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FROM DEPRESSION TO STABILITY

Colonel Leonard P. Ayres, prominent business analyst, comes out with a pamphlet on the depression which may give light to expert economists but only adds to the confusion of ordinary minds...

SOME UNSUITABLE APPOINTEES

Brain trusters and professors have had a great deal of fun poked at them in the past couple of years, with ever-increasing zest on the part of the public to give them their due. This of course refers to the boards and professors who have been called, appointed or assigned to fix things for the state, and is no reproach upon educators who have stuck to the jobs they understand and made good at the lowered salaries the people have been paid to pay.

Last Tuesday Representative Engel of Michigan brought up the matter in the house, and that of 104 persons recently appointed to administer in the AAA, strictly agricultural problems, 68 of them had bachelor degrees, while only five of them professed to know anything about milking a cow or dairying, and 121 were lawyers, 44 were engineers of some kind and 45 were economists; 70 of them professed to know something about agriculture. One university man got in the country walked up to a large ox and looked him over; then he asked, "Is that a female ox?" A good many stale jokes have been told about raising cattle with a stock of steers and raising colts with mules for breeding stock, and Representative Hopkins quipped one of the AAA professors talking to a committee on appropriations for the "education house," and named mules as part of the breeding stock to be furnished each homesteader at the start. Somebody retorted that no real Democrat would make that mistake, whereupon Mr. Engel said it was likely he was a mungwump—a man who does not know which party he belongs to, but keeps his mis-in-one-party and his wump in the other.

ILLINOIS FORCES SHOWDOWN

The legislature of the state of Illinois has refused to pass tax revenue measures providing \$3,000,000 monthly to match federal relief funds, and as a result all federal aid was abolished there about a week ago.

Governor Horner went to Washington, and appealed to Director Hopkins, but the latter "stood pat," saying that Illinois is ineligible, but that it is the next move up to the state legislature. In the meantime, according to reports, hunger and destitution are widespread in Illinois, 84 of the state's 102 counties being without state or federal relief funds. Starving citizens are marching upon the state capital to protest failure to pass legislation.

The pernicious system has fastened upon the country a false security whereby individuals have been deprived of their resources, and have been taught to rely upon Uncle Sam for their livelihood. So long as the treasury is overflowing, such a program may appear satisfactory. However, whenever there are shortages, the withdrawal—as was done in Illinois—shows results, and the pitiful inadequacy and delusion of the relief system are revealed.

FLEET MANEUVERS

Of course neither the government nor the navy has heeded the silly protests against Pacific maneuvers for the fleet. So today the American forces begin the most important and most practical test for defense needs on the west coast as well as on the east. With insular possessions in the Pacific and Asiatic commerce to protect, this country has a stake in the ocean, with the navy the sole guarantee of its safety.

The fleet maneuvers, involving 10 ships and 400 seaplanes, concern only the eastern half of the Pacific. The western boundary is the international date line. This scheme leaves outside the pale three insular possessions, Wake, Guam and the Philippines. Northward, the maneuver plan abandons the international date line so to include the entire stretch of the Alaskan coast in the war.

Should war come with any important sea power, west or east, the Pacific would form an important part of the navy's chess board. This week it is learning how to move the pieces.

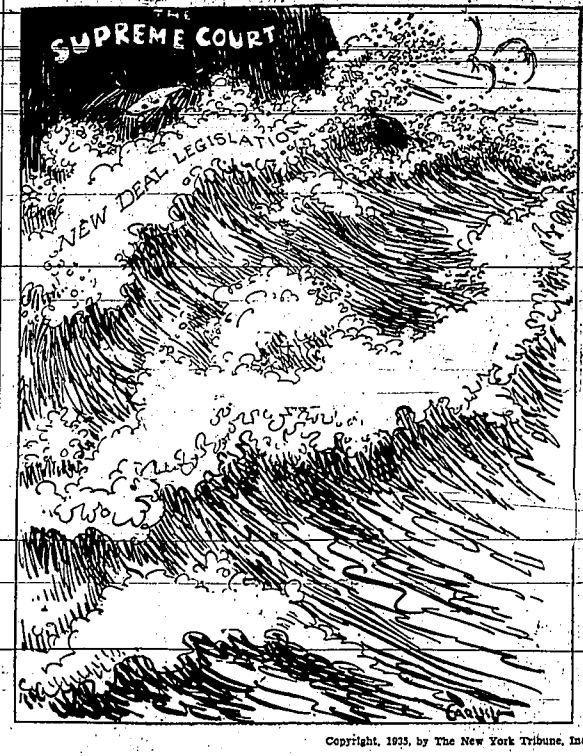
THE MENACE OF THE "STINK BOMB"

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AAA PLACES LIMIT ON WHEAT ACREAGE

58,000,000 Acres Maximum Without Sharp Jump in Carry Over

NOBOW, May 11 — One of the most important questions which farmers will discuss before voting May 13 on whether to continue a wheat adjustment program after the close of that year is how much wheat should be planted in the United States, says E. J. Iddings, state director of extension.

