Confessed Kidnap Pair Pleads Not Guilty

LOUISIANIAN HOLDS SENATE IN SESSION THROUGHOUT NIGHT

Hoarse and Tiring, Kingfish Battles on With One-Man Filibuster Against Expanding Shadow of NRA

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, June 13 (Thursday)—In the thrall of an almost unprecedented, one-man filibuster by Senator Long (D-La.), the senate stayed on in session into the pre-dawn hours in an effort to wear him down and gain a vote on the resolution to extend a midday NRA.

Despite threats by angry senators to "break" his control, Long still held the floor at 2:00 a. m., eastern standard time, and was nearly into his fifteenth hour of continuous "talk."

Frantic cloak-room negotiating by Democratic leaders in the post-midnight period failed to produce a solution to the impasse. Long, his hair rumpled, hoarse but still shouting was then in his thirteenth hour of talking. He asserted he would continue on past daylight. He seemed to be weeping in the early morning hours.

Madder—and Madder Democratic leaders became madder and madder as Long continued to hold the floor. One powerful group of majority senators publicly served notice on Huey Long in the senate early today that it was out to break his "control."

Senator Schellenberg (D-Wash.), speaking for a group of first-term senators—the real Democratic "middle of the chamber," warned Long that they were "determined" to "never again control the senate," and would fight him "every time he used the methods he has used to break the senate."

The Louisiana staged his show, declared by veteran senators to be the greatest exhibition of physical endurance in the senate's history. In an effort to attach a rider to the NRA resolution, it would require the consent of the new state's anti-Long patronage appointments in Louisiana.

"If we preserve the character and ideals of the people, they will not be destroyed. If we lose our ideals, we will perish."

BORAH'S CLAIM TO PRESIDENCY URGED

Boise Lawyer Declares For 'Emancipation From Grip of Bureaucracy'

MERIDIAN, Idaho, June 12 (AP)—If elected president of the United States, Senator William E. Borah of Idaho would be the man to whom the Republican party could turn "to emancipate our people from the vise-like grip of a vast, bureaucratic form of government."

Before declaring the noted statesman to be Idaho Republicans' choice for president, the United States Brethren declared:

"Proponents of the new deal have no adequate answer to the withering criticisms which it now leveled."

SEAPLANE ROARS TOWARD HONOLULU

Giant Clipper Ship Heads Into Cloudy Weather Over Pacific

ALAMEDA, Calif., June 12 (AP)—Roaring steadily toward Honolulu, first of a 4,000-mile flight, the Pan American airplane headed into cloudy weather over the Pacific.

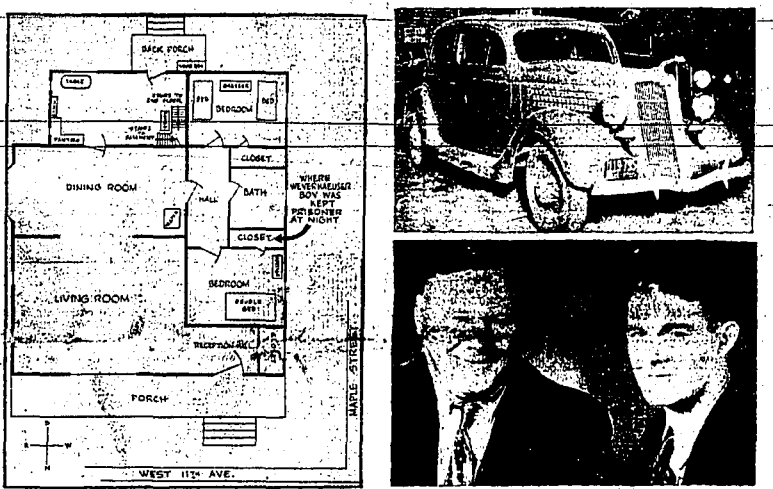
The big flying boat, which soared away from its San Francisco base here at 2:59 p. m., had 11:30 p. m. eastern standard time, and was flying over the Pacific.

The clipper plane flew against a 22-mile head wind the first three hours of the flight but averaged 115 miles an hour.

At 7 p. m. Captain Mauck reported the plane had passed over the Hawaiian Islands.

Last April the clipper flew from here to Honolulu in a little more than 17 hours. She returned without incident.

