A REGRETTABLE INCIDENT

MAJORITY DECISIONS

There has been more disgruntled talk about "five-to-four decisions" since the Supreme Court decided the railroad pension act. Much of this comment is based on the feeling of "liberals" that, as the court stands today, with four justices almost uniformly giving a conservative interpretation and four a lib-eral interpretation to constitutional questions, the decisions are virtually in the hands of one middle-of-the-road justice who inclines sometimes to one side and sometimes to the other. Naturally such decisions are not so conclusive as decisions commanding a larger majority would be.

Many constitutional authorities hold that Congress can make a larger majority of jus-tices necessary to invalidate a congressional act. It was long questioned by Congress whether the Court really had any authority whether the Court really had any authority at all to annul acts of Congress. Precedent seems to have settled that point, but the argument for a more decisive majority vote

The chief question seems to be how large a majority is desirable. Senator Borah in 1928 submitted a bill that would have reguired a seven-to-two vote to invalidate-con essional laws. Several states have clauses their constitutions defining their own courts' authority in such matters, Ohio for instance requiring concurrence of five judges out of seven. The majority most frequently suggested nowadays for the Supreme Court of the United States is six to three.

Some congressmen urge a constitutional mendment explicitly giving Congress this ower. Others maintain that it already has such power under a clause giving the Su-

tions and under such regulations as the Con gress shall make:"We shall probably hear more about this.
