Some of them want to go back home and are angry when reminded that their con and are angry when reminded that their con-tracts said nothing about transportation back. Some are indignant because there is -no-shop-work for them to do, as they were told there would be by social workers before they started. Some insist that they don't want to be farmers, although they signed up for farming.

There is a present shortage of house tim-

There is a present shortage of house timber. It is hard to get enough logs for log houses, and sawmills are inadequate to square-the-logs and provide the necessary mill work. There is going to be no time, either, for curing lumber. Supplies of various kinds are lacking, including tools.

Thus Don Irwin, director of the colony, is having his hands full trying to remedy oversights and keep the colonists contented and hopeful and make the necessary-progress in construction and food-production before next winter.
