Freshen Your Meals With Vegetables In New Guise

No matter how fresh and crisp the spring fruits and vegetables are, if served the customary way from week to week, they become monotonous. It pays to freshen up your vegetable culinary tricks occasionally, and the family is sure to respond with pepped up appetites. There's rhubarb, for example. It's a thoroughly desirable fruit, yet many persons reject it. If such is the case in your home, try the "almond trifle" next time you prepare rhubarb. Cut 2 pounds of tender rhubarb in inch pieces and place in stew-pan with 1/4 cupful of sugar and 1/4 cupful of water. Cook slowly from 10 to 15 minutes. When stewing, add 12 chopped blanched almonds.

You'll Take Pride In Serving These Tasty Appetizers

The hostess who entertains frequently at dinner must be ever on the alert for new ideas to bring to the eye, whet the appetite, and start the evening with a flair. Among the following you may discover some appetizers with which you are not familiar:

Bequefite Pinapple: Grate 6 ounces of Roquefort cheese through a sieve, cream 4 tablespoonsful of butter, mix with cheese, add 1 teaspoonful of Worcestershire sauce, a dash of cayenne pepper and a few chopped chives. Form into small balls about the size of a walnut and bread in pumpernickel bread-crumbs. Bake in refrigerator for 15 minutes, then set each in a paprika capsule, arrange on a paprika doily with parsley or watercress.

Avocado Pear Philippines: Remove seed and cut lengthwise. Slice 3 slices of lobster which have been marinated in oil, lemon juice, pepper and salt about 1 hour previous. Cover lobster with light coat of mayonnaise and decorate with pickled walnuts. Serve on lettuce leaf.

Choppe a la Russe: Butter 6 diamond-shaped pieces of toast and cover with caviar. Lay a slice of hard-boiled egg in center. On each corner of caviar place a small cone of sliced smoked salmon filled with unseasoned whipped cream. Serve on doily with lemon and parsley.

Bohlander's Skin: Skin and slice very thin 3 cooked wieners sausages. Cut 3 ounces of Swiss cheese in small dice. Chop 2 hard-boiled eggs and few chives. Mix this well into 5 tablespoonsful of mayonnaise, 2 teaspoonfuls of prepared mustard, 1 teaspoonful of Worcestershire and 1 teaspoonful of A-1 sauce. Mix well and fill into emptied French rolls. When served, top with slice of egg. Place on leaf of lettuce and serve with lemon.

Geneva Apples: Spread on slices of Virginia ham soft-cream-cheese. Sprinkle with a little crushed black pepper, some chopped green peppers and chives. Wind the ham around a small dill pickle and serve with toasted rye-bread.

Tomato Nova: Peel 6 small-sized tomatoes, make a small incision on top, squeeze out all the seeds, season slightly with pepper and salt and fill in one tablespoonful of caviar. When served top with slice of egg. Place on leaf of lettuce and serve with lemon.

Green and White Color Scheme: Centerpiece of narcissus. Serve green olives, cream of asparagus or puree of pea soup, stuffed pepper salad, potato chips, hot luncheon rolls, greenish ice cream, angel food cake cut in squares and frosted either in green or white coffee.

Pink and White Color Scheme: Centerpiece of pink blossoms. Serve salted almonds, hearts of asparagus, clam and tomato juice cocktail, fresh shrimp and asparagus salad, hot baking powder biscuits, fresh strawberry ice cream, hot box of strawberries, coffee.

Red and White Color Scheme: Centerpiece of red roses. Pickled onions, radish roses, tomato consommé with whipped cream, crab surprise, hot popovers, strawberry shortcake, coffee.

STUFFED PEPPER SALAD
1/2 cup real mayonnaise.
2 cups cold cooked halibut, flaked.
2 teaspoon onion, grated.
1 teaspoon salt.
Dash of cayenne.
6 green peppers.
To mayonnaise add halibut, onion, salt, cayenne and celery. Cut 2-inch slices from each green pepper and remove seeds and pith. Chop remainder of peppers and add to mayonnaise mixture. Sprinkle mixture with fish and pepper mixture. Serve on crisp lettuce. Serves 6.

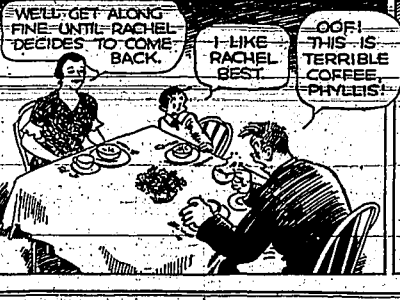
