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ROOSEVELT OKENS SENATE PLAN FOR EXTENSION OF NRA

Labor, Coal and Rail Bills Passage Put at Top of List of White House Demands for Legislation

WASHINGTON, June 13.—Smiling, but with a fist pounding the desk for emphasis, President Roosevelt told his cabinet members today that he expected Congress to pass 14 "must" bills, four of them with all possible speed.

As a result, arrangements quickly were made to put the debate-scarred NRA "stop-gap" bill on the statute books by the end of the month. Chief legislative plans to put through swiftly the other three bills on his "immediate must" list: labor, coal and rail.

Called to White House His instructions were delivered to Speaker Byrns, Representative Taylor of Colorado, acting floor leader; Chairman O'Connor (D-NY) of the rules committee, Chairman Doughton (D-NC) of the ways and means committee and Representative Samuel B. Hill (D-Wash.).

Senators Summoned to a White House conference less than five hours after the senate vote on the NRA extension, the president called a meeting with senators today to adopt the measure extending a remnant of NRA for 90 days.

Senate Sleeps Today, the senate went home to sleep, even on Senator Long's door was a sign "No business today." But in the house things whirled.

James J. Braddock Conquers Max Baer In Bitter Struggle

Long Shot Challenger Takes Unanimous 15-Round Decision And World's Heavyweight Championship

By EDWARD J. NEIL (Associated Press Sports Writer) MADISON SQUARE GARDEN, NEW YORK, June 13 (AP)—Max Baer couldn't lick, and so lanky, hungry Jimmy Braddock, longest loser of them all tonight came gamely, almost unbelievable conclusion of a desperate quest—heavyweight boxing champion of the world.

He came plodding, sometimes stumbling, but always cleared and courageous, in the end, as 30,000 stunned but prayerful spectators screamed him on, sensing one of the most dramatic moments in the history of the prize ring.

He held his hand in victory, crowd, came to hope for him, to suffer with him, not daring to believe he could win. And as he struggled on, gamely fighting the best light that was in him, taking everything the burly Baer hurled at him, shaking off punishment, he was late to settle with his left, punching it out bitterly when he had to with the man whose smallest completely demolished Max Schmeling and the former champion, Primo Carnera—was late to settle.

RIOTING RENEWED IN OMAHA STRIKE

Police Count Six Casualties In Violent Encounters With Mobs

OMAHA, Neb., June 13 (AP)—In a renewal of rioting of sympathy strikers, a mob of 100 street car employees in South Omaha at midnight tonight, seven men, six of them police officers, were killed, and a street car window broken.

Police exhausted their supply of tear gas in attempting to clear a crowd of 1,000 men and sent in a call for reinforcements.

Officers injured when struck by rioting mob, including Police Officer Joseph, Captain Henry Doesen, Joe Fersbach, Joe Vines, Melvin Levin and William Krenke. A majority of the injured policemen returned to duty after first aid treatment.

Also injured was A. M. Steel, Council Bluffs, Ia., street car employee, cut by flying glass when a brickbat smashed a tram window.

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PLANNING BOARD FOR STATE NAMED

Will Simons, Boise, Heads Group to Survey Idaho Resources

BOISE, June 13 (AP)—Governor Ross this afternoon appointed a state planning board in accordance with provisions of an act passed by the 1933 state legislature.

He named Will Simons of Boise, chairman; Eugene Cox of Lewiston, vice-chairman, and Walter Clark of Kellogg, R. E. Shepherd of Jerome and Hugh MacCoshan of Pocatello, members.

The law permits members to draw \$3 daily while on official business and to receive \$100 monthly to the chairman, if his services are required steadily.

The act carries an appropriation of \$25,000.

All members hold office for two years and are empowered to employ necessary assistance.

The board is authorized to survey and investigate the social, economic, physical resources of the state, lands, waters, minerals, facilities for power, transportation, communications, health, recreation, education and all other resources of the state.

Complete files on information assembled must be kept, and reports to the governor and legislature are required periodically.

The board is required to coordinate the work of all research, fact-finding and development bodies of the state and to cooperate with local and regional planning boards and with planning boards of other states.

Scene of Destruction

A long low omnibus column of smoke lay over the entire region and smoke was still rising from the powder factory hours after the explosion, which broke windows three and four miles away.

Reinforced itself was saved from terrible destruction. Nazi officials said, because the factory was isolated.

Some roofs were torn off and hundreds of windows were shattered, but with few exceptions, inhabitants were said to be returning to spend the night at their homes.

