



BUSINESS' OPPORTUNITY

Business, it appears, now has an oppor-tunity to make good. With the N.R.A. in all its ramifications out of the way there is little ground for complaint at the present time as to government interference with private capital. For the past two years or ever since the establishment of the codes the cry has constant that, left to its ewn devices been constant that, left to its own devices, with the handleap of government control removed, industry would just naturally reabsorb the unemployed and reestablish prosperity in the United States.

The opportunity is at hand.

But it remains to be seen whether Congress is willing to rest upon the present status as set up by the Supreme Court. If an effort is begun to accomplish in another way the thing which the Court declared unconstitu-tional it is altogether likely that capital will continue to rest on its oars. If the present status is accepted and announcement definitely offered that no attempt will be made to reestablish control of industry through the code system it is conceivable that capital will do its best to get under the load.

NO INFLATION YET

The word "inflation" is used pretty loosely, and often improperly, with reference to security and commodity prices and the cost of living. It is always well to keep in mind what the normal standard is, and where we started from in this rise.

Suppose wheat and corn have doubled in Suppose wheat and corn have doubled in price lately, and therefore risch 100 per cent. That is surely nothing for anyone to get worried about if wheat has started up from a abnormal and ruinous "low" of fifty cents a bushel, and if corn has started from twenty five cents. It is the same with stocks. A jump of two hundred or three hundred per cent or two hundred or three nundred per cent for a common stock that is intrinsically good, but was deflated four hundred or five hun-dred per cent during the deflation, is no indication of a runaway stock market or

indication of a runaway stock market or money system.

Similar reasoning applies to the cost of living. It is quite a bit higher than it was a year or two ago, but still considerably lower than the average for the decade preceding the depression. And many things cost less

today than they have for a generation.

All that we have had so far is a moderate "reflection," which of course pinches some of us who have not yet been reflated financially, but which has in general a wholesome effect. We could stand quite a little more reflation if it came uniformly, affecting wages and salaries along with prices.




