

#### BORAH FOR PRESIDENT

Senator Borah has been proffered the support of many different interests in the at that he should decide to run for President but the crowning achievement of the Senator is accomplished with the offer of Huey Long to support him on any ticket he

Senator Long's proffer of support to Sen-ator Borah as Long's first choice of a Presi-dential candidate is actuated by his fear of a third party movement which, says Long, "will split them wide open." Borah is one of a group, any member of which would have Long's support, but Borah comes first. Sen-ator Long feels that any one of the group which he names would lend himself to a furtherance of the Long "share the wealth

Whether we believe in Long's views or not there is enough of shrewd truth in his statements to warrant serious consideration. More and more the wisdom of the Roosevelt programme is being questioned by Repub-licans and Democrats alike. Men in both major political parties and of every other political complexion are perfectly willing to admit the necessity of many of the earlier admit the necessity of many of the carried features but, regard with misgivings the tendency to stay away from the political tenets under which the country became great. Few of these would be willing to endorse a return to the old order of things. even if that were possible, but they would welcome a partial return to the middle of the road in the matter of national policies.

#### SILVER

Recent increase in the price which the Federal government will pay for mined silver should have a beneficial effect upon the entire silver mining industry. To be sure seventy-seven to seventy-eight cents is not price but under modern methods it may be enough to render profitable the opening of a good many silver properties throughout the West, which is, primarily, the point simed at.
