BOISE, April 30 (AP)—Representatives of 20 branches of Idaho agriculture met here today and selected a committee to coordinate the various divisions of the industry in this state.

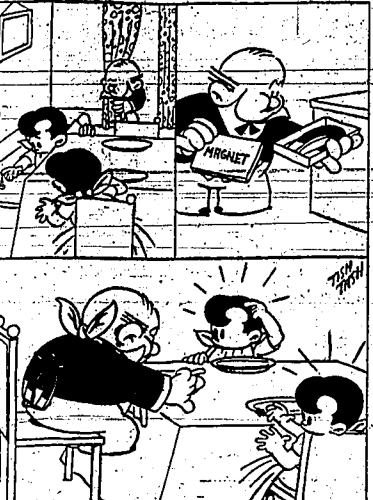

**ELECTRIC SERVICE CHARGES LOWERED**

Idaho Power Company's New Schedule Promises \$75,000 Savings

An estimated saving of \$75,000 a year to Idaho Power Company customers in Idaho and Oregon will result from a reduction of residential combination electric service rates announced by Idaho Public Utilities commission and the Idaho Power company yesterday. The new reduced rates were made effective with May 1st meter readings. The new rates cover the following combination of service: schedule 1-A, residential lighting and cooking; schedule 1-B, residential lighting and refrigeration; schedule 1-C, residential lighting, cooking and water heating; or residential lighting and water heating. All the schedules affected by these changes provide a reduction in room charge for homes of more than four rooms and permit the use of motors up to a needed load of 3 horsepower without additional monthly charge. The previous schedules allowed but 2 horsepower without additional charge. This change is of particular benefit to the farm customer who can use more than the total of 2 horsepower in motors for his farm operations. Schedules 1-B and 1-C provide a reduction in the kilowatt hour charge, the change in schedule 1-D being designed to effect a substantial reduction in the water heating charge.
