ARMAMENTS RAGE DECLAIMED BY HITLER ON WAR'S VICTORS

Reich, Desiring Only Peace to Complete Repairs at Home, Caught in Dangerous Contest, Fuehrer Says

(By The Associated Press) BERLIN, May 21.—Reichsfuehrer Adolf Hitler tonight blamed Europe's dangerous struggle on nations victorious in the World War which imposed the Versailles treaty upon Germany.

In an impassioned address to the reichstag, summoned into special session, he scathingly denounced other powers for violating the peace treaty's arms limitations, thus forcing the reich to arm.

Hearings by Millions. "The government's effect has pronounced his eagerly awaited address on foreign policy, which the radio carried to millions throughout Germany, the Fuehrer said, protested Germany's desire for peace.

"Germany of today is immersed in the tremendous work of repairing its domestic economy. None of our subjects of a factual nature will be completed before 10 or 20 years. None of our tasks of an ideal nature can find fulfillment before 50 or even 100 years."

Declaring the present "veritable mania of collective and cooperative effort," the spiritual property of the American President, Wilson, Hitler said the Versailles treaty pronounced the death sentence upon the collective, cooperative efforts of the world.

"In that treaty, he declared, there was put a classic occasion of a victor's and vanquished in place of a just fight."

Illinois House Blasts Hopes Of 1,200,000 For Immediate Relief

State's Unemployed Face Grim Fight For Existence

(By The Associated Press) SPRINGFIELD, Ill., May 21.—The hopes of Illinois' 1,200,000 jobless for early resumption of relief were dashed late today and they faced the prospect of receiving no federal or state aid again until July 1.

The first blow came with failure of the house of representatives to adopt a bill increasing the sales tax from two to three percent by an emergency majority of 67. Passage would have provided relief funds immediately.

No provisions were made for food for the needy in the meantime. Harold C. Brown, state treasurer, has repeatedly warned he would send no more federal grants to the state until it advances \$50,000,000 as his share of the relief cost.

March On Springfield. SPRINGFIELD, Ill., May 21.—Channing "Homer" Horner, when he led a mob of 3,000 unemployed, in letters "marched" on Springfield today to agitate for immediate reopening of relief stations.

By nightfall the majority had departed dejectedly for their homes after learning that probably no state relief funds would be available before July 1.

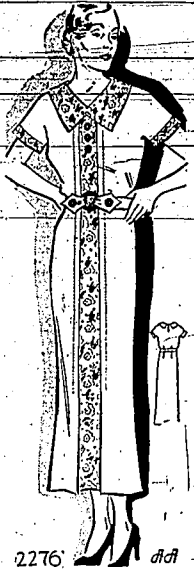

### THE FUTURE OF N.R.A.

Strange as it may seem, General Hugh Johnson, late chief of N.R.A., and Donald Richberg, his successor and one-time counsel for N.R.A., under Johnson, are an absolute unit in their defense of the relief programme under the act notwithstanding the fact that up to quite recently they have been bitter and abusive enemies.

Johnson agrees with Richberg that if N.R.A. goes into the discard between two and three million persons will be out of jobs automatically. The point constitutes the chief argument of each in favor of a continuation of the N.R.A. programme.

In the West, especially in small towns, there is little to indicate that N.R.A. is still an active force. Presumably the set-up of a year ago is being adhered to but it is a question if there would be any noticeable change in business conduct if the recovery programme were relieved of legal backing. This is not true of the more densely populated centers of the East where the restraint of law has always been necessary in the interests of any reform movement.

But it is refreshing to find Richberg and Johnson on the same side of any controversy. Now if it were only possible to gain the support of Father Coughlin.

### CRAZY CONTESTS

The zenith in public contests seemed to have been attained in Cleveland's "diaper derby," when two dozen mothers and one father competed for a time record in "changing" the baby. But not so. Seattle is putting on a series of events to which that was a mere sideshow. "A little foolishness is a delightful thing for the citizens," observes Mayor Charles L. Smith, so he prepares to give them a lot.

A "spavin derby" already held in Seattle proved to be a wonderful success. The citizens were as much interested in that race of broken-down nags as if they had been world-beaters. The parks, he holds, belong to the citizens, and he is willing to give them the kind of entertainment they want. So he springs the great "cat derby," with collateral attractions.

"Fifty gentlemen," he explains, "attired in nightshirts, will spring from bed and run seven yards, each carrying a cat. The cat will be heaved over the neck. The rolling pin relay will follow. Fifty comely housewives, clad in pajamas, will race with rolling pins. And mind you, I'll have no throwing of rolling pins at husbands. Finally we'll have the ice men's relay. The ice men will center along, carrying fifty-pound blocks of ice. The winner will be rewarded by a kiss from an attractive housewife."

All this, and more, will be part of a civic holiday on May nineteenth to "take people's minds off their troubles." Let's hope the idea is not catching.

