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# AMPLE WATER FOR IRRIGATED FARMS

## Idaho Reclamation Department Spokesman Says Conditions Improve

BOZEMAN, May 3 (AP)—Farmers on Idaho's approximately 1,500,000 acres of irrigated farm lands need not worry about a shortage of water this year, says a spokesman of the Idaho reclamation department today. "Water conditions are pretty close to normal in the reservoirs at Arrowrock, Jackson lake, American Falls, Idaho Falls and throughout the state," Coffin said.

"With careful use the water supply will be adequate to mature crops this year," he predicted, adding that the runoff on most of the high watersheds is just beginning, he noted.

# BILL FOR RELIEF OF MINES OKED

## House Committee Unanimously Endorses Proposal

WASHINGTON, May 3 (AP)—The House mining committee today unanimously endorsed the proposal of western congressmen that \$75,000,000 be spent in rehabilitating the metal mining industry and for relief of miners.

The committee reported favorably on the House bill by Representative Scrugham (D-Nev.) to authorize the use of work-relief funds by the bureau of mines to those ends.

The bill would provide for development and operation by the bureau of gold and silver mines and mines of other non-competitive metals produced in insufficient quantities in the United States to supply domestic needs.

Dr. John W. Finch, director of the bureau of mines, strongly endorsed the program before the committee.

He suggested amendments to Scrugham's bill designed to eliminate opposition that might be generated by putting the government into the mining business.

The amendments, accepted by Scrugham and the committee, would provide that any mine developed with these funds should be closed down in the United States to a producer of metals of which an over-abundance already is on hand.

Thus a silver mine that proved to be a producer of copper or lead would be closed.

### Salads Fairly Beam When Wearing These Dressings

Calcutta, Pimola and Others Made From Cooked Foundation

A properly blended cooked salad dressing may be perfectly okay for ordinary days, but there'll come a day when you'll feel like the poet who aptly expressed the mood.

"On some days I'm domestic,  
I love my pantry shelf,  
I can sit stores and then I beam."

And when you begin to beam you probably have visions of a new salad that the family or the guests will rave about. It's then time to check over your condiments and seasonings and add the little necessities that turn a cooked salad dressing into Calcutta, Pimola, Manhattan and seven other salad dressings, all delightful if you have the proper foundation.

For cooked salad dressing mix three tablespoons sugar, one teaspoon salt, one teaspoon prepared mustard, one and a half tablespoons flour or one and three-quarters of a cup of milk, mixing in the order named. Add slowly four tablespoons vinegar. Cook over hot water constantly until thick. Add one tablespoon butter, blend thoroughly. Cool it and you have a wonderful salad dressing. Now for the dressings.

**CALCUTTA DRESSING:** When making foundation recipe mix 1/2 teaspoon curry powder with other foundation ingredients. When dressing is cool add 1/2 cup sandwich spread. Serve with lettuce and chicken or chicken and vegetable salads.

**COLESLAW DRESSING:** To foundation recipe add 2 tablespoons orange marmalade sauce when dressing is cool. Especially good with cabbage or quick coleslaw salads.

**FLUFFY DRESSING:** When making foundation recipe separate the egg, use the yolk as directed, and beat, fold in the stiffly beaten egg white after dressing is cooked, and cool. For stuffed date or stuffed fruit salads.

**HAWAIIAN DRESSING:** To foundation recipe, when cool, add 3 tablespoons orange juice and 3 tablespoons pineapple juice. Serve with pineapple, celery and nut salad.

**MANHATTAN DRESSING:** To foundation recipe, when cool, add 1/2 cup sandwich spread.

**PEANUT BUTTER:** To foundation recipe, when cool, add 4 tablespoons peanut butter. A dressing that is good on either mixed fruit or vegetable salad.

**PIMOLA DRESSING:** To foundation recipe, when cool, add 1 finely chopped hard cooked egg, 1 chopped pimiento, and 1 tablespoon chopped sour gherkins. Serve with lettuce or apple salad.

**SAVORY DRESSING:** To foundation recipe, when cool, add 1/2 cup India relish, 1/2 cup cream and vegetable oil, 1/2 cup sugar, 1/2 cup grapefruit or pear salad.

**FRUIT SALAD:** To foundation recipe add 1 tablespoon sugar and substitute 1/2 cup pineapple juice plus 1/2 cup orange juice for the milk. The mustard may be omitted if desired. Cool it. A fluffy dressing is desired fold in 1/2 cup whipped cream.

### Famous "Thin Man"

Odd-Minutemen-of-the-moment famous "Thin Men" of our time believe in rich, delicious food. It's him, or rather, it's this picture. One of his favorites is cheese cake, and while this may not be his favorite recipe, it is nevertheless Cheese Cake, and we hope you like it.

**CHEESE CAKE**

3 tablespoons gelatin  
1 cup cold water  
2 egg yolks, slightly beaten  
1 teaspoon salt  
1/2 cup milk  
1/2 cup sugar  
1/2 cup cottage cheese (put through a ricer)  
1 lemon (grated rind and juice)  
1 teaspoon vanilla extract  
2 egg whites (stiffly beaten)  
1 cup whipping cream.

Soften gelatin in cold water. Put egg yolks in top of double boiler. Beat slightly and add salt, milk and sugar. Cook, stirring until mixture thickens. Remove from fire. Add softened gelatin; mix thoroughly. Cool. Add cheese which has been put through a ricer, lemon juice, rind and vanilla. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites and whipped cream.