"The smallest acreage which can be seriously considered is an acreage sufficient to supply the domestic needs for bread, livestock feed, and seed," Iddings says. "The average amount of wheat required annually for these purposes is 40 million bushels. On the basis of average national yields, this amount can be supplied from a planting of 50 million acres. With this allowance for home needs, the question arises as to how large an acreage should be planted for export.

Export Outlook "The wheat program does not contemplate giving up the foreign business this nation once had, according to AAA officials. Rather, the effort is being made to regain and hold for United States wheat growers as much of the world wheat trade as possible. Present conditions indicate that an export of 75 to 100 million bushels yearly is as much as can be hoped for. The program is now produced on about 6 to 8 million acres. Our total needs, then, are about 55 to 60 million acres for both domestic and foreign trade.

"This estimate of 58 million acres is the top limit which United States farmers can plant on the average without danger of sharply increasing the carry-over in normal years. Thus the question farmers will weigh before voting on May 13 is whether they would plant the 58 million acres which formerly produced our surplus."

TIME FOR CALYX SPRAY IN ORCHARDS NEARING

The time for application of the calyx spray in orchards and high-berm districts is very near, J. E. Mullarky, horticultural inspector, announced last evening. The disease has reached full bloom and has started to shed the blossoms, he advised.

The spray should be applied when the blossom petals are 75 per cent to 90 per cent gone and completed before the calyx lobes have closed. The spray should consist of two pounds of lead arsenate to 100 gallons of water. The first cover spray should be on 8 to 10 days after the calyx spray is completed.

Our field examinations show the codling moth larvae in various stages of development, which indicate irregular emergence and will constitute more rigid observation of spray dates than when the moth flight is regular.

DEADLINE FIXED FOR SALES TAX PETITIONS

BOISE, May 11 (AP)—The Anti-Sales Tax League must have its referendum petitions filed at the office of secretary of state by 5 p. m. May 18, or they will not be accepted, Franklin Girard, secretary of state, announced.

Bunday, May 18, is the sixteenth day after passage of the 2 per cent retail sales tax act by the state legislature, and under the law May 20, is the sixty-first, so the petitions will have to be brought in on or before May 18, Mr. Girard reasoned.

Under the referendum law at least 37,000 qualified signers must affix their signatures to the petitions and they must be filed on or before the end of the sixtieth day after the day the legislature passed the act under attack.

Whether the filing of such petitions in legal form will halt operation of the law immediately or only give the people a chance to vote on it at the next general election is a question the courts will have to decide, attorneys here agreed.

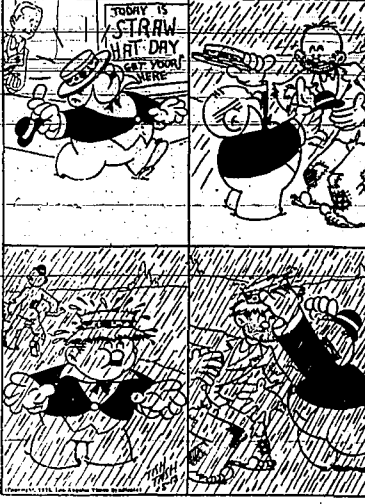

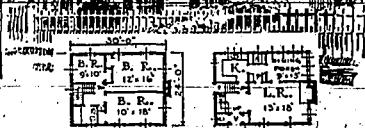
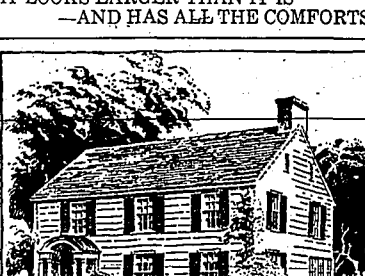

The boys will be fully equipped and will train in handiwork for a demonstration to be put on by the Boy Scouts of this region.

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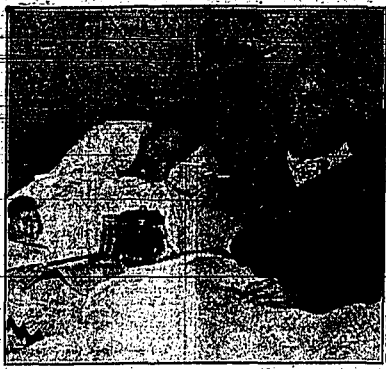

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TROOP MANEUVERS ENGAGE DIVISION

Units of 41st Assemble For First Time Since World War Days

SALEM, Ore., May 11 (AP)—Major General George A. White, commander of the national guards in the Pacific northwest, announced today the largest concentration of guard troops for maneuvers on the Pacific coast since the World war will be held at Fort Lewis, near Tacoma, starting June 11.

