FLAMES DESTROY OREGON'S \$700,000 CAPITOL BUILDING

Sparks Threaten to Start Fire at Willamette University When Huge Dome Crashes Into Interiors... Oregon's state capitol went up in flames tonight from a fire which started in the basement...

Three hours after the fire was discovered, firemen expressed no hope of preventing the flames from sweeping practically all of the \$700,000, 60-year-old building.

While Governor Charles H. Martin was in the building when it was destroyed, workers rapidly began moving records and belongings from his private office.

"BORAH FOR PRESIDENT"

Senator Borah has been proffered the support of many different interests in the event that he should decide to run for President but the crowning achievement of the Senator is accomplished with the offer of Huey Long to support him on any ticket he cares to run on.

Senator Long's proffer of support to Senator Borah as Long's first choice of a Presidential candidate is actuated by his fear of a third party movement which, says Long, "will split them wide open."

Whether we believe in Long's views or not there is enough of shrewd truth in his statements to warrant serious consideration. More and more the wisdom of the Roosevelt programme is being questioned by Republicans and Democrats alike.

Long fears a third party movement but it may be that a third party movement will be the thing which will eventually restore stability. In the meantime, "Borah for President" is no bad idea notwithstanding the fact that there probably isn't anything on earth which would induce Borah to accept such a nomination.

SILVER

Recent increase in the price which the Federal government will pay for mined silver should have a beneficial effect upon the entire silver mining industry.

Insofar as the whole broad theory of pegging prices on commodities can succeed silver should profit by the increased value.

However, low prices for copper constitute an obstacle in the way of profitable silver mining. As matters now stand an increase in the price of copper would go far towards providing an impetus in the business of mining silver.

NATURE CUTS CROPS

Nature herself is a good crop-restrictor. On the whole, she does a pretty dependable job. She produces too much temporarily and in spots, especially when man, her co-worker, doesn't use good sense about it.

Such reflections are aroused by renewed activity of the great dust storms in the upland plains of Colorado, Kansas, Oklahoma

and Texas. Those semi-arid wheat regions grow more arid. Their productivity is gone for this year and may be gone for ten or one hundred years, through loss of the top soil that Nature takes centuries to build.

This disaster could not have been foreseen when the government began subsidizing farmers to limit crop production and restore farm prices and buying power, as a step toward restoration of a balanced economic system.

It would be absurd to assume that this disaster was a purposeful punishment inflicted by Mother Nature for flouting her bounty. The event, however, has strengthened the nation's natural preference for a "philosophy of abundance" as against one of scarcity, in both agriculture and industry.

Veteran Department Head Gets Axe Following Election

Twin Falls will have a new fire chief the first of next month, it was learned last evening.

Jack Bell, member of Twin Falls fire department for 15 years and its chief the past 12 years, found out about it the day following the election of Duncan McD. Johnson who two years ago was elected mayor of Twin Falls on a "clean sweep" ticket.

"I had dropped in to see the mayor, and incidentally told him I had not supported him for re-election," the veteran fire chief said in reply to question last evening. "The mayor's advice, in so many words, was to get on a horse and ride," and he said: "You can quit now or wait until the first of May; it's immaterial to me."

Along with other members of the fire department, with one exception, the chief had contributed to the mayor's campaign fund, but he said last evening: "He knew I wasn't for him."

A resident of Twin Falls since 1911, Mr. Bell was employed before coming here for a number of years as a rigger for the Utah Construction company, on ranches south of Twin Falls.

The chief indicated that the prospect for continuing in service two years longer under the re-elected mayor's administration had not been altogether gratifying. There were unconfirmed reports of impending changes in other municipal departments heads following the beginning of a new term for Twin Falls city administration early in May.

## STUDENTS ENLIST IN SAFETY DRIVE

Idaho Automobile Association Offers Course of Instruction

BOISE, April 24 (Special)—Offer of a course of instruction in traffic safety and driving to all Idaho high schools was announced today by the Idaho State Automobile association.

The offer has been accepted by Boise school authorities and the course will be introduced in Boise high school at once on an experimental basis, with a view to adoption in the regular curriculum next school year.

"Sportmanlike Driving" is the name of the course. It was prepared for the American Automobile association under the direction of Burton W. Marsh, its director of safety and traffic engineering, and Walter J. Stupka, one of the leading traffic safety specialists of this country. Though completed and copyrighted only since January 1, 1935, it is being used in schools in Massachusetts, Pennsylvania, Michigan, Ohio, Illinois, Indiana, Missouri, Kansas, Oklahoma, Kentucky and California.

Injuries, Deaths Increase

Adapting the instruction primarily for high school use was decided upon, Manager R. G. Cole of the Idaho A. A. A., said, for two reasons, because accidents have increased more alarmingly in the high school age group than any other, and because the schools offer better opportunity and facilities for teaching safety instincts and habits than any other agency. Also, persons in that group receive the instruction more readily.

