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**BANK-BILL TERMINED**  
**FOUR TO SECURITY**

**Exercise of Powers Granted Threatens Benefits to Aggd. Jobless**

WASHINGTON, May 18 (AP)—The committee banking bill to measure utilized at the time of the Treasury secretary and French minister of finance, and chairman of the Chase National bank predicted today that if all its powers were used the "practical value of all the security legislation would sweep away."

Recommendations Changes After recommending a score of changes, including the reduction of the membership of the reserve board from eight to five by removing the treasury secretary and chairman of the currency as ex-officio members, and one appointive member, Aldrich ripped into what he termed the "three experts" who were "discredited" and said they "left behind them a vast amount of explosive material which some future effort may set off."

The three administrative "experts" who were named were the open market policy officer, the government obligations by the reserve banks, the deviation of the dollar parity with the purchase of gold at prices above the old gold parity, and silver buying.

Always Effective Agencies "There are already sufficient agencies of government for full enforcement of the laws of the land. It is unnecessary to create more agencies, but to be strengthened, but not replaced with personal government."

"The prevention of waste in mineral resources should be carried by the states operating under federal encouragement interstate compact. This is an American method of eradicating economic abuses and wastes, as distinguished from Fascist legislation."

"The multitude of code administrators, agents or committees has made every citizen, and whether organized or not, engaged in the coercion and intimidation of presumably free citizens. The codes have increased the public of the benefits of fair competition."

"This whole NRA scheme has added the American people with the most are of monopolies we have ever known. However, the NRA is defined, its objective is to fix prices or to limit production or to stifle competition. Any one of these evils produces the other two, and it is no remedy to take part of them out. These have been the very aim of the NRA business monopoly since Queen Elizabeth. **Code Increased Costs**

"My investigations over the country show that the codes have increased costs of production and distribution, and therefore prices. Thus they have driven some from consumption and increased unemployment. They have increased the cost of living, and have a heavier burden on the American farmer."

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**PHYSICIANS STUDY 'FLU' IN ALASKA**

**Medical Experts Rush to Scene of Latest Epidemic**

SEATTLE, May 18 (AP)—Medical scientists are studying the cause of the "flu" epidemic against the wily "flu germ," cause of self-renewing epidemics in many parts of the world, finds a new field of action at Fairbanks, Alaska, up on the rim of the Arctic.

Sending "the importance" of any epidemic, two Philadelphia physicians, Dr. Horace Pettit and Dr. Margaret Pepper, arranged to leave Newark, New Jersey, by plane late tomorrow night in a dash which should take them to the ice-bound town of Fairbanks, Alaska, by air to Fairbanks, and again by air to Fairbanks and Point Barrow, the two University of Pennsylvania bacteriology experts will rush to the scene of the Arctic outbreak.

The epidemic, which has taken at least 15 lives, all but one of them natives, offers an unusual opportunity to gain valuable new information for the long-sought "cure," method that was used in 1918-19. The Philadelphia physicians are carrying no serum north to combat the epidemic, they said in Philadelphia. They merely seek blood serum from victims and convalescents of disease, to be kept alive in a traveling laboratory and to be studied here at their laboratories for work upon them.

**150,000 Magpies Victims of Game Department Drive**

BOISE, May 18 (AP)—The state game department's 30-day drive to destroy magpies ended tonight and possibly as many as 150,000 of the birds have been killed during that time, it was estimated by Mrs. Lucille B. Burt, director of the department.

Her estimate was based upon payment last June of approximately \$2,800 in bounties on the birds to hunters, she said. WASHINGTON, May 18 (AP)—Senate administration leaders maintained today they were holding plenty of voting strength to sustain President Roosevelt's prospective veto of the Patman bonus bill despite recurrent reports that Vice President Garner was advising senators to over-ride the chief executive.

NO CURRENCY DEBASEMENT. The American people have been thoroughly warned about the dangers of currency inflation.

Such debasement of currency means, when carried to extremes, utter destruction of the existing medium of exchange. That destruction carries with it all property values represented by existing money.

Such a disaster has probably been regarded by most Americans as impossible in this country. The driving forces for the vast, ruinous inflation of various foreign countries after the war do not exist here.

