SENATE ENDORSES WAGNER PROPOSAL

Labor Disputes Bill Sweeps Through With Only 12 Negative Votes

WASHINGTON, May 16 (AP)—Caucusing such momentum that only twelve negative votes of "no" were recorded against it, the Wagner labor disputes bill designed to guarantee the rights of workers to bargain collectively, today swept through the senate and went to the house.

Only eight Republicans and four Democrats placed themselves openly in opposition in the 63 to 12 ballot, widely considered a major victory for labor. Bitterly fought by many industrial factors, it places a ban against all company unions dominated by employers and provides for a permanent national labor relations board with power to order plant elections, said they were confident President Roosevelt would approve it.

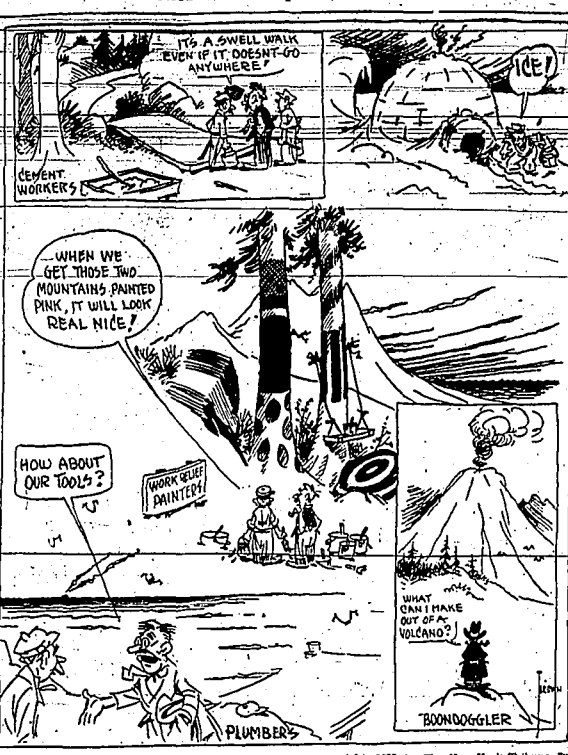

NEW DEAL SETS UP PUBLICITY AGENCY

Elaborate Unit to Explain Four Billion Dollar Work Program

WASHINGTON, May 16 (AP)—The new deal set out today to establish the most elaborate and intricate new deal publicity unit that this capital has yet seen.

The bureau will administration spokesman announced the complexities of the \$4,000,000,000 work program.

Instructions have gone forth from the office of Chairman Frank C. Walker of the national emergency council and one of the boss men of the work program to use available administration publicity personnel as far as possible because of contentions—passed and spoken—that the new deal has employed a hundred or so newspapermen for press agent purposes.

Centrally located on the first floor of a downtown business building, the work program bureau is to have its private telephone system to connect the sixty odd agencies involved in the work relief set-up.

In each of the sixty scattered agencies a man will be delegated to give information to the "clearing house."

Morton L. Milford, PERA publicity chief, is to be the guiding hand for the publicity mechanism, coordinating such information as the PWA, PERA, rural electrification, home-steads, housing, and various other agencies and departments think should be given out. The offices are in a building a stone's throw from the treasury, with rails built to bar the public, private offices for the "public relations" men; big boards on a chain table for press releases, and a room for reporters.

28 Youngsters Sacrifice Money To Rescue Dog

MILWAUKEE, May 16 (AP)—Pal is just a mongrel dog, but he's so true a friend to 28 youngsters of a West Side neighborhood that they've sacrificed their pennies, nickels and dimes to save him from the dog pound.

It was the children who named the dog Pal, and fed their friend with food saved from their own lunches.

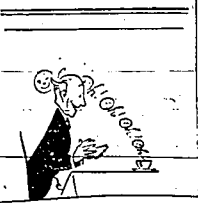

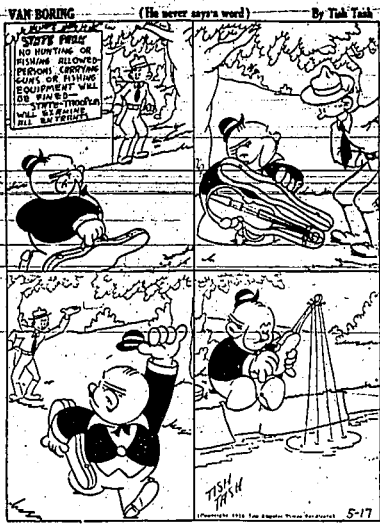

Two Spurn Aid Of Friends and Die of Hunger

ABERDEEN, Scotland, May 16 (AP)—A tragedy of pride which spurred charity from friendly neighbors was laid bare here with the discovery of the almost mummified bodies of an aged man and his sister, dead two months of hunger.

Another sister lay on a plank bed in the house of death at King street in a dying condition.

To police who broke into the house the 63-year-old woman, hardly able to speak, explained thus the presence of 800 found in the bare cupboard:

"I was afraid to spend the money for food for fear we would be unable to pay the rent."

Questioned as to how long it had been since she had eaten, she replied: "I used to get a roll and a cup of tea at a nearby shop once a day. I remember how long ago that was."

A post-mortem revealed that the victims—Frederick Butcliffe, 61, whose family was once well-to-do, and his sister, 71—had been dead at least two months. But the surviving sister did not know they were dead.

"They are sleeping," she mumbled to the police. "Don't wake them, poor things, because when they are awake hunger makes them so unhappy that it makes me cry."