Press 2 1/2 of the cornflake pastry into the bottom of a spring form mold. Fill with cheese mixture. Sprinkle remaining cornflake pastry crumbs over the top. Bake to crispness. Bake in oven 350 degrees until firm, about an hour.

### Pot Roast Recipe

Dinner Serving: Four  
Pot Roast Betina  
(With Vegetables)  
1/2 cup apricot plum jam  
Bread  
Head Lettuce  
Relish Dressing  
Orange Charlotte  
Cottage Milk for Children

**Pot Roast Betina**

4 pound chuck roast  
2 tablespoons fat  
4 tablepoons chopped onion  
1 cup diced carrots  
1/2 cup cooked peas  
2 tablepoons chopped onions  
1/2 cup chopped celery  
2 tablepoons chopped green pepper  
2 tablepoons salt  
1/2 teaspoon paprika  
1 1/2 cups water

Melt fat in deep pan, add and quickly brown roast. Sprinkle with flour, add onions, celery and salt. Add the water. Cover and cook slowly 2 hours. Add rest of ingredients and simmer until meat is very tender when tested with fork. Remove roast to serving platter, surround with gravy mixture and cooked vegetables.

**Relish Dressing**

1/2 cup mayonnaise  
4 ripe olives, chopped  
2 green onions, chopped  
1 tablepoons chili sauce  
2 tablepoons catsup  
1 tablepoons chopped pickles  
1/2 cup milk  
Mix and chill ingredients and serve on salad.

**Orange Charlotte**

2 tablepoons granulated gelatin  
4 tablepoons cold water  
1/2 cup boiling water  
1/2 cup sugar  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1 cup orange juice  
2 tablepoons lemon juice

1 tablepoons grated orange rind  
1 teaspoon lemon rind  
2 egg whites, beaten  
1/2 slices angel food cake

Soak gelatin in cold water 5 minutes. Add boiling water and stir until gelatin has dissolved. Add sugar, salt, fruit juices and rinds. Cool and allow to thicken a little. Beat until fluffy and fold in whites; chill until mixture will stand alone. Pour into mold lined with cake slices. Chill until stiff (about 2 hours). Serve plain or with cream.

### Bran Muffin Recipes

1/2 cup buttermilk for sour milk  
1 cup prepared bran  
1 cup flour  
3/4 cup soda  
1/2 cup salt

1 cup baking powder  
Cream shortening, add egg and beat well. Add honey, milk and bran and soak until most of the liquid is taken up. Sift dry ingredients and add to first mixture, stirring only until the flour disappears. Fill greased muffin tin 2/3 full and bake in a moderate oven (425 degrees F.) about 25 minutes. Yield: 16 small muffins.

A bran tea muffin can also be made with brown sugar and sweet milk.

**BRAN MUFFINS**

2 eggs, shortening  
1 cup sugar  
1 egg (well beaten)  
1 cup prepared bran  
1 cup sour milk  
1 cup flour  
1/2 cup soda  
1/2 cup baking powder

Cream shortening and sugar; add egg, bran and milk and let stand until most of moisture is taken up. Sift flour with soda, salt and baking powder, and add to first mixture, stirring only until flour disappears. Bake in greased muffin tin in a moderate oven (425 degrees F.) for 20 to 25 minutes. Yield: 16 small or 8 large muffins.

## AAA STAKES MUCH ON WHEAT BALLOT

Wallace Pleads for "Flexibility of Mind" Among Nation's Farmers

WASHINGTON, May 3 (AP)—Confronted with weather report of intensified drought conditions in the southwest, the farm adjustment administration preparing to stake much of its future existence on results of the May 23 wheat referendum.

The wheat crop, which experts estimate will only fill domestic requirements at best next year already is in a slight because of drought in the winter wheat areas; centering in Kansas—largest producer of the bread-grain.

For that reason, many officials were apprehensive over submitting to farmers at this time the question of continuous production contract for four years, although Secretary Wallace expressed no concern over the outcome.

But some AAA officials believed an adverse vote might cripple other programs, even though a majority of the committee, including the farmers approved their programs in polls conducted late in 1934.

Wallace at his press conference pleaded for "a broad-minded flexibility of mind" among farmers and consumers on the question of wheat production control. He emphasized surplus as well as shortages must be guarded against.

The weather bureau, in its weekly weather and crop report, noted improvement in the drought situation in the northern part of the western dry belt and intensification in the southern half.

Kansas needs rain badly, the report said, since precipitation during the last two months has been only about 50 per cent of normal. It added:

"Extreme western Oklahoma, southeastern Colorado, extreme western and northwestern Texas and the adjoining portions of New Mexico are still abnormally dry."

In the spring wheat area of North Dakota, South Dakota, Minnesota, Nebraska, Montana, Colorado, Utah,

and Nevada, conditions were reported greatly improved with sufficient moisture recently to bring the April total above normal for the first time in many months.

Meanwhile, it was warned, drought relief projects in the affected areas will be pushed through the works-relief allotment boards as rapidly as possible.

The AAA said the wheat referendum will involve approximately 575,000 wheat contract signers in 1763 counties of 27 states and as many non-signers as wish to vote. Between now and May 23 an intensive campaign will be carried on in county and community meetings "to acquaint farmers with all phases of the wheat situation."

Wallace predicted to newsmen that even if the AAA amendments pending in congress failed to pass, organized agriculture would continue the fight for the proceeding tax "as long as there is a tariff in this country" and seek the "right kinds" of marketing agreements and licenses "as long as the corporate system of organization" is in existence in the United States.