### SOCIALIST AND KING

One of the most interesting expressions of loyalty to King George V was the speech made in Parliament by George Lansbury, Socialist, and leader of the Labor Opposition group, approving a motion to present an address of congratulation to the King. A few excerpts from that speech follow:

During this reign revolutions really have taken place regarding the political and social condition of the people. To us the political and social life is a big thing to look back and realize the political advance in power which has taken place on the part of the people to which I belong. Here, within this reign, we have peacefully conquered political power.

"I want our country to respond to the appeal of His Majesty. I want our country to say we are going to top the copingstone on the advances our people have made in political and social freedom and to say that we are going by one means or another to win economic freedom."

A king who knows his place and duty as head of a great democracy can win loyalty like that. Perhaps without that symbol of unity which the King presents in his own person, the different political factions of Great Britain would not have been able to work together so well and to "muddle through" to a solution of their troubles as they seem to be doing now.

### NEW DEAL IS AN OLD DEAL

A very interesting historical note is thus brought to light in the column of Fred Nicordoff, financial editor, in the Seattle Post-Intelligencer of March 22, 1933.

"The Emperor of China, in the year 1800 appointed the great Chinese socialist and statesman, Wang An-shih, to the post of state counselor. Mr. Wang proceeded for ten years to try out a radical program of social experiments that resulted in failure and the banishment of the radicals to Mongolia. The theory and nature of these great experiments by Mr. Wang An-shih are described by Dr. Herbert H. Dowen and Jeff. Washington Hall, authors of "An Outline History of China," and the following quotations are from their history:

"The state," he said, "should take the entire management of commerce, industry and agriculture into its own hands with a view to succoring the working class and preventing them from being ground into the dust by the rich."

"He caused the establishment of tribunals throughout the land to regulate the daily wage of the laborer and the daily price of merchandise. 'The produce of the land was to be used, first, for the payment of taxes; secondly, for the needs of the district in which it was produced, and thirdly, for sale to the government of the remainder, to ward off an increase in value.' 'Taxes were to be provided by the rich, and the poor were to be exempt. Large reserves of money were to be held in the state to provide pensions for the aged, support for the unemployed, and help for the many cases for the failure of this great reform. In some things Wang An-shih showed a considerable lack of practical statesmanship. Again there was the dishonesty of the officials that collected the taxes and distributed the seed. Lastly, there were the physical calamities of drought and famine."

"A conservative reaction set in; the radicals were banished to Mongolia, and there, it is said, their unquiet spirits had something to do with creating the conditions which made possible the career of Genghis Khan."

### FILIPINOS WILL BE FREE

After having lived for more than a third of a century under American rule, the Filipinos, voting for the first time on the question of independence are reported to be 23 to 1 for separation from this country. This, American anticipated, is something of a blow to the world. We know that American ownership of the islands has brought many benefits to its inhabitants. Even though the recall of Moro had to be persuaded by warfare and the water cure, we had their own good in mind. We found an archipelago, as large as Nebraska and half of South Dakota, existing by means of a primitive agriculture, misgoverned by Spain, and most of its people barbaric. We established schools, built up a foreign market, pacified the cannibals, and even celebrated the Sultan of Bulu in a musical comedy, but it has not been enough. The island wants to be free.

Freedom won't be effective for 10 years. The Filipinos are to have that long in practicing self rule under the benevolent guardianship of Uncle Sam, while our country is being watched on our business men make such readjustments as seem wise. At the end of the period the Philippines will rank as a sovereign state, navigating under their own power in the perilous seas of internationalism. Will Japan, less altruistic than the United States, extend its sway over the islands then, as it has been penetrating Manchuria and Mongolia that is one of our worst enemies? It is hard to tell. The Philippines expect no tears on this score, and Japanese statements have denied any such ambitions. One phase of America's adventure in imperialism thus is entering its final stage. The Philippines episode will be marked in our history books by the story of Dewey's astonishing victory in Manila bay, by our army's more cautious retreat in pulling down the leaders' rebellion, by the capture of Aguinaldo, by the realization that the Philippines' frontier gave us a sometimes ticklish Pacific problem, and by an adventure in colonization which was, when the test came, rejected by those we sought to help. Nebraska farmers will be granted aid at the removal of competition with wheat from America. American country will receive aid from a region where we never belonged. The Filipinos will be faced with the complex problems of their own government. Everybody ought to be happy.

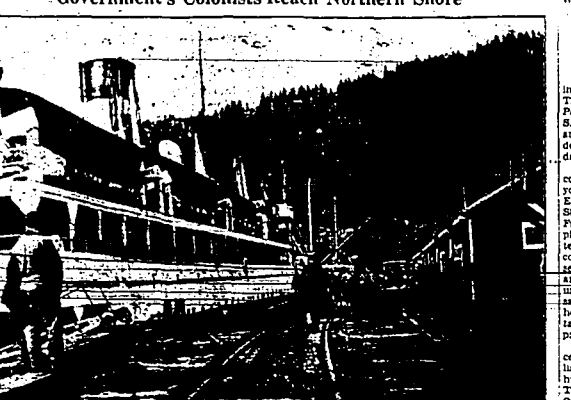
