RENO, Nev., May 14 (AP) — The Countess Marie Haugwitz-Reventlow, formerly Princess Barbara Hutton (Molvani), was honeymooning in California today with a handsome new husband.

A few hours after their marriage here this morning, the newlyweds left by automobile for San Francisco where they planned to stay for an indefinite period.

With Barbara's chauffeur, Clinton Cline, at the wheel of her big grey sedan the two left the residence of Dr. and Mrs. A. J. Bar-Hood at 1215 p. m. and headed west toward California.

Two Reno police cars escorted them to the western city limits.

As they left the residence, the shades in the rear of the car were drawn. The countess, however, leaned forward and smiling waved to "camera" news.

A long string of automobiles manned by photographers joined in pursuit of the car but with police escorting the bride couple the pursuers were shortly out-distanced.

Count Kurt Haugwitz-Reventlow, handsome 39-year-old Danish nobleman, left some \$25 bets today as he won a \$40,000,000 bride, the beautiful 22-year-old Princess Barbara Hutton.

**COUNTY RESISTS HOSPITAL AWARD**

Commissioners Call for Re-hearing in Suit on \$25,000 Claim

Called upon by Idaho's supreme court for \$25,000 damages on account of alleged neglect of a patient at Twin Falls county general hospital, Twin Falls county commissioners yesterday petitioned the supreme court for a re-hearing in the case.

The supreme court, proceeding according to the county's legal advice, on the assumption that the county was operating the hospital "in the field of private enterprise" reversed its decision. Justices who dismissed the claim of the hospital patient, Miss Marie Henderson, had claimed damages for a nurse giving an injection of a solution not prescribed by her physician.

**Deer Private Enterprise**

The commissioners deny that the hospital is operated as a private enterprise for profit, and have retained special counsel represented in subsequent proceedings in the case by Edward Babcock, prosecuting attorney, J. W. Porter, assistant, and J. R. Bothwell and Harry Pook.

Incidental Function

"The fact that the county may and does receive pay patients so far as its facilities permit, does not alter the rule on the purpose for which the hospital was erected and is operated. The acceptance of pay patients is merely incidental to the governmental function of caring for the poor."

The petition points out that the fourteen amendments to the federal constitution provide that private property shall never be taken without due process of law, and argues that the fundamental character of the hospital as a public utility, and not private, purpose, and that "the supreme court address to its present decision the statute under which the county hospital was erected and is maintained are therefore unconstitutional."
