### UNDERGROUND PITS USED BY KIDNAPERS FOUND AT TACOMA

Department of Justice Officers Prepare to Submit Secret Evidence Before Federal Grand Jury

(By The Associated Press) TACOMA, Wash., June 18—Discovery of underground pits, indicating a kidnapping headquarters, had been planned long before it was carried out, became known today as department of justice agents prepared to lay secret evidence before a federal grand jury.

Government agents will seek to obtain indictments against Mr. and Mrs. Harmon W. Wahey, in custody in kidnap charges, and William Mann, fugitive sought in the case. J. Edgar Hoover, chief of the justice department's bureau of investigation, announced at Washington that Mann, sought as the "brains" of the \$200,000 abduction, had planned a kidnapping a year ago and built an underground pit near Spirit Lake, Idaho, with chains to fasten his intended victim.

Hoover said the pit had been found by citizens in June, 1934, and had been investigated without result, and that a second pit was discovered near Spirit Lake.

Boyd Hefz in Second Pit George Wechsner, 35-year-old lumber family here, was held in the second pit immediately after his abduction last May. Hoover said government agents refused to reveal the location of the second pit, and the whereabouts of a teen-ager, apparently near Astoria, Wash., in which the kidnaped boy was released June 1 upon payment of the ransom.

The Spirit Lake pit, authorities here recalled, was covered with sheet metal from highway signs and had a fine cement floor built into it to permit the victim to breathe. Hoover said the Spirit Lake and Tacoma pits were similar in construction, but that the Tacoma pit was built by six-year-old James "Bob" Turpin in April, 1934. "Bob" was found after 11 days in the pit.

Hoover suggested "Mahan may have fed about the Robles pit" and built a similar pit in Tacoma. Federal authorities here denied the Waheys will be brought from Olympia, 30 miles south of here.

CONTRASTS MARK WEATHER RECORD Low Temperatures and Rain Follow Year of Heat and Drouth

KANSAS CITY, June 18 (AP)—Sun, wind and rain wrote a cheering record of weather contrasts today across the great plains. Last year residents sweated it May. Those who could afford it fled to mountains and lakes. This year they have shivered in June—and liked it—at home.

Last spring, the sun wrote a record of parched plains, wilted crops, dry river beds and dying cattle. It was a story of day on day of sticky, stifling heat when nearly every vagrant breeze blew hot and eyes searched the skies vainly for a dark cloud.

"Great Drouth" Forgotten This spring, the rain wrote a record of soaked plains, revived crop, rivers bank-full and pastures invigorated. It is a story of day and day of rolling showers which have soaked the sub-soil and made farmers forget "the great drouth."

Here are contrasting maximum temperatures for Kansas City, covering a two-week period:

Various European capitals have been shaken by the various preparations for trans-oceanic hops this summer. Floyd Bennett field, municipal airport of New York city, seems to be the favorite point for the take-off.

What looms as the greatest flying feat in history, if successful, is the proposed non-stop flight around the world by C. G. Douglas and Bennett Griffin, scheduled for early October. Arrangements have been made for re-fueling over principal cities.

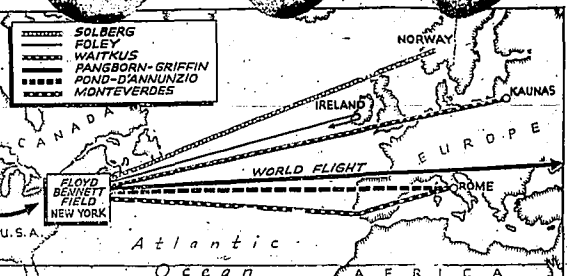
Crossed Two Oceans Panborn flew around the world with Hugh Herndon, and is the only American to have made non-stop crossings of both the Atlantic and Pacific oceans. Griffin, inspector of the department of commerce, tried a round-the-world flight with Jimmie Merritt that ended with a crash in Siberia.

With their new plans they will make preliminary tests in a couple of weeks to determine the records established a few weeks ago by Daniel W. Tomlinson. Felix Walkus, Lithuanian-American, will face offshore in his white and gold plane for a non-stop flight to Kaunas, capital of Lithuania. He intends to complete the flight starting from New York with Stephen Darius and Stan's Cirera who cracked up their plan on the Polish border, 375 miles from their goal.

Portuguese Flyers Tune Up Another plane being given final touches is that of Count Albert Montevideo, 26 and his brother, Marquis George Montevideo. Rome is their destination, but they intend to purchase their native Portuguese plane en route.

Should their flight be successful, it will be the first of its kind. Fifteen such attempts have been made, 12 of them were killed in the effort.

All a claim holder is now compelled to do is to post a notice of his claim to the effect that he is holding the ground by federal decree and file a copy of the notice with the county recorder.
