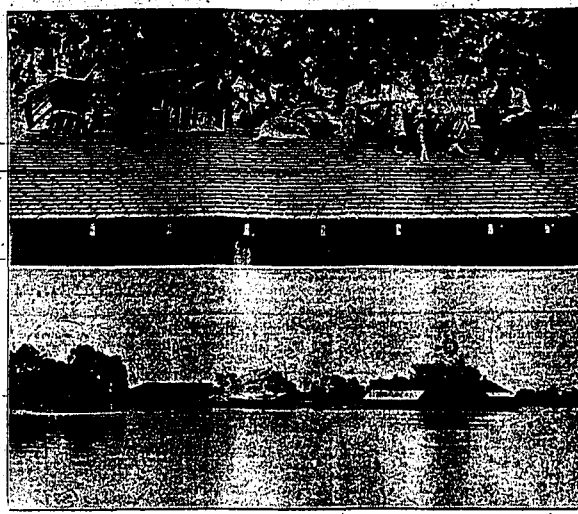

CLARK CALLS FOR POTATO CONTROL

Congressional Bloc Pushes Plan to Restrict Commercial Production

WASHINGTON, June 4 (AP)—Although crop control appears destined to face a constitutionally test in the supreme court, a congressional potato bloc today pushed forward its plan to restrict commercial production of the nation's second greatest food crop by making potatoes a basic commodity.

Appearing before the house agriculture committee, representatives from the major commercial potato producing states urged speedy approval of the Warren control measure.

Hearing for Opponents. Chairman Jones of the committee, announced another hearing would be held at an early date for the benefit of opponents.

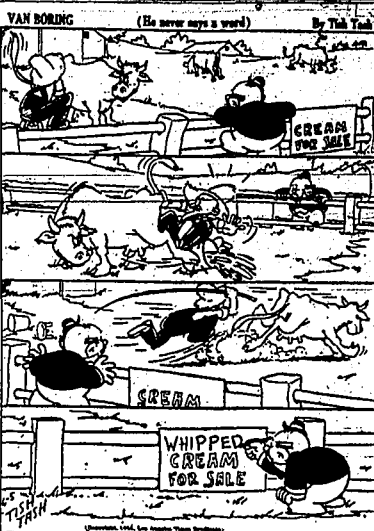
Opponents claim the measure would result in "bootlegging" of potatoes. Under the bill, potatoes would be required to be sold in packages with either a tax exempt stamp or a tax paid stamp attached.

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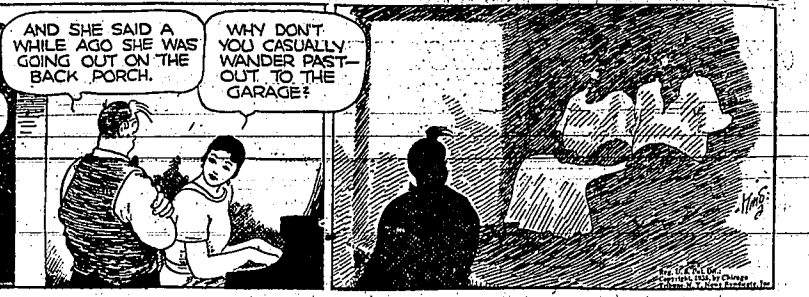

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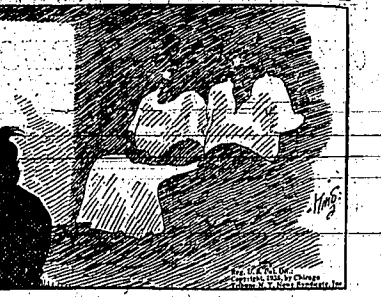

MILLER CHALLENGES IDAHO LIQUOR LAW

Attorney General Seeks Declaratory Judgment in Suit

COCAPELLA, June 4.—To test the constitutionality of the new state liquor store law and determine his own responsibility for its enforcement, Attorney General Bert H. Miller filed a suit in district court here today asking for a declaratory judgment.

He advanced 17 particulars which he asserted the law is in violation of the state constitution and numerous points where he declared it violates the federal constitution.

Set for Hearing

District Judge Jay L. Downing set June 11 for hearing on arguments on the attorney general's petition that the three members of the state liquor commission—Robert Collier, Homer Moore and M. E. Yeaman—and Milton E. Zener, prosecuting attorney of Blaine county, should be required to show cause why they should be relieved from enforcing the liquor law.

The complaint states the suit was brought to procure from the court a declaration of the rights, duties and status of the attorney general with respect to the act, and to enable him to determine whether, as chief law enforcement officer of the state, he is under obligation to require enforcement of the liquor law by state officers and prosecuting attorneys.

Filers Suit in Person

The attorney general filed the suit in person but he could not be located here or elsewhere in southern Idaho for comment. Zener said he had been told by Miller that the action was "a friendly test case of the state liquor law."

At Boise Miller's assistants, two of whom are C. Crowley and J. W. Taylor, signed the petition, declined to comment. The suit was greeted with silence from Frank Miller, attorney for the state liquor commission, and by Commissioner Moore, Chairman Coulter of the commission was absent from Boise and Commissioner Yeaman was ill in a hospital.

Particulars in which the complaint charges the act violates the state constitution include:

That the legislature attempted to delegate to the liquor commission the power to exercise legislative powers vested in the legislature.

That the legislature attempted to confer judicial power on the commission and to make the exercise of such power concurrent with that of the probate and district courts.

That the act attempts to enlarge on the jurisdiction of probate courts and to confer power to enter orders of interdiction.

That the act violates constitutional requirements for unity of subject matter.

That it is entitled "an act to promote temperance in the state of Idaho" but actually includes no matter having relation to temperance.

That it creates a special corporation under the name of the Idaho Liquor Control Commission.

Title Misleading

That the title of the act is misleading and therefore unconstitutional because it purports to place the commission in charge of intoxicants but denies it control of beer.
