

### THE LABOR RELATIONS BOARD

As the many regional labor boards pack up their files and close their offices, going out of business with the passing of NRA and the National Labor Relations Board, some effort should be made to conserve for further use the knowledge and experience their members have acquired. More strikes their members have acquired. More strikes than the public realizes were settled before they began, through the work of such local boards. Many serious strikes were settled quickly and with satisfaction to all concerned by the efforts of the public-spirited citizens serving on these boards.

serving on tuese operas.

They achieved varying degrees of success,
of course. But all-were serving to build up
in the public mind a clearer understanding
of labor problems and to develop a new and
valuable technique for handling labor dis-

Whether or not the Wagner bill is the way to do it, the best features of the labor rela-tions boards should certainly be maintained

Strikes of all kinds continue to dot the industrial map until the general impression in the public mind is in effect that no line of industry or no type of capital investment is exempt. So far from this being the case there are conspicuous examples to the contrary. The Standard Oll Company of California supplies one of these.

Here is one of the major corporations of

the country, in existence since eighteen hundred seventy-nine, which has been com-pelled to cope with labor disturbances within its own ranks but twice in its entire history. its own ranks but wice in its entire matory. Some twenty years ago some fifty of its men struck and were out for two weeks. A few years later-between two hundred and three hundred employes on pipeline construction formulated demands and laid down their tools. The difficulty was adjusted within a resided of the second of th period of days.

The company was the first of all the oil companies to reduce the working hours on drilling operations from twelve to eight and idefiling operations from tweive to eight and this was done without reduction in pay. It was the first to establish the six day week for oil drilling crews; it was among the first to provide pensions, sick benefits, life and accident insurance for employes. In nineteen hundred seventeen it adopted the practice of granting two weeks annual vacation with

of granting two weeks annual vacation win pay to men employed on common labor. It is not difficult to see why such a cor-poration should be practically exempt from abor troubles but in the light of a record such as this it is somewhat surprising that the example should not be followed by the ornoration interests as a whole. As a matter of fact there are probably many such cor-porations but it is equally true that there are many more which entertain no such coneption of the rights of employes or the duty of employers.

This is the kind of thing which is needed

in American corporation management. If such practice were the rule rather than the exception there would be fewer trouble spots on the country's industrial map.