Reichsfuehrer Adolf Hitler and all high Nazi officials kept in close contact with the situation.

At Wittenberg, Heidenreich said there was no danger of further blasts as the plant had been flooded.

He asserted:

"It is out of the question for any act of sabotage to have been committed. It was a regrettable accident."

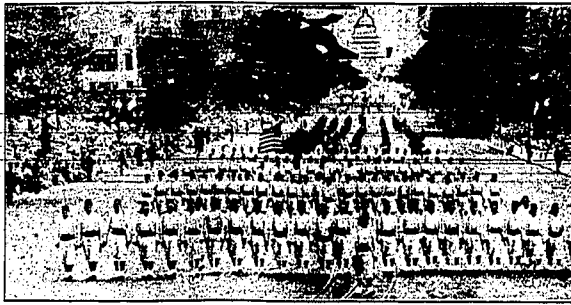

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GOVERNORS URGED TO RESTORE NRA

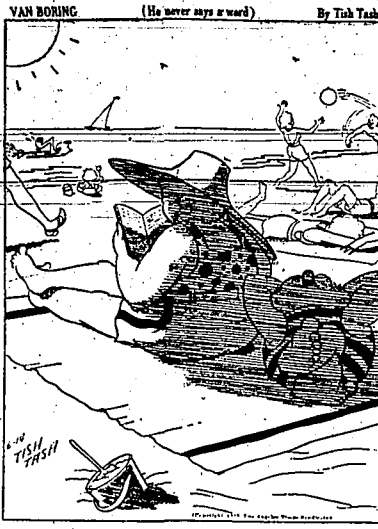
South Carolina Executive Maps Program at Biloxi Conference

BILOXI, Miss., June 13 (AP)—Immediate action to restore the National Recovery Administration was urged upon the nation's chief executives today by Governor Olin D. Johnston of South Carolina on the eve of the opening of the 27th annual governors conference today.

"It is my hope," said Johnston, "that out of this conference we will be able to evolve a plan to have the executives of the states call for voluntary pledges from employers, with a definite and unified course of action to be followed by the labor departments of each state until such time as appropriate state legislation can be enacted."

The national recovery act is one of several major topics scheduled for discussion at the chief executives of half the states of the union gathered to formulate a program of united action dealing with the relation of the state governments to the national program of recovery, relief and reform.

Governor Paul N. McNutt of Indiana, chairman of the conference, will join Governor Johnston in a discussion of the NRA at the conference business sessions.



Communist Leader Released By Nazis

BERLIN, June 13 (AP)—Ernest Thorgler, former Communist leader in the Reichstag who has been in jail since his acquittal in 1933 in the celebrated Reichstag fire trial, has been given his liberty. It was disclosed last night.

Strict secrecy surrounded the release of Thorgler, whose case had been compared to the Sacco-Vanzetti trial in the United States.

It was understood he promised not to reside within the city limits of Berlin and had settled with his family in a quiet spot about 20 miles from a capital.

Congressmen Vote In Poll to Bare Roosevelt Status

WASHINGTON, June 13 (AP)—A secret poll of Democratic congressmen to determine sentiment in their districts toward President Roosevelt's preparation for the 1936 campaign has been begun by the Democratic national congressional committee.

Seven questions were asked in a questionnaire sent to the Democrats by Representative Dewey of Virginia, chairman, along with a letter saying the next campaign means "much to our party and to our-elves individually."

The first three questions read: "What in your opinion is the reaction, personally, to Mr. Roosevelt in your district?" "What is the reaction to the carrying out of the administration's policies?" "Can Roosevelt carry your district?"

The remaining four questions ask the Democratic members of the house their chances for renomination, re-election for a summary of political conditions in their districts and whether the committee can help them individually.

This is the first time in the history of the congressional committee, which generally confines its activities to seeking election of nominees after primaries, that it has conducted a poll so far ahead of a campaign.

Boy Electrocutd On High Tension Lines

DENVER, June 13 (AP)—As his mother and 500 other persons looked on helplessly, James Rogers, 14, burned to death on high tension power lines here yesterday, his body dangling in a mass of flames for 15 minutes.

The boy was retrieving a baseball from the roof of an apartment house when he fell into lines highly charged with electricity.

Police and firemen, unable to aid the boy, held back frantic crowds while time and time again they attempted to hurl a rope to his body and bring it from the wires.

So intense were the electrical charges that the boy's left arm and his legs were severed by the wires and dropped to the pavement. A single power line seared through his body.