"Injuries and deaths in traffic accidents have increased terrifically the last 10 years in all age groups," said Cole, "with one exception. They have been fewer by 11 per cent among children five to nine years old. This is the group which has had the benefit of intensive prevention work, by means of the school-boy safety patrol.

"This gives us a true incentive, we believe, for inaugurating a scientifically prepared course of safety instruction in high schools. Beyond

doubt, it is something concrete we can do to further the lives and let live" campaign for reduction of traffic accidents in Idaho.

Each who has examined the course believes it will prove admirably effective. Its very name is inspiring. Safety consciousness, understanding of the mechanics and capabilities of automobiles, appreciation of road and weather conditions affecting driving, information regarding laws and rules of the road, and right habits of care and courtesy—all these sum up logically in the concept of high school youth as sportsmanship. And by that token, if properly inculcated, they should dispense inexperience, recklessness and mistaken zeal and spirit."

### Scope of Training

The course is designed in general to prepare the young to assume drivers' responsibilities, to reduce the accident toll, and to provide a future citizenry better able to cope with traffic problems in all phases. Specifically, it teaches proper attitudes and habits in the use of cars; understanding of physical and mental limitations of both drivers and pedestrians; significance of traffic laws; elements of vehicle mechanics; characteristics of streets and highways, and functions of signals, signs and markers; and qualifications for drivers' licenses.

The thoroughness of instruction in all these phases is readily surmised on examination of the textbook. This is offered to every high school in the state, and requests for information concerning it will be welcomed by the Idaho State Automobile association at its headquarters in Boise.

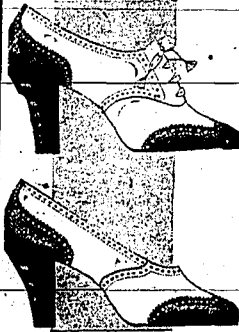

### IDAHO HISTORIANS PUBLISH QUARTERLY

Stories of Indians, Trappers, Miners and Pioneers Scheduled

POCAHELLO, April 25—Indians, trappers, miners and pioneers will cooperate next month in the publication of an Idaho magazine. At least, they will cooperate in that they are among the subjects. The Idaho Historical Quarterly, organized here last winter, has announced that the first issue will be dated next month and is expected from the press late in May. All sections of the state will be represented on the editorial staff of the quarterly, according to Charles C. Laird, chairman of the committee having the editing in hand. Every effort is being made to keep the publication as broad sectional in any sense, according to Professor Laird, who pointed out that contributing editors have been selected on three bases: Their individual contribution to history, their interest in various periods and types of Idaho history, and their distribution through the state.

### UNIVERSITY DAIRY PRODUCTION GAINS

Four Holsteins' Records Bring High Producers List to 15

MOSCOW, April 25—Completing records of between 799.8 and 874.7 pounds of butter fat during the first ten days of March, four cows in the University of Idaho Holstein herd bring the total number of 800-pound fat records developed in the herd to 15.

Producing 874.7 pounds of fat from 25,933 pounds of milk, Idaho

Piebe Madeline, a mature cow, led the quartet. Her sire, King Piebe Pocatello Segs, one of ten preferred sires used in the University herd, has a transmitting index of 817 pounds of fat calculated on a mature Class A basis. A paternal half-sister, Idaho Piebe Quality, also a mature cow, completed a record of 862.2 pounds of butter fat contained in 25,918 pounds of milk. Quality's highest day's production was 125.8 pounds of milk or 14.3 gallons. A step-daughter of the university cow, Idaho Segs Lily, the only 30,000-pound cow in the nation to have produced two daughters each with records of more than 30,000 pounds of milk in one year.

Bred for Production, Finishing a record of 833.8 pounds of fat and 26,038 pounds of milk, Idaho Walker Quotient, a four-

year-old, is a daughter of Matador Segs Walker Lad. His mature Class A transmitting index is 839 pounds of fat. Idaho Walker Phyllis, another LAD daughter, finished her year's record with 95.95 pounds of milk containing 799.8 pounds of fat. Her dam, Idaho Piebe O'Leica, herself a 1912 pound fat cow, is granddam of Idaho Perfection Delight, All American, 3-year-old for 1934.

For many years the university herd has been bred for high production through continuous use of pygmy sires. These records attest to the success of the breeding program.

SILVER MEDAL AWARDED UNIVERSITY JERSEY COW

MOSCOW, April 25—A silver medal has been awarded the University of Idaho Jersey cow, Idaho Xenia Pinesse, for meritorious production. As a junior two-year-old

she produced 494 pounds of fat from 7,528 pounds of milk in the 306-day test period.

Idaho Xenia Pinesse is the seventh silver medal cow bred and developed in the university herd. Three of the medals have been awarded by the American Jersey Cattle club during the past three months, including the productive progress being made in the University of Idaho Jersey herd.

