COUNCIL AT WORK ON CITY BUDGET

Commissioners Slash Wants in Effort to Curtail 1935-36 Expense

Twin Falls city council last evening started plans for the 1935-36 fiscal year budget and then passed until 7:30 p. m. Wednesday to take final action on the budget.

Announcing that this year's budget must not go over \$14,000, Mayor Duncan McD. Johnston turned the problem over to the various commissioners. Their wants were revealed the total was showing to be something over \$19,000.

Then in passing began, the various appropriations, the council finally brought the amount down to \$14,000, but there is a possibility, according to the city clerk, that will be further cut before the Wednesday evening meeting draws to a close.

Death was self-inflicted, the officers decided, following investigation. Higgins took his life with a .23 calibre revolver pressed against his right temple as he lay on the bed in his cabin.

Death was fixed at approximately 6 o'clock Sunday morning. Officers searched the cabin by L. E. Langdon, who found the body. No injuries will be held.

Higgins had been a resident of southern Idaho for the past 54 years. After his merchant's career, he engaged in a hide and wool business at Buhl for a time. He is survived by no known relatives.

Mid-South Floods Claim Ten Lives

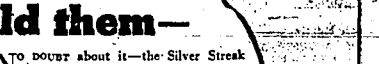

HEAVY SNOWS DELAY OPENING OF PARK

Yellowstone's Superintendent Says Plows Work Double Shifts

YELLOWSTONE PARK, Wyo., May 6.—"Because of the great amount of snow in the interior of Yellowstone national park and the continued heavy snowfall throughout March and April, we have not been able until now to advise definitely when the park highways will be open to admit motorists," Superintendent Roger W. Toll announced today. "With our snow plow working double shifts we are making considerable progress each day in clearing the highways."

Beginning May 15 motorists will be admitted for the first time this year at the north and west gates as the regular entrance fee of \$3 per car will be changed. At that time it is expected that the early visitors will be able to visit the geyser basins around Old Faithful, as well as the Grand Canyon, although some travel may be necessary over sections permitting only motor vehicles. As the snow plow continues to open other sections travel will be possible over them as soon as they are sufficiently dry to avoid damage to the road surface.

In the heavier snowfalls on the east and south sides of the park the regular entrance fee of \$3 per car will be changed. At that time it is expected that the early visitors will be able to visit the geyser basins around Old Faithful, as well as the Grand Canyon, although some travel may be necessary over sections permitting only motor vehicles.

As soon as the first motorists are admitted to the park they will be able to obtain meals and lodging at the C. A. Hamilton store at Old Faithful and when the road to Lake Park is made possible accommodations will be obtainable at Mr. Hamilton's store at that point. The general store at Mammoth, Canyon and Old Faithful will also be open to take care of early motorists. The hotel and lodges will begin operations until June 20, at which time the transportation lines will start its bus and passenger service to the various entrances will begin.

The park lakes and streams will be open to fishing this year on May 10, although Yellowstone between the Lake outlet and the Canyon will remain closed until June 20.

DRIVE SPEEDED FOR LIQUOR STORE VOTE

BOISE, May 6.—In a determined effort to secure the necessary signatures of 10 per cent of the legal voters in the State of Idaho to amend the referendum law, the liquor control act being promptly certified in the office of Franklin Girard, secretary of state, forces were concentrated here today and about 50 workers were added to the large volunteer staff throughout the state.

A new legal phase to the perplexing referendum law was developed when J. Wesley Holden, Idaho Falls attorney for the Anti State Store league, declared that a statement from the county clerks in the various counties to the effect that they did not have time to check the petitions would be sufficient to secure their being accepted by the secretary of state provided they were properly notarized. With that as an added stimulus Captain Burt M. Spilman, state director of the campaign, declared that sufficient signatures would be secured by Wednesday, May 8, the dead line set by Attorney General Berr H. Knutson for the final petitions to be in the office of the secretary of state.

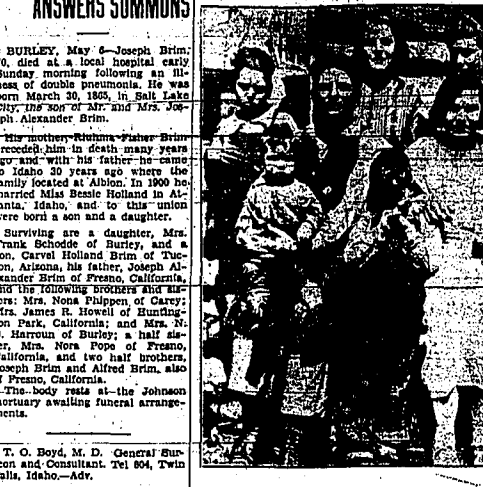

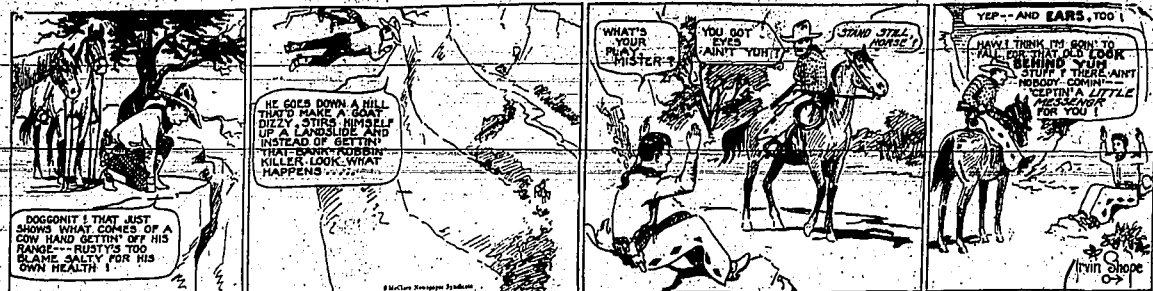

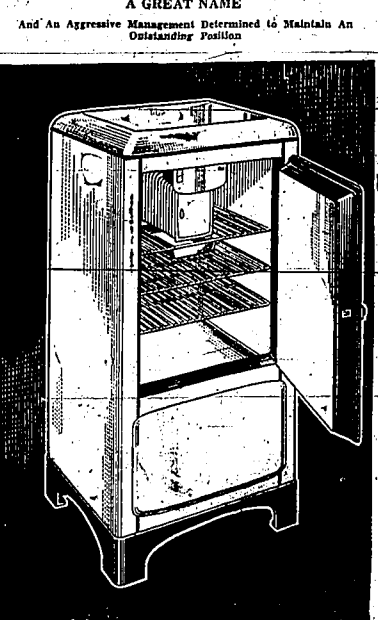
Knights Templar Conduct Services
