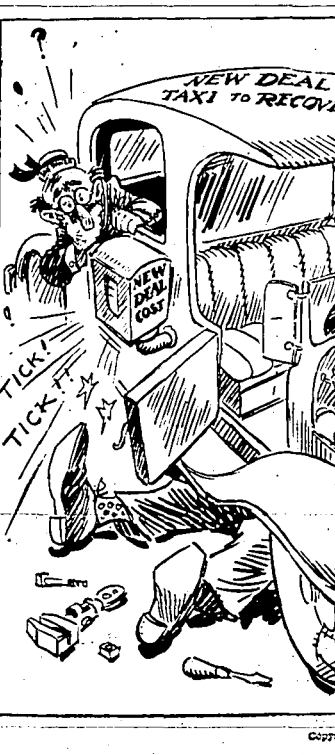

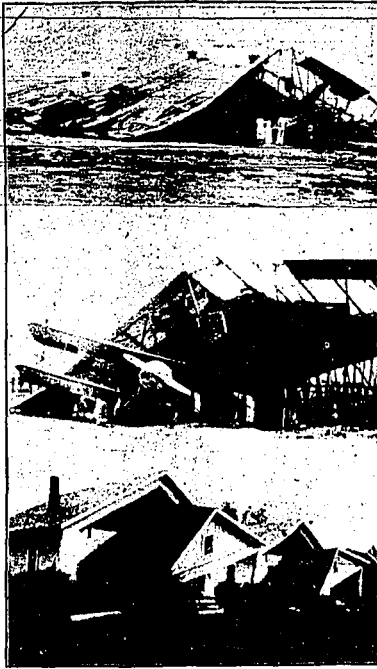
Part of Loot Recovered

### VICTORY SEEN FOR LONG-SHORT HAUL

#### Twin Falls Man Relates Proceedings at Hearing in Capital

A determination in congress to reach an early adjournment is a factor for defeat of the repealer of the "long-short" haul clause of the transportation act, according to Carl L. DeLong of Twin Falls, who was in the House, member and Charles Root, transportation chief, Idaho's public utilities commission, recently appeared before a congressional committee in Washington with arguments against the repealer.

Another factor in favor of the intermountain region's fight on the repealer is strong opposition to the proposal in the senate, Mr. DeLong said.

It was shown at hearings before the congressional committee, Mr. DeLong said, that southern Idaho is the only agricultural section without truck, water or rail competition, but that is entirely dependent upon the Union Pacific system for its outlet to markets.

If permitted to reduce long haul rates, according to a rail executive, southern railroads will have to increase rates to intermediate points.

**Lost Business**

The assistant general traffic manager for the Union Pacific system was quoted as telling the committee the western states have lost a big share of their business in Texas by reason of potatoes moving from there to Idaho by water, and that the Union Pacific is anxious to protect the intermountain territory.

Representatives of Yakima and Wenatchee fruit and vegetable growers supported repeal of the long-short haul clause, and were quoted as saying at the hearing that if they could get this clause repealed they could move their produce through Idaho, a distance of about 700 miles, at rates equal to, or less than Idaho's rates.

The hearing before the congressional committee, Mr. DeLong said, was a battle between rail and water carriers.

In answer to the railroads' plea that they were required to pay high taxes, Mr. DeLong submitted figures showing that during the period between 1913 and 1933 railroad taxes have increased 68 per cent. Taxes on farm property during the same period increased 201 per cent. Railroads are charging 133 per cent of pre-war rates, while farm commodities are selling for 63 to 70 per cent of pre-war prices.

Mr. DeLong appeared before the congressional committee as representative of Idaho Vegetable Growers Incorporated. He returned to Twin Falls Saturday evening.

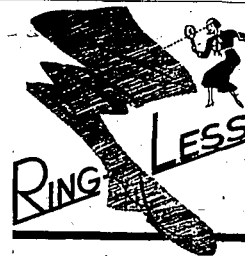
