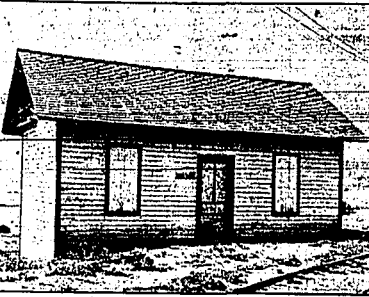

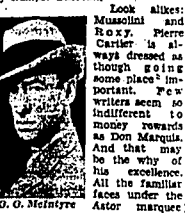

Sunday, June 18th, while trying to secure some rest in my home and listening to the radio I suddenly heard one of the New Dealers changing the laws of the land or the stroke of a pen, or more likely, from force of habit, disregard it all.

**UTAH SOLON FLAYS
F. D. R. TAX PLAN**

Senator Elbert D. Thomas, Democrat, Opens Fire on President's Sobame

SALT LAKE CITY, June 20 (UP)—Senator Elbert D. Thomas (D-Utah) last night branded President Roosevelt's proposal to increase estate and inheritance taxes as a plan which will "destroy the goose that lays the golden eggs."

Although slated over passage by the house of the Wagner labor disputes bill, Senator Thomas was extremely skeptical of the Roosevelt tax plan.

"The president is thinking of balancing the budget, but making estate and inheritance taxes higher in America will result in throwing property into wasteful litigation. Every poor man thinks it is the easiest thing to tax a dead man's property. It would be if the property were in cash! But for the most part dead men don't leave property in cash and the wasteful process of litigation does not make sound taxing methods," he said.

"Socks the rich is in no sense statesmanlike. The rich, of course, should bear their full share, but to destroy estates is to destroy the goose that lays the golden egg."

Utah's junior senator termed the Wagner bill a "constructive piece of legislation and will result in development and evolution of industrial law in America."

He praised the social security bill as a measure with a spirit bigger than the proposed law itself.

"It is in no sense experimental," he said. "It will result in a finer and closer cooperation between the states and the nation. Don't for a moment think only of the old, the weak, and the near-to-wells are the beneficiaries of such a program. The relief which will come to the young and those who do well in living free from obligations of taking care of dependents will result in one of the greatest economic booms average bread earner has ever enjoyed in this country."

Senator Thomas arrived here last evening for a brief visit before going to the west coast to deliver a series of lectures.

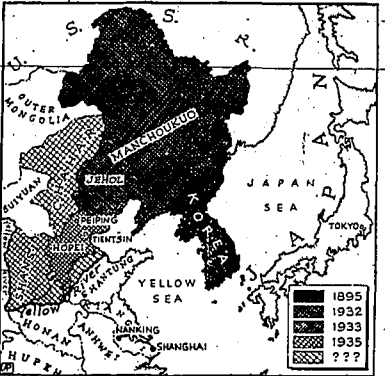
Buhl stores are requested by the committee to display ballot boxes into which patrons may deposit nominating coupons for queen. The committee will collect the coupons at a later day.

Westward Ho! For Japan As Island Empire Steadily Eats Way Into Mainland



How Japan has been trying for 40 years to find room for expansion on the adjacent mainland of the Asiatic continent is shown by this map. Starting with victory in the 1895 war with China, need for control of Korea, the island empire defeated czarist Russia 10 years later to gain recognition of her "paramount interest" on that peninsula and then, in 1910, annexed Korea outright.

The Russian war also gave Japan a firm foothold in southern Manchuria and after years of dispute with Chinese war lords in that territory, the army of the empire took it over in the autumn of 1931. In dependence of the country as the realm of Manchoukuo was proclaimed in February, 1932. In 1933 its borders were extended to engulf the Chinese province of Jehol and March 1, 1934, the whole became the empire of Manchoukuo. Behind every step position in Manchoukuo stands a Japanese soldier.

Today the Japanese troops are marching into the province of Hebei, containing Peking, former capital of the detroned Manchu emperors of China, and Tientsin, one of the chief railroad centers of the nation. Japanese spokesmen say their country does not want territory, wishing only to stifle anti-Japanese activities and brigandage.

It has been reported that the Japanese would like to see all the territory north and east of the winding Yellow river detached from the control of the Chinese national government at Nanking. A new "buffer state" is envisioned there.

Distraught Chinese prophets that if Nanking gives way to Tokyo's demands now, it will be only a question of time before such a state would become, like Manchoukuo, a mere vassal of Japan's government.

Now, if they live that long, will they be surprised if, in this contingency, all of Manchoukuo and the proposed new buffer state meets independence goes.

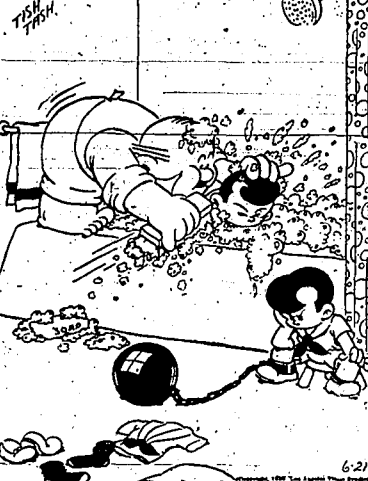

STUDENT ESSAYIST SCANS SPANISH WAR

Miner Dunn Wins First Prize Offered by Veterans

Winner of the 45 first prize offered by General Lawton camp, United Spanish War Veterans, in an essay contest, is Miller Dunn, Twin Falls high school student. His essay, given herewith, is to be entered in a state-wide contest from which the best one will be selected for national-wide contest to be selected.

THE SPANISH AMERICAN WAR

The Spanish American war was not started by the spread of propaganda but came as the result of the inhuman treatment of the Cubans by the Spaniards, the endangering of American lives and property, and the spark that set the conflagration in motion, the sinking of the battleship Maine.

