Two-Day Canning School Starts This Afternoon

Demonstrator, Whose Four-H Canning Club Won National Honors in 1932, Directs Classes At Auditorium

"With better irrigation, due to a rainy spring, and the excellent condition of orchard and garden products, and improved machinery, it is anticipated that more fruit, vegetables and nuts will be canned in Idaho this year than in the past four years," Mrs. Ethel Pope, Boise, expert demonstrator for the Kerr Glass Manufacturing company, said last evening upon her arrival in Twin Falls, preparatory to opening a two-day canning school here today.

Monday and Tuesday of this week Mrs. Pope conducted a successful school at Buhl, sponsored by the Twin Falls News. Her demonstrations here will be held at the Twin Falls high school auditorium, beginning promptly at 2 o'clock and continuing until 6 o'clock. Using equipment such as is found in the average kitchen, Mrs. Pope will give instructions in the proper canning of fruits, vegetables and meats. To make the practical demonstrations even more valuable and personal, Mrs. Pope permits her classes to ask pertinent questions concerning their own problems of food conservation.

School Has Wide Appeal
These canning classes are interesting to the extent that housewife and club woman, the farm woman who puts up the produce of her orchard and garden in the terms of hundreds of cans each summer, and the 4-H club girls, both the beginners and advanced students, Mrs. Pope issues a special invitation to the 4-H club girls of the community to attend. She is leader of the Col. school, and the club of Boise for four and one-half years. This club, under her training, won the United States national 4-H club championship in 1932.

For the sixth consecutive year the Kerr Glass Manufacturing corporation has been appointed to sponsor the 4-H canning movement nationally, according to Mrs. Pope. One girl from each state, selected by the officials of the universal extension division, is sent to Chicago in December to compete for national honors. A girl from Blackfoot was state champion last year. Many suggestions on how to can "prize packs" will be gleaned by the girls who attend these demonstrations.

Contest for Women
For the second year in Idaho, the Kerr corporation is sponsoring a homemakers' canning contest. All Idaho women are eligible. The company provides the prizes, and the contest is directed by Miss Marion Hepworth, state home demonstration agent. Those who are interested in the contest are asked to communicate with Mrs. Margaret Clements, district demonstration agent, for rules governing the canning contest. Fifteen minutes of each day will

WORK AT BURLEY

Commercial Body Holds Annual Meeting and Names Directors

BURLEY, June 25.—Burley Chamber of Commerce at an annual meeting at the National Hotel Monday evening selected W. A. Shear and I. H. Harris and elected Gus Paulson to succeed Joe Pixton, as members of the board of directors for three-year terms.

President J. T. Peterson gave a report of the year's activities of the chamber, which included: Construction of large bill boards at Wells, Nevada, showing routing through Burley to Yellowstone and points en route; construction of a bridge to be placed near the Washington school north of the river showing routing through Burley, connecting with U. S. highway 30, tolling out a sum of \$250 donated to postal convention expenses.

The chamber held a conference with the administration of the reclamation, regarding increase in capacity of American Falls dam and feasibility of construction of a dam at Yellowstone; lake efforts to get Lon. State Teachers' and State Chamber conventions; helped to delay extension of sewer lines; helped to bring to Centralia at Postoffice; shared expense of paying salary of line guard at Rotary bench; worked with the administration of the housing act, which resulted in considerable activity in repairing and improvements; sought new gymnasium and new club rooms at high school through IFRA, which is still pending.

The body urged and cooperated in getting construction of new federal building at Burley, now nearly completed; financial assistance given to Future Farmers state activity; seeking to secure reinstatement fair for 1935, provided for in tentative budget of county; later received cooperation in getting Albin, Basin and Miller roads; sought additional local police protection for burley merchants during early morning hours; made efforts to have processing of government sheep and cattle done in Burley; secured employment office for Burley; active during last session of legislature conferring with Cassia county representative and senator opposing sales tax and any legislation detrimental to removal of Albin Normal school and enactment of the most satisfactory liquor law.

It was instrumental in securing state appropriation to combat white flax requested contractors of federal building to employ local labor, which was granted; awarded honor of conference; he has had with the government and with respect to IFRA and PWA projects. DEATH SEALS LIPS OF WOUNDED MAN

Everett Crites Dies Without Disclosing Companion on Assorted Raid

Without naming his companion who is believed to have escaped in an automobile, Everett Crites, 34, of Buhl, died at the county general hospital here yesterday from gunshot wounds assertedly inflicted by deputy sheriffs when he attempted to break into a wool shed on the Mearns-Cerry ranch, 12 miles southwest of Buhl, late Monday night.

Officers said Crites had removed screws from hinges on the wool shed when they focused a spotlight on him and called on him to give himself up, ignoring their order, they reported, Crites turned and fled. Officers said they called on him repeatedly to halt, and opened fire when he outdistanced them.

A charge of assault on Crites about the legs and lower abdomen. Death was attributed to shock and loss of blood. A. C. Parker, Buhl, reported that Crites had been brought to the hospital here, arriving within 45 minutes after the shooting, shortly before midnight.

Crites was involved in a burglary charge three years ago and recently was accused with his sister-in-law, Mrs. Lena Crites, in a chicken stealing charge in which she assumed the whole blame. Crites was not married. He was a son of A. E. Crites of Buhl.

The body was taken to the Evans and Johnson funeral home at Buhl. Besides his father, Mr. Crites is survived by his mother, Mrs. E. Crites of Buhl, and two sisters, Mrs. Mary Jones of Boise and Mrs. Carmen Earl of Salem, Oregon.