LASKA WEEPS AT SENSATIONAL TRIAL

Witnesses Testify to Alleged Death Threats Made by Attorney

OKLAHOMA CITY, June 12 (AP)—Sensation followed sensation in the \$200,000 kidnaping conspiracy trial of Ben H. Laska here today as the government's two star witnesses testified to alleged death threats made to them.

Appearing in his own defense to the government's allegation he received \$10,000 of the Charles H. Laska and \$200,000 ransom as a fee for defending Albert Bates, and at the same time directed disposal of Bates' ransom money to the boy Laska directed repeatedly with prosecuting lawyers.

Mrs. Clara Feldman, wife of Bates, and her son, Edward, both testified to the death threats, both asserting Laska told them "I'll have your throat cut if you let anyone know you had that money."

The attorney testified, read to the \$20,000 Bates received as his share of the United ransom and left with them in their Denver apartment.

The irrepressible Laska, whose antics kept spectators on the edge of their chairs during his cross-examination of Mrs. Feldman and her son, was treated fairly to judge Vaughn during one episode of the trial and sobbed:

Waleys In Court At Tacoma After Flight From Utah

Nonchalant Couple Answers To Mail Fraud Conspiracy And 'Lindbergh Law' Charges Then Speed To Jail

Hunt for Mahan Turns Northward

(By The Associated Press) TACOMA—Mr. and Mrs. Harmon M. Waley, confessed participants in Weyerhaeuser kidnaping, brought from Salt Lake City by airplane, pleaded not guilty to mail fraud conspiracy and "Lindbergh law" charges, and are lodged in jail at Olympia.

George Weyerhaeuser, kidnap victim, and father, J. P. Weyerhaeuser, Jr., lumber magnate, return home after unexplained absence.

TACOMA, Wash., June 12—Plea of not guilty to two charges growing out of the George Weyerhaeuser kidnaping, were entered here tonight by Mr. and Mrs. Harmon M. Waley.

While the hunt for William Mahan, ex-convict supposedly implicated by the Waleys, went on from Butte, Montana, to Canada on a new set of "hot clues" the suspected couple, formally denied guilt of both "Lindbergh law" and mail fraud charges.

In jail at Olympia Bond was set at \$100,000 each on the mail fraud charge. The bond was set in the Lindbergh law case by U. S. Commissioner H. O. Pritch, before whom they were taken under heavy guard.

As swiftly as they were brought in, the Waleys were whisked away 30 minutes later in separate automobiles to the Thurston county jail at Olympia, 35 miles away, where they were placed for safekeeping.

After waiting preliminary hearings by plans after a flight of a little more than five hours from the Utah city, center of the kidnaping investigation since their arrest three last September.

A federal lighted a cigarette for Mrs. Waley. She laughed as she awaited removal from the courtroom and the arrested couple's husband. Both concealed their faces, though, as they passed news cameras.

Only half an hour previously they had arrived in custody of federal agents by plane after a flight of a little more than five hours from the Utah city, center of the kidnaping investigation since their arrest three last September.

Mrs. Waley was first to plead. She asked the commissioner while her husband chattered and slouched near by.

"I read the complaint and asked her if she had an attorney," said the commissioner. "No," she answered. "If it's all the same to the court, I'll waive a hearing and plead not guilty."

Both the Waleys, who had been represented as working with the government agents toward a solution of the \$200,000 ransom kidnaping, seemed amazed.

Government of China Openly Defies Japan

Demands Would Reduce Nation To Status Of Protectorate, Officials Declare

NANKING, June 13 (Thursday)—China "cannot" accept Japan's North China demands, national government officials said early today, because they would reduce China to the status of a "Japanese protectorate."

The statement—the first open defiance of Japan's aggressive military leaders—was made shortly after the national government's central political council, China's highest executive body, met in secret "urgent session" and reportedly decided to reject some, at least, of the Japanese demands.

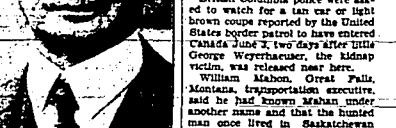
While 800 more Japanese fighting men moved into Tientsin, seat of the 5th Japanese troops, the political council was said to have telegraphed General Hoy Yin-Chin, minister of war, at Peiping.

"Prepare for eventualities should the Japanese carry out threats to advance upon Peiping and Tientsin."