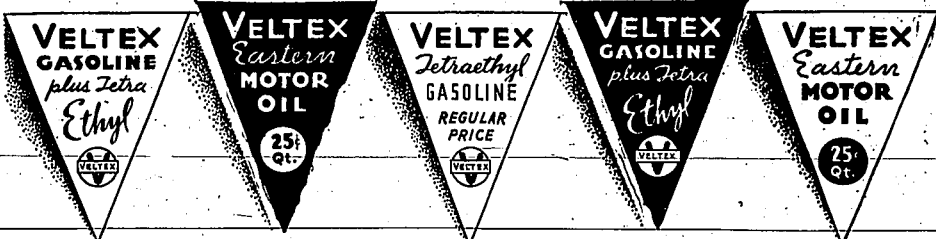

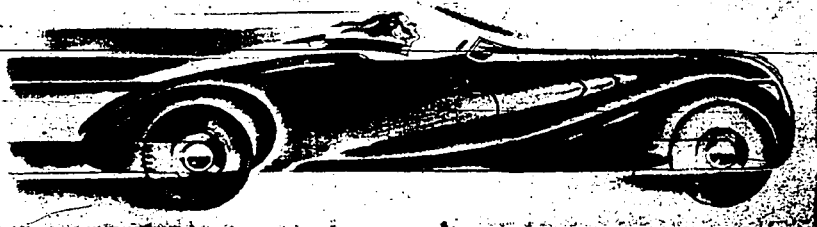

Under this plan the farmers will make no reduction in 1935 but will receive payment for the reductions they had planned. These farmers will receive the 1936 wheat crop in 1936, in addition to any acreage reductions planned for next year.

# ON RELIEF

#### Workers Like Seawall Job in West

This is the second in a series of six daily articles.

By H. WELLS

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—They're "on work relief," and their job is spookey as well—building seawalls with tools—just like Ed Thornton and his crew don't mind.

"They don't think of shoes, and there's no murmur of complaint, even when they have to labor by moonlight in the ebb hours."

Some of the men stand in the water while the spray beats over them and the wind from off the Golden Gate intensifies its chill. Occasionally one stands erect to balance on one foot, remove a boot and pour out the water.

"Bread and Self Respect!"

"It's bread and butter and 'self respect' and every time I look up I see a cloud of dust. That's what they're building into the wall, I'm better satisfied," says George Gordon, one of the youthful workers who has temporarily abandoned his ambition to become an architect.

"Well, the boys really do make fun of me as they go about their shifts when they have to work in hours that take advantage of the 'low tide'."

The wall being erected on the Marina-16 feet thick at the base 15 feet high and will be several hundred feet long. Old cobblestones, the tombstones of two abandoned cemeteries and salvaged rock from an old pier are being used to avoid costs of new material.

No Labor Trouble

"See those huge rocks down there?" one inquired. "Well, they weigh up to 20 tons each. We fished up a 'smack' today to help, and the rocks were in, in the moonlight and heaved in rhythm to the tunc of the 'Voices Boatman' and simply by their weight and slanting of the big stones first began to give; they let out a great shout. Talk about 'wrecking'—it was a wrecking job for more than a year."

"I'm not ashamed to be on relief," continued Gordon. "I'm not ashamed to be on relief, of course. I wrote mother back in Missouri I had temporarily given up my money by not starting out with a practical experience in building. I don't let the folks at my rooming house know I'm on work relief because so many of the early jobs were in the night and I don't like to go out at night. 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### COMMUNISTS LASH JUBILEE EXPENSE

#### English Radicals Organize Demonstrations as Nation Celebrates

LONDON, April 25 (AP)—"Royal guardsmen drew the lips of British communists again today as King George approached the silver jubilee of his reign. At 6 o'clock, a manifesto issued by leaders of the 'London First of May committee' termed the period '25 years of robbery of workers in which millions of our brothers have been slain, mutilated, gassed and tortured.'"

While the communist manifesto called for a demonstration to be held at the jubilee procession, it urged workers to demonstrate by vote and banner in view of the crowd which will line the procession route to St. Paul's cathedral against the great cost to the state of the celebration.

Since the royal air ministry announced plans for an elaborate review of the royal air force before King George at Millbank and Dulwich in East Angles July 4, which 300 to 400 planes will participate.

The expense of the jubilee of King George the 25th English monarch in 1400 years to celebrate 25 years on the throne—has been sharply criticized in parliament, notwithstanding the fiery laborite-Jack McGovern.

Although an American cataloger has decided to give regular ratings to the March 15 Party imperfections those who compile the dictionary of stamps used by British collectors have announced that the special stamps will not be so rated by them.

Two new special stamps are in preparation overseas. One from Belgium will have portraits of three children of the royal household and one on behalf of child welfare. The other, from France, is proposed for issue simultaneously with the 1936 stamps of the new French ruler, Normandy—it will be a 160-franc blue.

The British forces in Egypt, in addition to having their own postage stamps, also issue a Christmas stamp.
