OMINOUS DEADLINE SET BY ABDUCTORS NEARS AT TAGOMA

Weighty Parents of Kidnaped Boy Insert Advertisement in Newspaper—Store Clerks Contribute Clue

(By The Associated Press) TAGOMA, Wash., May 28.—The parents of George Weyerhaeuser waited in terror-fraught suspense tonight for the next move of their son's kidnapers as the ominous deadline for payment of the \$200,000 ransom approached rapidly.

Less than 24 hours remained of the five-day limit set by the kidnapers who threatened "harm" to the 9-year-old boy unless the fortune was paid.

Fearful of the "egotist" sinister threat, Mrs. M. Mrs. J. P. Weyerhaeuser, Jr., inserted a newspaper advertisement, saying: "I am a mother and I am sure that I can get my son back."

Officials in the case interpreted this as meaning the parents possibly had obtained the ransom money, or were seeking to contact the abductors for further negotiations in efforts to save their child.

Kidnaped Last Friday "The boy was kidnaped last Friday night at his home on the five-day time limit will expire tomorrow."

"The 'egotist,' who signed the ransom note, boasted 'we know what we are doing,' and officials regarded it as likely there were three men and possibly a woman in the kidnap gang."

Private investigators today discovered a hidden ramshackle house near the town of Tagoma, a look-out by the kidnapers, and a report was received that two nervous men had purchased a suit for a boy.

Three clerks said they observed the men in the store. Miss Baily, who was on duty, asked them what they wanted.

"We want a kid's suit something like this for a kid about seven years old," Miss Palmer quoted one of the men as saying.

They chose a brown play suit and a white suit, and the clerk said they were for a boy.

Men Described "Both were young, one being five feet, eight inches tall, with black hair, dark eyes, ruddy cheeks, and wearing a dark blue suit. The other man, wearing a blue sweater, grey trousers, and a dark hat, was of the same build, but slightly in build."

FORMER PRESIDENT LANDS DANDY TROUT

Herbert Hoover, Guest at Bicknell Ranch, Reports Satisfactory Catch

Herbert Hoover, former president of the United States, fished until late last evening in Sand Springs, Idaho, which empties into the Snake river canyon 10 miles northwest of here.

The former president arrived from Boise at R. F. Bicknell's ranch at Sand Springs at 5 o'clock in the afternoon and at once began fishing. He continued casting lines for an hour, until darkness began to fall, and brought back to the ranch house, according to his secretary, "more trout than we could eat."

First Fishing "It was the former president's first fishing excursion on his present trip through Oregon and Washington to Denver, next to be taken on to Iowa to deliver the commencement address at Drake university. It was his first visit to Idaho."

BREAK INDICATED IN TIMBER STRIKE Labor's Spokesmen Reported Confering With Plant Operators

PORTLAND, Ore., May 28 (AP)—Indications that the back of the Pacific Northwest lumber strike involving nearly 40,000 workers is breaking soon were perceived in reports tonight from strike fronts.

A. W. Muir, West Coast executive of the Corporation of American union members, went to Longview today and was understood to be conferring with Weyerhaeuser plant operators.

The Longview Union council has approved the five cents an hour wage increase previously offered by the Weyerhaeuser and Long-Bell lumber plants, and rejected by strikers. It was expected a majority would approve the plan if put to a vote.

There are about 5,000 lumber workers in the Longview area.

SHOTGUNS BLAZE IN BATTLE OF GUARDS AND OHIO STRIKERS

(By The Associated Press) CANTON, Ohio, May 28.—Gunfire punctuated Canton's labor turmoil again tonight and for persons, fell wounded from shotgun slugs.

While a student here, Young was president of the student body and captain of a Varsity basketball team. He will be conferred an commencement, exercises next month.

Redfern Escaped Death, According to American Consul's Message "Several previous reports of Redfern having been seen alive in various places in South America, on investigation have proved erroneous."

