

Lewis J. Taber, Master of the National Grange, is not given to expressing his views without due consideration. When, therefore, Mr. Taber makes the statement that "West-ern civilization now stands at the most pro-nounced crossroads in nineteen centurios" his words are worthy of more than passing consideration.

Speaking at McMinnville, Oregon, Mr.

Taber told the delegates assembled at a

State Grange meeting that the country was
laboring under a social drouth; a drouth of
wisdom in which common sense has been
superceded. He referred to a lack of cooperative spirit and a failure of the pioneer spirit it. And he regards existing conditions as more critical today than at any period since the fall of the Roman mpire. "If we preserve the character and ideals of our people," he declares, "they (the people) will not be destroyed. If we lose our ideals we shall period."


