



THE NATIONAL DEBT

As our national debt mounts, and tax-minded people wonder how we're ever going to nev it, there is some consolation in a comparison with the debt of other countries. Nearly all of them are worse off than we are—some because they have virtually can-celed their debts by drastic deflation, thereby ruining heavy investors in government bonds, and others because their present debts so much heavier than ours

The most striking example of this latter type is Great Britain.

Our debt today is figured at twenty-eight billion five hundred million dollars. It is still rapidly rising, and according to budget plans Ill reach thirty-four billion dollars by June will reach thirty-four billion dollars by June, 1986. Against this total may be set about two billion dollars of "gold profit" made by devaluation, plus three billion dollars or more of federal loans regarded as recoverable. But there will be delay in collecting many of those loans, and there are almost sure to the these loans, and there are almost sure to

be other large additions to the debt before we are clear of the depression.

The real test of debt, however, is its proportion to the debtor's resources. The present American debt is rated at one-tenth of our national wealth. Great Britain's is three-tenths of her wealth. Britain's interest charges take seven per cent of her income, ours only two per cent of our income.

It is somewhat reassuring to learn that the present debt service, because of lower interest rates, is less than it was on a twenty billion dollar debt in 1925.

GIFTS TO UNCLE SAM

An Oakland, California, man who didn't one any income tax sent the government a check for thirty-five dollars anyhow. Per-haps he had been moved to this generosity by the example of the late Justice Oliver Wendell Holmes, who left two hundred fifty thousand dollars to the government. According to officials, the records show

that there have been only nine years since 1862 in which no voluntary gifts or bequests to the U. S. Treasury were received. The total of such donations, exclusive of contributions to the "conscience fund" is one

outions to the "conscience fund", is one million five hundred seventy six thousand twenty two dollars.

Gifts have ranged all the way from fifty cents to nine hundred fifty thousand dollars.

The latter was in the form of government which the owner turned in to be canceled back in the '80's. Another gift three dollars and twenty-five cents in thrift stamps which a man found in a candy store he bought. One wift, ninety dollars, was sent in two years ago by a citizen who had begun to feel concerned about the rising national debt. A World War veteran sent in eighty dollars which represented a government al ance given his parents during the war, wanted it applied against the national

debt.

Perhaps there should be more publicity
for these voluntary gifts. They might lead
other citizens, to whom it never occurred
that Uncle Sam was eligible for their good offerings, to remember him in their vills or with gifts during their lifetime.

RUSSIAN PROPAGANDA

Dr. Alexander Troyanovsky, Russian am-hassador to the United States, was asked in the course of a public address what he cared to say about Communist propagands in other countries. His reply was interesting and rather entertaining

He indicated that the Russian government

is not engaged in propaganda for the spread of its political and economic system; but confines its foreign activities to legitimate presentation of governmental matters through the usual channels. He drew a definite dis-tinction between the Russian government and the Russian Communist Party, and gave the impression that even the latter organization is not now engaged in foreign propa-

The plain implication was that whatever propaganda there may be in this country in behalf of Communism has no official sanc-tion or backing in Russia. His government has enough to do at home without looking trouble abroad.

"But," he added with a smile, "we are not much interested in defending ourselves against charges of such propagands, because other countries are propagandizing against our system far more than we are against

their systems."

The audience got the point and smiled at him. It is probably true that we are fighting Russian Communism far more than Russian Communists are fighting our American. Capitalism.