Redfern hopped off from Brunswick, Ga., in August, 1927, on a scheduled non-stop flight to Rio de Janeiro.

He was last seen by the master of the Norwegian vessel, Christian Kroeb, on August 25, approaching 185 miles off the coast of Venezuela.

Administration Studies Recovery Legislation Without Decision; AAA and TVA Measures Under Scrutiny

Business Urges Voluntary Standards "WASHINGTON, May 28 (AP)—Guerrilla price cutting and a threatened coal strike of nation wide proportions rode the wreckage of NRA tonight as the new deal groped in some confusion for a pathway into the future."

President Roosevelt summoned congressional advisers, conferred with them the crisis caused by the abrupt sentence of death imposed on the Blue Eagle by the supreme court and—reached no conclusions.

William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor, followed them into the presidential office, frankly discouraged and pessimistic about the future of the United States.

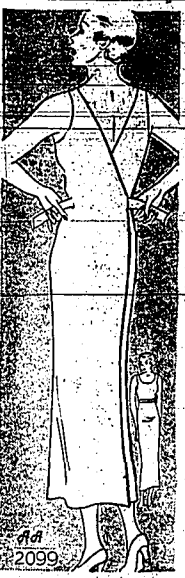

By unanimous action, the first of consequence in a long time, the Supreme Court of the United States has apparently written the final chapter in the story of the efforts of the Federal government to reestablish prosperity through Government control of commerce and industry.

The decision is one of the most sweeping in the history of the Court. Not only did the entire Court membership subscribe to it, but, apparently, no exceptions of any kind are included.

The delegation by the Congress of too much "unfettered" authority to the President is the main point upon which the decision is based, which leads to the thought that a good many other features of the New Deal are apparently threatened as the delegation of authority principle runs very largely through the entire New Deal program.

It is impossible to foresee at this time the effect of such a decision. Industry, unhampered by Federal control, may decide to go ahead on a more extensive scale than ever although the effect in the stock market yesterday gives no such indication.

Richberg, N.R.A. Administrator, requests that industry continue to adhere to the form and spirit of the Act by voluntary action and it is to be hoped that this is done at least until such time as new laws can be prepared.

AIR CONDITIONED TRAINS COMFORT, HEALTH AIDS

Taylor, chairman of the Western Association of Railway Executives. The writer was Doctor Herman W. Bandemer, nationally known health authority and president of the Chicago Board of Health.

"This contribution to the health and comfort of the traveling public should do much to stimulate rail travel through the west this summer. IDAHO CHIEF JUSTICE AT BARRISTERS' MEET

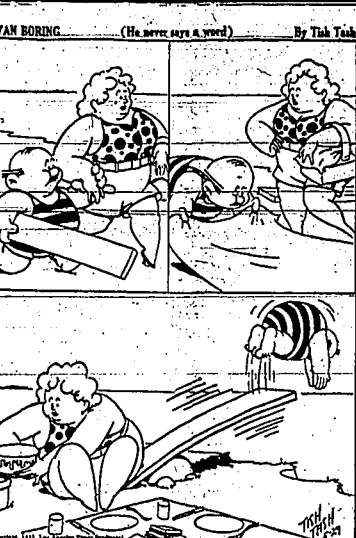

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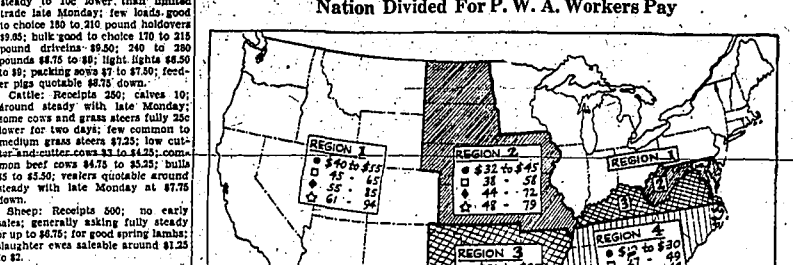


