been exposed to an acute infectious disease. "No child shall be admitted unless he or she has been given immunity against diphtheria, smallpox and typhoid. "Children's Requirements: Boys attending the camp are required to have two pair of overalls or overalls, two pair of socks, two pair of shoes, two pair of pajamas, one sweater or coat and two suits of underwear. Girls are asked to have two pair of overalls or overalls, two pair of stockings, one pair of shoes, two pairs of nightgowns, one wash dress, two suits of underwear, two pair of bloomers, one coat and one sweater. "In addition both boys and girls are required to have the following: One toothbrush, one cake of baking soda, one cake soap, one comb, one heavy blanket, one small pillow, one bathing suit, a small supply of stamps and their favorite toys.

JUSTICES TO HEAR ALL ABOUT POULTRY

NRA Test Case Involves Two Big Wholesalers in Brooklyn

By E. B. HASKINSON WASHINGTON (AP)—Dignified justices of the supreme court are slated to hear all about chickens, turkeys and other fowl in the near future.

Two Firms, Four Brothers

The case involves two of the largest live poultry wholesalers in Brooklyn, center of this industry for the Greater New York area.

Those found guilty were the A. L. A. Schechter family apparently (838 East 52nd St.), the Schechter Live Poultry Market (91 Rockaway Blvd.) and Joseph, Martin, Alex and Aaron Schechter, brothers, all of Brooklyn.

Fines and Jail Terms

Judge Campbell ordered fines of \$7,420 against the group and jail terms for one from three months for the brothers for conspiracy to violate a federal law.

In addition to the conspiracy charge, the jury returned 100 \$10,000 fines for selling poultry unfit for human consumption, two counts of selling un-inspected poultry, 10 violations of the code prohibiting sale of birds from coops by dealers, false and fictitious receipts, failure to file reports and sale to unlicensed dealers.

Circuit Court Appeal

On an appeal to the circuit court heard by Judge Martin T. Stanton, Learned Hand and Harrie Brigham are the judges in the case.

With this decision the defendants and the senior counsel agreed on an immediate appeal to the supreme court. The former will petition for a writ of certiorari from the supreme court and the government on the other two.

The 15th legal section anticipates a victory for their "scoreshot" in the high court appeal. Thus far they report 1,280 complaints in less than two years.

Of these 810 are marked "closed" and 700 "pending." In cases which have been closed the federal code, NRA claims 210 victories to 20 losses.

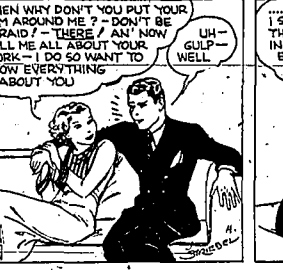
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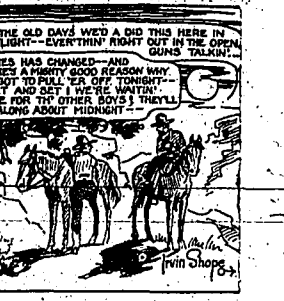

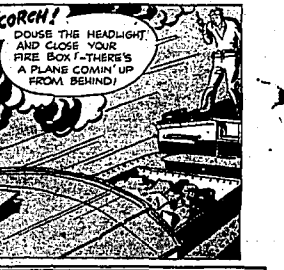
