ALASKA COLONISTS' COMPLAINTS BRING ORDER FOR REPORT

Senate Calls on Hopkins for Information Dealing With Charges of Waste on Government Project

(By The Associated Press) PALMER, Alaska, June 21. Two Matanuska Valley colonists charged today in letters to President Roosevelt and Republican Administration Secretary Hopkins that "thousands of dollars" are being "squandered" with no apparent accomplishment on the project while in Washington, D. C., the senate asked Hopkins for a full report on the subject.

The resolution was submitted without objection from Democratic leaders, by Senators Vandenberg, Shipstead, McCarty, and LaFollette (Prog-Wis), representing the states from which most of the colonists were taken. The two colonists, Mrs. I. M. Sandvik and Patrick Hemmer, who said they represented "other colonists, declared in their letters, however, that "there was no over-estimation as far as climate, soil and agricultural possibilities" of the valley.

Two hours after their brief court appearance the Waley's had a sorrowful farewell to each other in the office of United States Marshal A. J. Chitty. Then she was whisked back to the Olympic county jail to await her destiny in the making.

"All I have to say is for my wife," Waley told the court. "Maybe you won't be here when her case is discussed," said the judge.

"She never knew until the Sunday after the kidnaping (the little timber heir was seized on Friday May 24) that we had the boy," Waley went on. "We were in a car and I told her we had kidnaped the boy."

"Attorney Pleads Youth" Stephen J. O'Brien, attorney appointed by the court to represent the couple after Waley had asked an explanation yesterday of one of the charges, called attention to the youthfulness of the accused girl. She is 19.

"She rented the house as charged in the indictment without knowing what it was for," said O'Brien. "She knew nothing of the kidnaping at the time."

"On your statement," said Judge Cushman, "I will not accept a plea so qualified. The plea of insanity is not a defense and the case will go over until next October tomorrow morning."

The ransom note, which demanded \$200,000 from "whom it may concern" originally was delivered by Connelly. He was later traced to Washington state shortly afterward and spent some time in the vicinity of Raymond and Hoquiam.