Far West Leads Increase In Sales

SAN FRANCISCO, June 13 (AP)—Department store trade is hitting the high spots in the far west. The Pacific coast led the nation in its increase in sales in May, for the second month.

Dollar value of sales climbed 10 per cent over the level of May, 1934, the federal reserve bank of San Francisco disclosed today after making a preliminary survey covering 90 large western stores.

This gain topped all others in the country by a substantial margin, the next largest being a 3 per cent rise in the Minneapolis reserve district. On the whole, United States department store sales were 1 per cent below May, 1934.

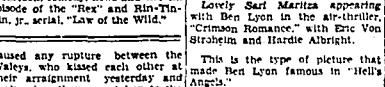

Arizona Executive Leads in Demand for Place in PWA Program

PHOENIX, Ariz., June 13 (AP)—Governor Moore said today he understood the reclamation projects of western states under the PWA program "are jeopardized on account of the ruling that expenditures must be mostly for direct labor."

"Development of irrigation projects is conducive to creation of jobs, increases state and national wealth, plus increased permanent employment from agricultural districts."

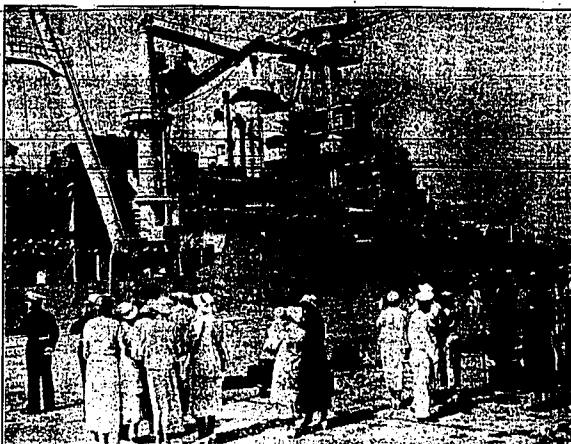

GRASS, FEED GOOD ON IDAHO RANGES

Warmer Weather Brings Improvement, Statistician Reports

BOISE, June 13 (P)—Grass and feed are good although late in the southern and eastern portions of the state, but show a marked decline due to insufficient moisture in the western and northern portions. Richard C. Ross, federal agricultural statistician for Idaho, reported today.

"The outlook for summer feed on the high ranges is good but late," he wrote in his monthly summary.

"Grass and sheep improved materially with the advent of warmer weather which brought an improvement in condition of ranges and pasture.

"The lamb and calf crops are somewhat below average due partly to breeding stock having not fully recovered from last year's drought and short winter feed supplies and also partly to the exceptionally late start of feed on ranges most of which carried little or no old feed. Another factor contributing to the short lamb crop was the unusually large number of dry ewes, especially in the eastern end of the state.

"Losses of cattle and sheep this spring have been lightly above average due to short feed and spring storms.

"Few reports of lambs being contracted have been received."

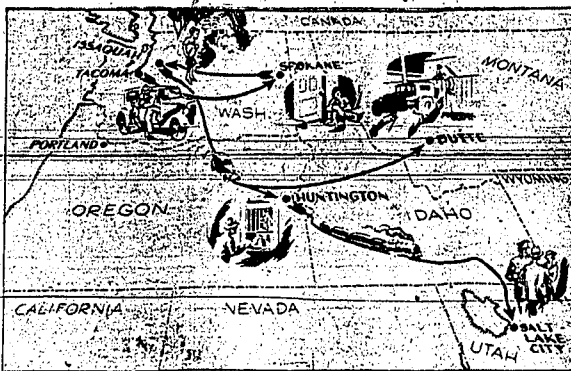

RELIGIOUS REVOLT FLARES IN GREECE

Three Archbishops Accused of Abandoning Ancient Calendar

ATHENS, June 13 (AP)—A religious revolt flared in Greece yesterday with the arrest of three archbishops of the Greek church, as a precaution, authorities said, against possible violence.

The archbishops had severed their connection with the church and urged the clergy to follow them, accusing Archbishop Chrysostomos of betraying the church's interests by accepting the Gregorian calendar.

A statement by the three described the Gregorian calendar as "a sacrilegious western invention" and also accused the archbishop of tolerating Roman Catholic, Protestant and communist propaganda. They will be placed on trial Friday.

Greece, as early as May, 1923, abandoned the Julian calendar but an opposing faction has been celebrating church feasts by that calendar since.

Pope Gregory XIII in 1582 ordered abolishment of the ancient Julian calendar because of its errors in intercalation and its substitution by one receiving favor from all Christian countries under the name of the Gregorian calendar.
