### IN OMAHA

It is appurent that a major part of the demands of the Omaha street car strikers are to be met. An offer of reduced hours and increased pay has been made by the operating company but the question of the rehiring of some sixty-eight out of the three or four hundred striking employes is still to be settled.

It should be settled, and speedily, and it probably will be if Governor Cochran does not recede from the position he has taken. Primarily, the Governor is interested in the Primarily, the Governor is interested in the proposition of the maintenance of law and order in Omaha. Street cars have been ordered off the streets, salcons have been warned that any sort of disturbance will result in immediate closing and both sides have been instructed to arbitrate their difference for which the salcons are the salcons. ences forthwith.

The strike from the start has been a thoroughly vicious affair. Two men have been killed outright and 4 hundred and fifty or more injured. Street car service has of course been paralyzed. Rioting has been of almost daily occurrance. Property damage runs into the thousands.

Probably the strikers will be granted their demands, at least in part, yet the strike as a whole will have accomplished nothing which might, not have been brought about by arbitration. A strike is never a mere peaceful demonstration, all too often it de velops into a struggle amounting almost to armed warfare. In the case of the Omaha strike, all three parties, the company, the strikers and the general public, have paid and will pay heavily for their respective parts in the affair.






