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## Troops Rule South Omaha Under Martial Law

### WINDS AND FLOODS SWEEP SOUTHWEST AND MIDDLE TEXAS

Devastating Attack by Elements Leaves at Least 13 Persons Dead, Many Missing; Train Service Blocked

(By The Associated Press)  
AUSTIN, Texas, June 15.—Roaring winds joined flood waters tonight in a devastating attack on central and southwest Texas which left 13 persons dead and scores missing.

Losses to crops and property forged into the millions of dollars.

Thunderstorms fed the floods, a twirling wind dipped into a small community near Kaufman, splintered a farmhouse and killed Elmer Barry, 48, before other occupants reached a storm cellar before the wind struck.

"Train Service Paralyzed"  
Houses and bridges were washed away in the rushing stream. Fifteen persons were dead at Del Rio, A. Mitchell, a farmer, was drowned with his wife and two small children. Five were drowned at Kennedy and two at Victoria.

### Youth, 14, Dives Through Window To Rescue Baby

OROVILLE, Cal., June 15 (AP)—While a horrified crowd of 700-1,000 watched from above, Stanley Putman, 12-year-old student, risked his life today in a dive through a store window into the Madison, 15 feet below, to rescue a 17-month-old boy.

The baby, son of Mrs. Irene Heiberger, wealthy Berkeley society lady vacationing at the hotel resort, appeared none the worse tonight for his near drowning.

The infant toddled away from his mother's cabin on the lake shore and had been gone 15 minutes before Stanley dived. The boy was in the lake about 25 feet from shore.

Her hysterical screams attracted the attention of young Putman, who was working in the nearby resort store of his father. Quickly he vaulted through an open window of the store fronting the lake 15 feet into the chilly water below.

The child was clinging to his head on a wharf pilings as he descended.

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### LEADERS CONSULT ROOSEVELT ABOUT UTILITIES MEASURE

Congressional Chiefs to Ask Whether President Will Be Satisfied With Regulation Not Annihilation

(By The Associated Press)  
WASHINGTON, June 15.—New information raising fresh doubt of their ability to jam through a bill abolishing "unnecessary" utility holding companies today prompted leaders of congressional chiefs to ask President Roosevelt if he would be satisfied with something less than abolition.

As a result that determination, both house and senate were foregone their usual Saturday recess to speed their "must" measure before the president's return. The senate worked its way through a batch of minor amendments to the utility security bill, the house was reviewing congressional recommendations to make room for the measure, tax extension and AAA amendment measures Wednesday.

Sentiment Closely Divided

### DEATH TOLL HEAVY IN TRAINS' CRASH

At Least 17 Persons Killed In English Railway Disaster

LONDON, June 15 (AP)—At least 17 persons were killed tonight as a fast train dived with newsmen and a crowd of 250 onto the Weymouth Castle express at Weymouth station, in the metropolitan area.

OMAHA, Neb., June 15.—Ariated forces tonight ruled riotous South Omaha where one man was shot to death and more than 75 others were injured in bloody riots on each of the last three nights.

The national guard of 1800 combat troops took over the city on orders of Lt. Gov. Walter H. Jurgensen, who declared the city under martial law as a result of the bitter fight last night between police and rioters.

As a result of the casualties suffered by the police force, the city and county authorities joined today in appealing to Jurgensen for aid.

Ordered to Post  
First of the guard companies to be mobilized were the Omaha police, who were held at the guard armory for some time before they received orders to take their posts of duty.

Jurgensen's decision was made after Gov. R. L. Cochran, at Springfield, Mo., had recommended 20 companies from the 15th Infantry, National Guard, impressed by the admissions of Omaha authorities that police could no longer fight a winning battle, suddenly ordered out the entire guard and declared martial law.

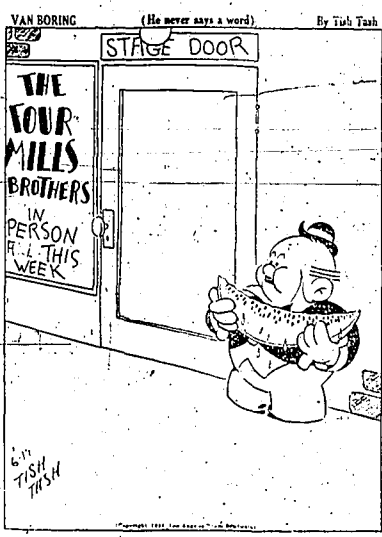

A three-man committee to negotiate with the federal reclamation service for purchase of the 433,000 acre feet of unsold water storage in American Falls reservoir was named at a meeting here yesterday of directors of Twin Falls and North Side canal companies and of the American Falls reservoir district.

Alternative for Lease  
Purchase of the storage has been proposed as an alternative for renewal of a five-year lease under the government's terms. Agents for the waterusers, the American Falls reservoir district has paid \$30,000 a year for the lease. Twin Falls Canal company's share, approximating \$8000 a year.

Additional storage rights, if purchased, would be allocated to the participating waterusers in proportion to their distribution of water. It was stated at yesterday's meeting.