The procedure sought by Congress, forcing two billions of unsecured greenbacks into circulation in the form of a veterans' bonus, is neither right nor safe.

It didn't take long for enthusiasts to decide that the dime chain letter was a piker and to start \$2, \$3 and \$5 chains.

A system supposedly eliminating chance and cheating was devised: A customer who purchased a \$5 letter was taken before a notary public. The notary made certain the customer put \$5 in the mail, addressed to the person whose name topped the list on that particular chain.

It is hard for some persons to see why the thing is a fraud and a racket. They don't realize that even letters honestly started and forwarded by honest individuals would increase so rapidly that everybody would receive a great many letters and would have to send out again as many dimes as he took in.

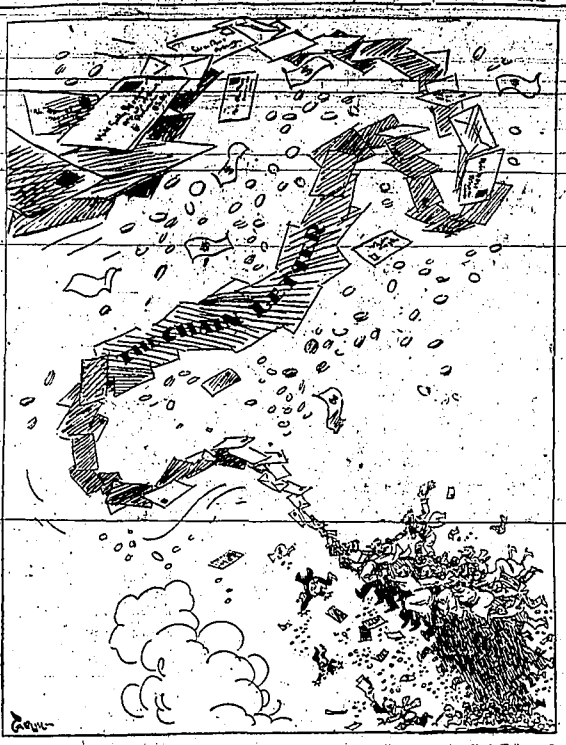

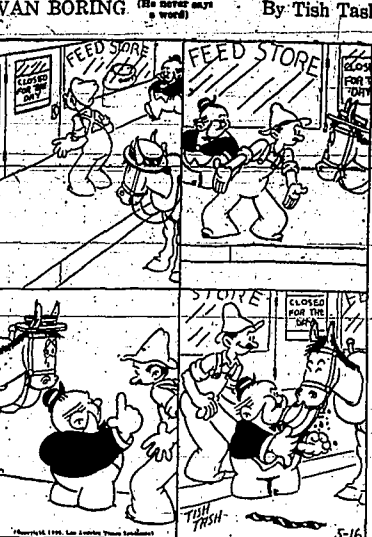

Taxes unpaid for the years of 1922, 1923 and 1924 may be paid before the 4th Monday in June, 1935, without penalty and interest, except the 2% penalty that was added when they became delinquent.

If you wish to take advantage of the half year payments every 6 months, you may pay the balance that is unpaid in this manner: before the 4th Monday in June, 1935, tax plus 2% penalty, plus 1/2 of 1% per month beginning January 1, 1935 to end of month in which paid.

If you fall in 2 payments on the years 1928 to 1931 inc., property goes to County without further notice. If you are only back on the 1932 and 1933 taxes and you fall in 2 of the 6 months payments, you still have 3 years after that date, January 1, 1934, to redeem.

Property in the name of the County which has not been sold for taxes prior to 1928 may be redeemed by previous owner before July 1, 1935.

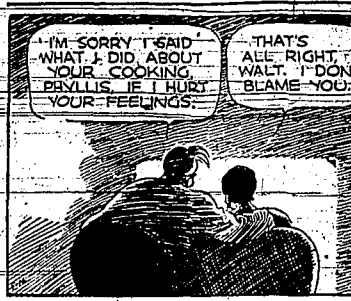

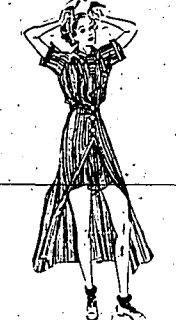