This was not a war of aggression on the part of the United States. Its purpose was rather to help an abused neighbor and not that of acquiring more territory. All through the many years of the Spanish American war the Cubans had revolted against the Spaniards and in the year 1895 they had gained their independence. To stop the insurgents a Spaniard by the name of Weyer was made governor-general. He immediately adopted a policy of the concentration of non-combatants and put it into practice in the hope of preventing the spread of the insurgents. The result was that the Cubans were crowded up in filthy camps and poorly fed. Their conditions became truly pitiable. Thousands died of starvation or disease and it appeared as if Weyer intended to desolate the entire island. In this situation it is no wonder that the United States went to Cuba's aid. President McKinley voted this nation's attitude in his message to Congress, when he said: "In the name of humanity, in the name of civilization, in the name of half-endangered American interest, the war in Cuba must stop."

Stearns Toward Manila
The American fleet in Spain was given his passport before he could present a declaration of war on April 21, 1898. At that time Spain was on an immediate blockade of Cuba by Rear-Admiral Sampson in charge of the Atlantic fleet and Commodore Dewey in charge of the Pacific-Asiatic fleet steamed toward Manila. Within twenty-five miles of his destination Dewey met the Spanish squadron and captured or destroyed every Spanish ship without the loss of a man.

At Cuba it was different, the Spanish admiral Cervera could not be defeated without the aid of a land force in taking Santiago, the harbor in which Cervera's fleet was stationed. At this time there were twenty-five thousand men in the regular army of the United States, so that it became necessary to call for volunteers to go to Santiago to aid in its capture, as well as to be sent to the interior of the Philippine Islands. Immediately two hundred thousand men were called to the call. Most of them came without any thought of pay. There were some purely patriotic ones, some serving their country to the limit of their ability, without thought of personal gain in any form. Men from all walks of life and from three different races: white, black and red answered this call. These volunteers were trained in the rudiments of military tactics for from two to three weeks and then sent to the southern and western coasts to then be sent by sea to Cuba and the Philippine Islands respectively. Those who were sent to Cuba were crissed into transports and fed what was then known as "vambelmeat," a chemically cured fresh meat, that proved unfit to eat. Those who were sent to the Philippines had a much better and succeeded in gaining complete control of these islands, not without much hardship and trying surgical warfare, however.

Hardship in Cuba
After landing there who went to Cuba suffered many hardships, such as from a lack of food, equipment with heavy woolen clothing and very poor transportation, as well as a lack of medicine and proper medical care. Then they were supplied with black powder, the smoke from which was used along the enemy's trench location was an added obstacle, especially since the enemy was supplied with smokeless powder. Even under such conditions as these United States volunteers, among them the "Rough Riders" under the command of Theodore Roosevelt steadily advanced, and after such battles as Las Guasimas and San Juan they were successful in completely subduing the enemy and ending Spanish rule in Cuba.

By the repeal of the Platt amendment last year, men who fought in this war have lived to see Cuba given its independence as a nation, as well as congressional legislation providing for the independence of the Philippine Islands.

Lindbergh here and dedication of the estate as a national shrine has been undertaken by civic organizations of Little Falls. A few yards from the porch are the bluffs of the Mississippi river with rustic cottages and abundant poplars. Although the structure was dedicated as a state park in 1931, little was done to refurbish the interior. 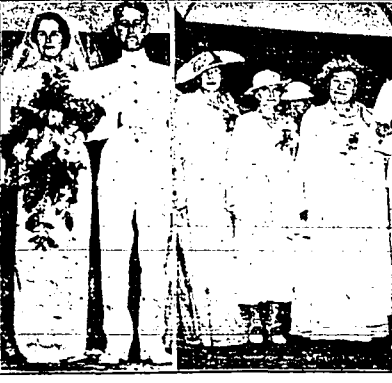

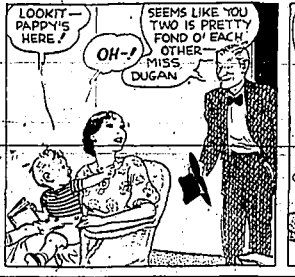

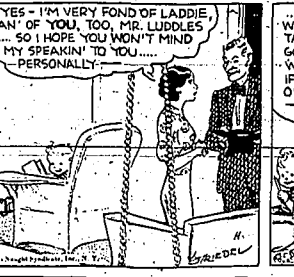

STAMPS

In The News
Conch shells, coco palms and a medallion of George V's head decorate the 3-hallpenny and 10-shilling stamps of the new 12-stamp pictorial series from the Caymans.
Di-colored and printed in five designs, these large stamps each include a head of the king. A map of the three islands in the group appears on the forthpenny and threepenny stamps; a cat boat on the halfpenny; two people and a stilling station; a sailing ship on the penny; a beach; 2½-pence, 6-pence and 8-shillings; booby birds, penny and 2-shilling stamps.
These West-Indian islands pronounced "kai-man" were discovered by Columbus. He named them Tortugas, because the surrounding seas were full of turtles. They were eventually colonized from Jamaica by the British, and today boast a population of about 5,000.
Two villages, Georgetown and Roddenden, are located on the largest island, Grand Cayman which is a few miles larger than Manhattan. The Caymans produce mahogany, dyewoods, coconuts and potatoes. But the most profitable occupation is catching turtles for export to Jamaica.
New Zealand brings forth a new animal set of three: 1d carnation, 3d dark color and 6d dark blue. The design shows a large cabin plane about to land near a hangar with a sailing mail truck beside it. At outside a Maori stands beneath a palm tree watching the plane. The design is called "New Zealand Air Terminal."
