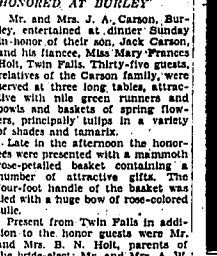

Edwin Booth founded the Players club, and always it has been a quiet, retiring organization. Stanford White decorated its perfect old house into which few women ever have gone.

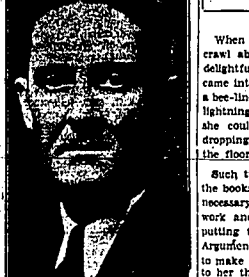
Of course the club has to go outside its membership to get players for the female roles in its revivals. Some of the greatest names in the history of the stage have appeared on Players club programs.

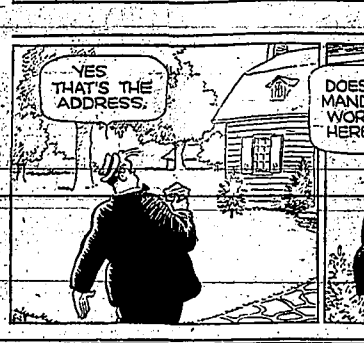

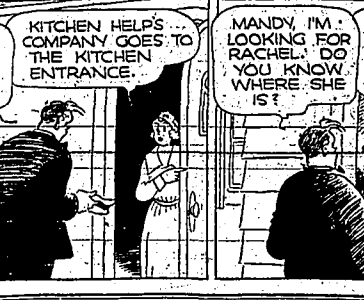

Truck Driver in Collision With J. R. Bothwell Car Sues for \$2550

A jury is to be impaneled in the district court here today to try the cross-complaint seeking for damages totaling \$2350 plus \$75 a month for loss of time from J. R. Bothwell, Twin Falls attorney and former district judge, on account of injuries Williams received in collision with a "six" driver by Miss Elizabeth Bothwell, daughter of Judge Bothwell, and then a member of Twin Falls high school senior class, on the highway two and one-half miles east of Twin Falls late in the afternoon of last February 9.

In a cross-complaint seeking for Memorial of Williams' suit, Judge Bothwell alleges that all damages resulting from the collision were due to Williams' asserted carelessness. Other members of the high school girls' basketball team, returning from a game at Blackfoot and riding with Miss Bothwell when the accident occurred, included Miss Catherine Cowell and Miss Eula Garman, both of whom were severely injured.

Williams alleges that the car swung in front of his truck in such manner that the collision could not be avoided. He asks for damages to cover personal injuries in the sum of \$2000, medical attention, \$100; damage to his truck, \$465, and \$75 a month for loss of work due to disabilities since the accident. He asserts that his lower spine was wrenched, his hip cut and several teeth loosened.

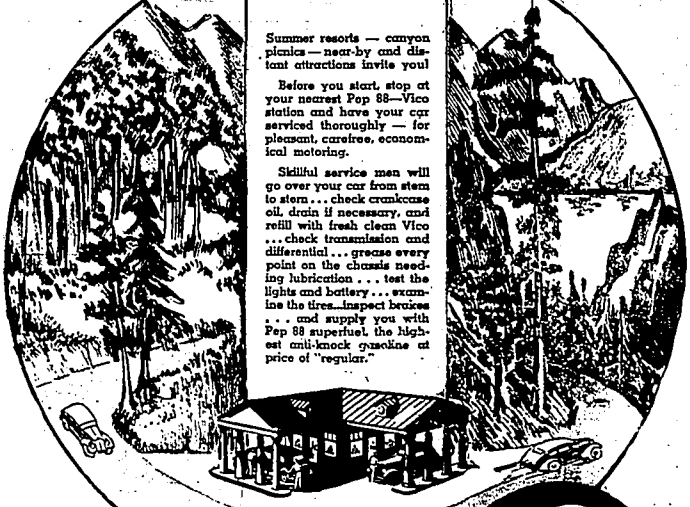