BUYER OF HULLER FAVORED BY JURY

Answers to Interrogatories Support Claim Against Foreclosure

Counsel for Wort West, Twin Falls county farmer, stated last evening that answers returned by a jury to all six interrogatories propounded at trial in the district court here yesterday were all favorable to his position and bore out all of his contentions in his suit to enjoin foreclosure of a chattel mortgage covering a bean huller that he bought in 1929, and a tractor. The jury returned the case shortly before noon yesterday, the third day of the trial, and returned its answers to the six interrogatories at 2:15 p. m. Answers in each instance were reached by unanimous agreement.

Defendants in the case were E. F. Prater, as Twin Falls county sheriff, and the Hills-Chalmers Manufacturing company. The jury found that West, when he signed the mortgage covering the bean huller and tractor, did not know that the tractor was involved in the mortgage, and further, that Harley Williams, salesman, had stated to him of the tractor was not only the huller and that West relied upon these statements. Prater was introduced at trial to show the huller worked imperfectly the first season because of lack of a "back beater," and the jury found that the back beater had been procured for this huller before West bought it, and that the huller in August, 1930, without the back beater, was not complete. The jury fixed the value of the huller in July, 1930, with the back beater, installed, at \$700.

\$7500 Program for Enlarging Stock Handling Capacity Announced

Plans for approximately \$7500 in improvements at Twin Falls stock yards were announced last evening by F. C. Hasach, Oregon Short Line agent, following an inspection visit by L. V. Chasler, division engineer, and F. C. Paulsen, assistant superintendent. Hasach announced the building program as necessary to accommodate increased volume of livestock now being handled by the transit feed yard, operated by M. M. Daniels and F. C. Irwin for the past two years as Twin Falls Stock Yards company.

Proposed plans call for erection of four modern combination single and double deck loading chutes, ten additional stock pens and rearranging and repairing of the present yard, as well as new extensions of water lines and electric lighting.

Twin Falls stock yards during the past two years has become a regular transit feeding point for livestock originating in eastern Oregon, western Idaho and points north of Pocatello, who deliver to northern California by way of Wells. Mr. Hasach said last night that 285 cars of livestock have been shipped through the Twin Falls yards since January 1, 1935.

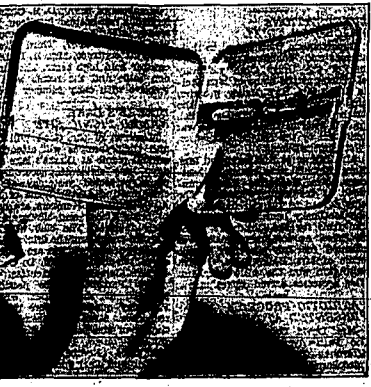

Locomotive Open House Draws Interested Throng

Engine 2031 On Display In Oregon Short Line Observation Of Railroad Week

On exhibition at the coal chutes in Oregon Short Line yards in Twin Falls yesterday, Engine 2031, one of the locomotives assigned to the Twin Falls-Wells run, was inspected yesterday by several hundred interested persons who heard Engineer Joe Nelson and Fireman Hugh Hutchinson explain its mechanism and operation.

Open house at the locomotive was arranged in connection with observation of Railroad week.

Isaiah Information Visitors, invited to enter the café and sit in the pilot's seat were told that the Union Pacific system has engines considerably larger than No. 2031, but that this engine was not a top. It weighs 208,000 pounds. Tank tender has a capacity of 8000 gallons of water and 16 tons of coal. It is known as the Mikado type locomotive. It has four sets of six-cylinder drivers, 24-inch cylinders with 30-inch stroke. It has a fire box 9 by 12 feet, or a fire grate space of 72 square feet. Coal is delivered to the fire box by an automatic air stoker, which the fireman operates—instead of shoveling coal by hand. The boiler, with steam capacity of 190 pounds, has 390 tubes. The engine is equipped with an 8 1/2-inch Westinghouse air pump, capable of pumping up a train of 50 cars to a pressure of 60 pounds per minute for air brake purposes. It has an over all length of 78 feet, and is rated for pulling capacity of 3000 tons.

Engineer on the regular run of the engine that was on display here yesterday, Joe Nelson has been in the Oregon Short Line's engine service since 1901, when he went to
