That amount will be expended in addition to the \$105,000,000 already provided in air estimates for the current fiscal year, the informed source disclosed. The proposal, regarded in London as an answer to Adolf Hitler's boast that the Reich now is as strong in the air as Great Britain, is expected to be the subject of a cabinet meeting tomorrow.

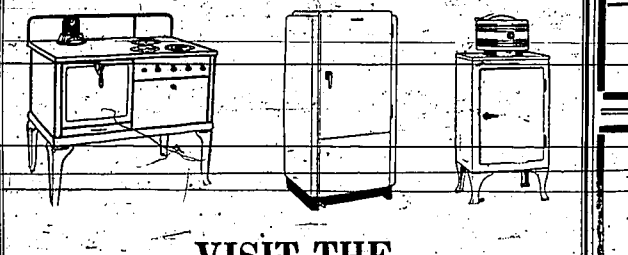

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STEPS TO DODGE WAR

The State Department at Washington is reported as favoring the following program to keep the United States out of the next war:
1. Place an embargo on munition shipments when war breaks out.
2. Forbid American citizens to travel on ships carrying munitions.
3. Forbid loans and credits to belligerents.
4. Bar armed vessels from American ports.
5. Make it a crime for American citizens to enlist in belligerent armies.
6. Forbid public expressions of sympathy with any belligerent.

All these items would require new legislation, and Congress may deal with them in the present session because public attention is centered so keenly on the situation they are meant to cover.
With the spirit and general purpose most Americans will doubtless agree, there will be difficulties, however, with some of the items. The aim of the second would probably be attained by merely denying official protection to American citizens traveling on munition ships—a similar rule might also be for the fifth. As for the sixth, it is possible to prevent, by law, expressions of sympathy?

Surely, though, after careful review of these and other proposals, we should be able to act more wisely than we did when the World War broke out.

IF LAW BOOKS WERE BURNED

When a lawyer criticizes law, that's probably news. Ezra Brudno, an American attorney-author, who has had experience with his profession in both public and private practice, writes in a reflective book called "Ghosts of Yesterday":
"Little wonder that the layman has scant respect for the law. The thinking person has come to realize that if all the law books were burned to ashes in one day, without leaving a vestige of precedent, and a citizen's rights were submitted to a tribunal of three persons picked from the streets, without the guidance of judge or lawyer, his chances for justice would be no worse than they are under the present system."

Few lawyers will admit that many laymen will not. But it certainly does stimulate thought. Suppose, now, that all the written laws were wiped out and you were on such an emergency committee to determine what a citizen's rights were, or to write a new code!

ORDERLY EGG-SELLING

Realism in the labeling and sale of eggs is proposed in a bill which recently passed in one of the state legislatures. Such terms as "fresh," "strictly fresh" and "new-laid" are to mean just what they say. Eggs which can make no just claim along any of these lines are to be called merely "eggs" and the wise housewife will be warned accordingly. Then, in selling eggs, the bill would establish new rules about quantity. The customer must be able to get a definite amount of egg for a certain price. Eggs by the pound instead of eggs by the dozen is the idea. It sounds reasonable and is practiced in some foreign countries. We are coming to sell apples and bananas by weight—why not eggs? Perhaps the matter is of less importance than most of the proposals state legislators have straggled with this year, but surely it is as worthy of some study.

ONE JOB HITLER
(Cleveland Field Dealer)
No one doubts that Mussolini had determined to force a war on Abyssinia and to make the great African empire an Italian colony. Now Italy formally agrees instead to submit her dispute with Abyssinia to arbitration. The African war is definitely off for the time being.

The incident with Abyssinia concerned attacks by Italianmen on Italian expeditions which were wandering about on the Abyssinian side of the frontier. Abyssinia, in disclaiming responsibility, took occasion to emphasize the fact that if the Italian had kept out of Abyssinia, there would have been no trouble. The only restrictions permitted were officers in command of active troops.

Since Hitler's announcement not one Italian soldier has been sent to Africa and no more Italian soldiers will be sent to Africa for a long time. Mussolini cannot muster the armies which would invade another continent. For the sake of appearances, if for no other reason, Mussolini needs most of his soldiers right at home. So it happens that Adolf Hitler, by making an army has prevented a war.

But other developments have contributed. The role of France has not been heroic. To purchase Italian French need not give Italy a new ally. Great Britain did nothing at the time, but she did a deal of thinking. She thought about a number of treaties guaranteeing Abyssinian conquest. Was Italy going to scrap these treaties? Perhaps more important was the consideration that by acquiring Abyssinia Italy would control the source of the Nile and that any power in control of the Nile could do as it pleased with the prosperity and threaten the very life of Egypt.

It is not to be doubted that at times Mr. MacDonald asked Signor Mussolini some questions about Abyssinia. And there is every indication that the signor answered amiably. Within twenty-four hours after the stream adjournment Italy announced that she will arbitrate.

ESCAPING THE MOB

"That man is intellectually of the mass who, in face of any problem, is satisfied with the first thing he finds in his hand."—Ortega y Gasset, Spanish philosopher.
It is an excellent rule to remember, particularly in a country such as America, where all issues, in the end, must be settled at the polls.

If we decide issues by prejudice rather than by reason, then our democracy must pass. It is quick-temper and the mob. It creates political parties for quicks, and that brings about hasty and unnecessary wars. Prejudice is the first reaction of individuals to problems placed before them; reason is a painful process by which disciplined and intelligent persons analyze their own prejudices and bet them aside or modify them on the basis of reason.