Seven thousand men and 600 officers from Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana will be under canvas for the 10-day intensive training.

The troops comprise the 41st central division. It will be the first time the units have been assembled since the return from France in 1919.

At the same time the 249th coast artillery will train at Fort Stevens, Ore.

Intensive training will continue for 10 days and will be climaxed by division combat exercises ending June 20. On Sunday, June 23, the division will give a parade and review in the presence of the four states and Major General Paul B. Malone of San Francisco, corps area commander.

Movement of the 1100 men from Portland will be military motor transport in 90 flat trucks provided by the government. The Idaho field artillery will train at Fort Stevens infantry likewise will move by motor transport.

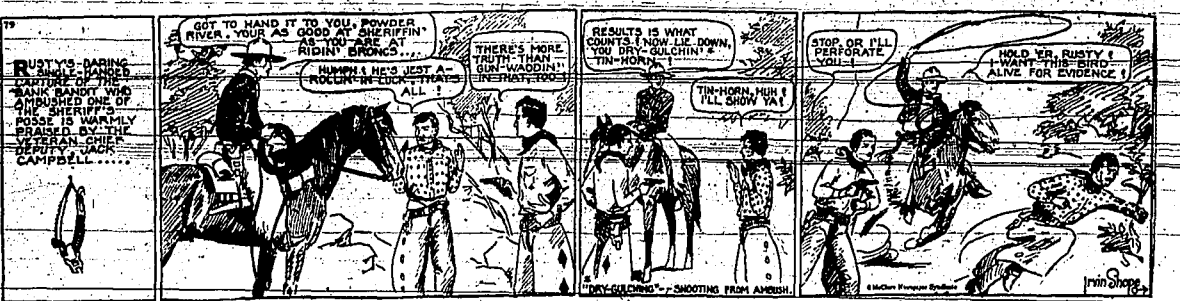

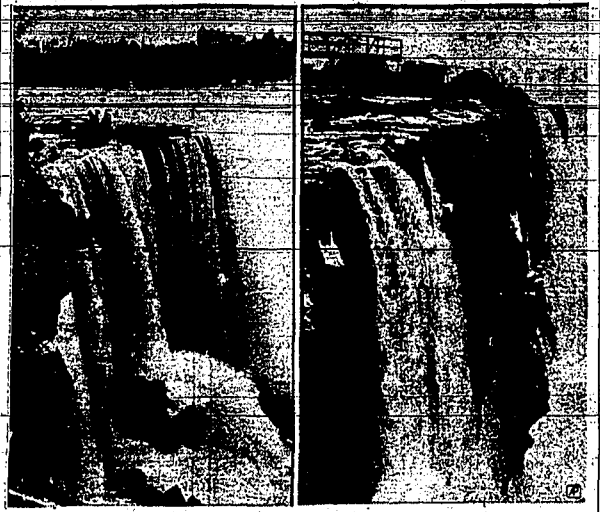

Niagara Isn't What It Used To Be - Water Shortage Dulls Spectacle

NIAGARA FALLS, N. Y., May 10 (AP)—Water shortage and erosion have dulled the spectacle that was Niagara Falls when dad was honey-mooning here.

"The looks sick" A man who hadn't seen Niagara in 30 years stood some 700 feet above the American side and said: "The looks sick." He saw bare ledges above the falls where once there was a sweeping, frothing mass of deep green water.

There are various reasons for the lower levels ever reached by the Great Lakes since records have been kept. The drought of the last few years, an excess in temperature and diversion of water through the Chicago drainage and the Welland canal have been factors.

President Roosevelt has taken the lead in "save the falls" campaign. Only recently he directed opening of negotiations with Canada looking to the preservation of the falls.

Water levels in the lakes run in cycles. The last high water cycle was in 1925. Past records seem to indicate even lower levels this summer and there fore less water for Niagara Falls.

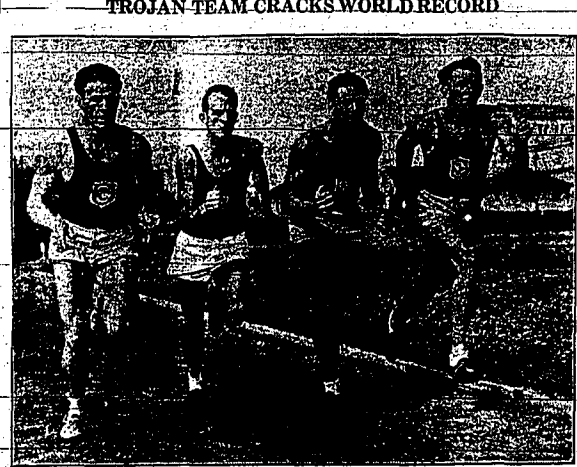
