For some time past the hope has been generally entertained that the activities of the Federal police authorities had about wiped out the crime of kidnaping. Comes now the case of George Weyerhaeuser, scion of the wealthy Weyerhaeuser family of Tacoma.

This latest outrage runs true to form and This latest outrage runs true to form and, as ever, the family proceeds to get into touch with the criminals with a view to paying the ransom. As a matter of fact it is difficult to see what else they could do but the effect of such proceedure is the biggest single element in the success of the kidnaping racket. Any in the success of the kinnaping racket. Any man with money would pay out all or any part of it to preserve the life of his son and he would do this in defiance of law if that became necessary. The kidnapers count on this and on the further fact that the victim will use his best efforts to see that the law does not interfere in the case until the ranson

is safely paid.

These varied elements make of kidnaping one of the most victous of all crimes and one of the most difficult to stamp out.

### FIFTY YEARS HENCE

No living man, we may assume, is wise enough to see clearly 50 years ahead. But guesses by intelligent men who have studied history and present conditions and labored to discover trends are always interesting. Here is a forecast by Rabbi A. H. Silver of Cleveland, one of the leaders of Jewish thought in America, who has a strong interest in social and economic developments.

Fifty years ago, he reminds us, we thought democracy was winning the world and con-tests over race and religion and human rights were dying out. Yet look at the human race now, with democracy lapsing and dictator-ships arising in half the world. How will it be hereafter?

First, he believes, there will be no collapse

Second, there will be a growing social con-

Third, government will concern itself morand more with the economic fortunes of its citizens, holding itself responsible for their protection, although considerable private ini-tiative will remain in business and philan-

Fourth, there will be, half a century from now, no need of public relief, because with security of jobs, and unemployment and old age pensions along with private savings, peo-

ple will be provided for.

Fifth, there will be better protection for motherhood and childhood.

It will be interesting to check up on these prophecies 50 years from now.

The depression, it appears, has done some-thing for education, and done it by changing the mental attitude of young people. It is easier to teach boys and girls now, because they're willing to learn.
